Nutty Game

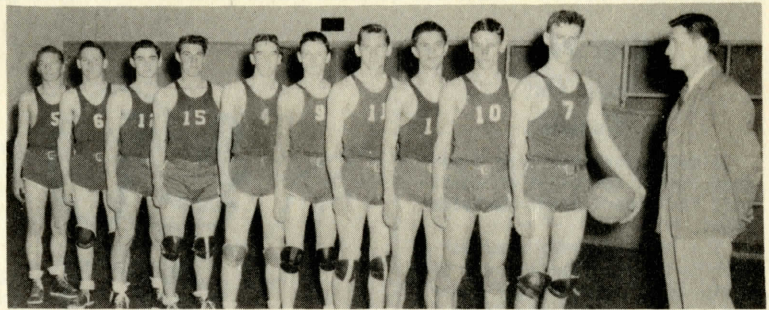

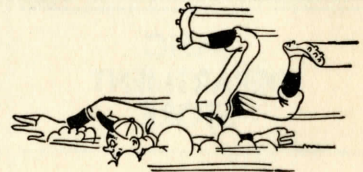

During the second quarter, the Wolf Pups began to tire and at the half, the score was: Henderson 18, Westside 16.

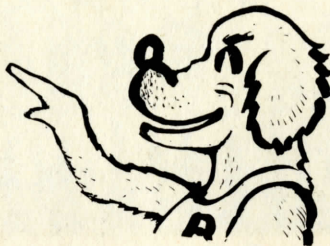
In the third quarter, the Henderson boys added one foul to their score. But in the meantime the Westsiders had added three points to their score, making the score 19 to 19.

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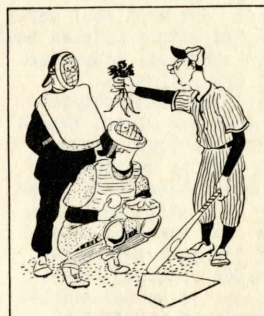
Sheriff's League

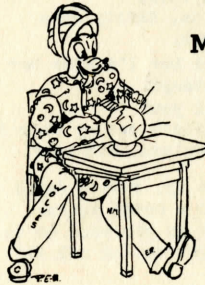
