Brings Bones From India to Make High Grade Gelatin

his family, in consultation with British technicians, engineered it. Much of the technical process is original with the Palmers. Some of it is secret.

Gelatins, Inc., is a family affair, with George Bruce Palmer, Jr., at the head. His father, George B. Palmer of George B. Palmer, Inc., formerly chief engineer of the Wyandotte Chemicals corporation, is on the staff as consulting engineer. Two sons, who saw South Pacific service as naval officers, are employees, Bruce III is treasurer. "How 'Scotch' he has become, since his extravagant undergraduate day!" muses the father, eyeing his namesake in affection tinged with awe. Frederick is in the engineering department. David and Richard are still in college but are expected to enter the firm upon graduation. Mrs. Palmer has joined her husband here and the family resides in Henderson.

Palmer, Sr., is full of figures on the tens of millions of pounds of gelatin used in this country, and the need for expanded production. Gelatin is a protein, he points out, and an important article of diet. Of the 44 million pounds now used, nearly 33 million go into edible products such as ice cream.

Gelatin is nothing new. Napoleon fed his soldiers on gelatin biscuits, and the siege of Paris was maintained on gelatin.

We eat eight billion pounds of protein a year. "Half of this could very well be in the form of manufactured gelatin products," Palmer said. "And we still wouldn't have to give up our beefsteaks."

This would utilize 100 times the amount of gelatin now produced. The man with an idea has the facts to back it up.

He also has the necessary "know how" so widely respected in America, and a background of education and study to boot.

Though he graduated in 1922 from the U. S. Naval academy and started a career with the navy, he was intrigued by the possibilities of chemistry and left the navy to complete a post graduate course in chemical engineering at the University of Michigan. Armed with his new degree, he went into the fascinating field which led him finally to the sun-baked desert of southern Nevada where he expects to make the best gelatin in the country for an unlimited market.

The Indian bones, ground and washed, shipped by boat from Karachi, Pakistan, to the port of Los Angeles, and to Basic by rail, will yield in addition to high bloom strength gelatin an important by-product, di-calcium phosphate, which will be sold as a supplemental food for poultry and cattle, and as fertilizer.

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Henderson HOME NEWS

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Henderson Chest Drive Under Way;

With the general belt-tightening going around this fall, the Community Chest will be of greater importance than ever before in this war-torn town. The 1949-50 drive, opened Wednesday with a goal of \$5,000 will need the support of every family in the immediate area, according to Lylal Burkholder, chairman protem.

Last season the community welfare program assisted 36 families, 104 children and 73 adults. They represented only those in dire need or emergency circumstances, to whom were food, medicines, clothing, fuel oil and other items. Currently the need for this type of aid is expected to reach far greater proportions.

Another part of the Community Chest budget is allotted to the Parent-Teacher Association milk program for elementary school children. Last year the chest granted \$236 to this program.

Young peoples' activities occupy a prominent place in the budget, Burkholder said. The Teen-Age club contacted approximately 150 youth, helping to finance most of their own activities, actually calling on the chest for only \$55.

The girls' softball team, numbering some 25 girls, was allotted \$138 for equipment and trips to opponents' home towns. The main project, the annual swim program, handled more than 450 children this summer, at a cost of \$539.96 to the Community Chest. The Sheriff's Athletic League, promoter of sports activities for 60 boys, as well as the square dance, used \$264 for its program.

The Girl Scout allotment was set at \$333 last year. This season the Hi-Y club is scheduled to be included in the youth activities budget.

The children's parties at Halloween and Christmas as well as the holiday baskets at Thanksgiving and Christmas were partially financed by the chest. These events are handled by the coordinating council, which was allowed \$333.

The Veterans' Welfare program made good use of the \$333 budgeted for their use, and an equal amount is to be offered this year if desired.

A break-down of the allocation of funds shows that the community welfare received 20 per cent of the fund; veterans' welfare 9, Girl Scouts 9, the PTA school milk program 8, the coordinating council 9, youth activities, divided among five programs, 35 percent, with administrative cost being 5 per cent.
