BASIC CRUSHES NEEDLES

The Basic Wolves tamed the Needles Mustangs by crushing them by the score of 31 to 13. The Wolves set new records by winning this game. First, it was the highest score made by a Basic team. Also the first time the Wolves won four games in a season, and first time ever to win two games away from home. The Wolves still have four games left in this season.

Basic got off to a great start by scoring on the second play of the game. This was made by Lopeman on a 43-yard gallop to the goal. The Mustangs came back hard to score and push across the extra, and to go ahead 7 to 6 in the first quarter.

The Wolves then buckled down and scored twice. These were made by Lopeman and Galloway. Doughty came in to kick the extra point. He will not see any more action except for coming to kick the extra point, at which he is an expert. The score at the half was: Basic 19, Needles 7.

The third period was highlighted on a long run by Galloway on an intercepted pass, but it was called back on a clipping penalty. The ball was put back on the Basic 20, from where Lopeman went off-tackle and ran the full 80 yards for a Basic tally. The Wolves opened up with a strong passing attack and scored again on a long pass from Galloway to Hansen good for 25 yards and a touchdown. When the game ended, the Wolves were on their way to another score, but time ran out. The final score: Basic 31, Needles 13.

The Basic Wolves' men, after trailing the Kingman Bulldogs 7 to 0 at half time, came back strong to score three touchdowns in the second half and take their first Tri-State win by the score of 19 to 14.

The first quarter found the Wolves threatening four times but they just couldn't seem to push it over. The Bulldogs took to the air in the closing minutes of the first quarter and scored on a pass into the end zone. They booted the extra and led 7 to 0. The second quarter found Basic threatening again and again but unable to score. The third quarter found Lopeman setting up a touchdown by carrying the ball to the 5-yard line from where Williams charged across, making the score Basic 6, Kingman 7.

In the fourth quarter the Wolves tallied twice and led 19 to 7. But the Bulldogs fought gamely and pushed across another score and the game ended with the score: Basic 19, Kingman 14.
