LOCAL SUPPORT FOR SCHOOL ASSURED FOR THE PRESINT

Many of us here at Basic High have been concerned as to the future of our school in view of the withdrawal of Federal aid to local and county financial support. Mr. John V. Mueller, Manager of the Colorado River Commission, stated in the Las Vegas Review Journal:

"In a report to the commission, Meuller said the state would be allowed to pay some taxes until the deed transferring the property to Nevada is actually signed. This should come about July 1, Meuller said.

"Present indications are that the state will be able to take care of the schools at Henderson to the extent of approximately \$37,500, he indicated, but added he did not know whether it would be possible to contribute anything further to the operation of the county government. This is expected to be determined within the next few days."

Thus it appears that the Colorado River Commission is very alert to the needs of our school, and will extend every effort to insure future operation.

SADIE HAWKINS DAY


"Arthur Godfrey comes to Dogpatch" was the theme of the assembly staged by the English II class, April 22, 1949.





The Basic Wolves' four man track team gained enough points to place third in the annual Tri-State Track Meet at Blythe, California on April 23.

At the time trials Lopeman and Ybarra took first place in their heats of the hundred yard dash ahead of the favored Boulder City sprinters.

Ybarra, placing first in the broad jump-19 feet 10 inches, missed breaking the Tri-State record of 19 feet $11\frac{1}{2}$ inches.

"Red" Hunter pushed Sweet of Boulder, but faded a few yards from the tape to finish second in the 880 yard run. Cureton, who ran the 660 in

Cureton, who ran the 660 in the B division led all the way to finish first and set a new record which he set himself in 1948.

A total of eleven points gave the Basic thinclads a third place behind second place Blythe with fourteen. Boulder City for a second time in succession took the Tri-State Championship with a total of eighty-seven points.

Mustangs Win

Playing a return game with the Needles Mustangs, the league-leading Basic Wolves were landed their first loss of the season 13 to 7.

It was evident that the Wolves were off their usual game since they were able to collect only one run and hit out singles for four innings. The Mustangs took advantage of the Wolves off day and batted in ten runs to the Wolves' one.

THINCLADS SURPEISE

"Red" Hunter and Bob Ybarra, scoring 10¹/₂ points between them, placed the Basic Wolves in a fourth place at the Boulder City Invitational Track Meet April 15.

In the mile run, "Red" Hunter came from behind in the last lap to finish with a burst of speed to defeat easily the favorite H. Anderson of Boulder City in the fast time of 4:58. After a half hour's rest, Hunter was entered in the 880 run; however the previous race began to tell on him near the finish to as he faded take third place. In the broad jump, a new meet record was set by Simon of Las Vegas with a 20 foot 10 inch jump. B. Ybarra managed to get off the best jump of his track career of 20 feet 3 inches. Both boys broke the old record of 19 feet 7 inches, set last year by Kennedy of Las Vegas.

Ybarra also placed fourth in the 220 dash to tie with Haywood of Blythe.

K. Lopeman, who qualified in the 220 in the trials, was edged out in the final heats. A. Cureton, who ran the mile, set too fast a pace and finished in a fifth place. The relay team, consisting of Ybarra, Kizzia, Cureton, and Lopeman had poor timing in passing the baton and came in fifth.



The Basic Wolves journeyed to Needles to rope and tie the Mustangs by a score of 17 to 7 Chuck Galloway wielded the big stick with four hits in as many times at bat.

This win enabled the Wolves to go to the top of the Tri-State League.

The Wolves had an easy time taking the win except for the bottom of the third inning when the Mustangs received shx of their seven runs. The Wolves collected nineteen hits to the Mustangs' eight.

The heavy hitters for the Wolves were Lopeman, Wilson and Rostine. Batteries were Galloway and Bunch.


