Here's Latest on Shooting Deer And Waterfowl in Nevada

A split season for waterfowl shooting this year will be advanced by Nevada's Fish and Game Commission it was announced, following a session of the 17-man board held in Reno last weekend.

The commissioners voted to urge the federal Fish and Wildlife Service to set two separate periods for waterfowl, one to open on October 12 and the second on November 20.

It was felt that a split season would give hunters a greater chance at northern flights which heretofore had not arrived here until after the season had closed.

Deer Season Set

Deer seasons for the various counties were set by the board in their sessions Thursday with October 2-23 the dates set up in Churchill county.

The same dates will prevail in Douglas, Esmeralda, Eureka, Lander, Lyon, Mineral, Nye, Ormsby, and Pershing counties.

October 16-30 has been set for Clark and Lincoln counties.

Elko county's season will open on October 9 and close on October 20.

Humboldt county will have a season from October 2 to 16; White Pine October 1 to 23.

Washoe and Storey will start October 16 but a closing date has not been announced as yet.

The commission agreed to the proposal of the Washoe county big game committee report urging that 750 deer be taken from the Red Rock district this season due to the damage rendered to crops along the border by the large herd.

Dates of other hunting season, among them the first sagehen season in the state for many years, will be announced early next week, it was said.

Several Changes Made In Deer Game Law

A study of amendments to the Nevada Fish and Game laws reveals several changes in regard to the hunting of deer for the

coming year which are of interest to local sportsmen.

In years past considerable objection has been voiced by Nevada sportsmen in regard to a game regulation requiring the tagging of deer immediately upon its kill and that the tag be left on the deer at all times.

Such a requirement often resulted in the mutilation of the tags and sometimes in their loss, especially in rough country where the deer had to be dragged or carried a considerable distance back to camp.

An amendment to the law now makes it read:

"Upon killing of any deer said licensee shall immediately write the place, date and time of day of such killing, punch out the day and month of such killing on said tag and attach the original of said tag to the horns of such deer and keep the same attached thereto during the open season and for a period of ten days next succeeding the close of the open season; provided that if a deer is taken in such a locality that the tag, if attached immediately, is liable to mutilation or destruction en route to vehicle or camp, it will be sufficient to punch the original tag immediately and attach the tag on reaching such vehicle or camp.

Under the new laws as adopted at the recent session of the legislature, the fish and game commissioners are authorized to determine whether or not any validation procedure shall be required.

If validation procedure is determined to be necessary, or convenient, they are authorized to determine the procedure to be followed and the officers or agencies authorized to make such validation.

Two Boulder City men, Richard L. Swift, seaman apprentice, U.S.N.R., son of Mr. and Mrs. M.
