County Commission Agrees to Help Henderson in Problems

Many Henderson people have contacted the county board following this paper's suggestion last week that the board's advice and aid be sought in setting up a new for mof government.

And results may be forthwith, the NEWS learned upon contacting Commissioners Franklin and Malone. They explained that they will gladly help in any way to get Henderson on its way, either by setting up a committee or working as a unit.

They added, however, that the majority of Henderson's people would have to show interest in such surveys and assistance before they would step in because the board has been working on the sound principle of majority rule ever since January 1.

Meanwhile, the NEWS learned from Tax Assessor Mac Oglesby that the most he would judge Henderson homes to be worth would be roughly \$1800.

Many Hendersonians believe the right price should be in the \$1000 to \$2000 bracket, and that the state's purchase of the project from the government should set up the homes on the books at no higher figure.
