He cautioned the committee to move carefully on plans of incorporation. He said pressure of county officials to get Henderson on the tax rolls was the factor in the decision of the Colorado River commission to place the ohms for sale.

With some 400 thankful Clark County citizens in the enthusiastic audience, Pittman's butcher, baker, and candlestick maker sat with city, county, state and federal officials last night at the Swanky Club in festive occasion—a thanksgiving dinner indeed, celebrating the community's new water works installation—home made but doing the job well.

With County Commissioner Geo. Franklin Jr. as master of ceremonies, the audience rocked and cheered as leading lights as well as lesser lights were called upon to take bows. All, in bowing, however, paid respect and handed heartfelt greetings to the little community that had worked out its own salvation—by bringing water to the desert.

After Town Board Chairman Paul Dickover told the listeners how the job was done, and who did it, and then heard congratulations from Lt. Gov. Cliff Jones, the audience then heard several dramatic announcements from BMP manager John Mueller—

words that auger well for all of this community.

His announcement included these points:

Deals were completed yesterday whereby manganese will be turned out by private industry deals were completed whereby every unit of the BMP plant has been or is in the process of negotiation for productive use except unit No. 7, plans are under way to give Pittman a sewerage tie-in as well as water—with Henderson.

Mueller was insistent that with faith and cooperation by all, there will be an industrial future to this area—but soon.

Children's day will be observed today at 4 p.m. with games and races planned and at night a square dance is to be held in front of the post office, sponsored by the Sheriff's Athletic League under direction of Hugh Moran.

The three day celebration will end Saturday night with a dance at the same site with Tommy Nelson's orchestra providing the music.
