Three quarters of a million dollars will be spent in changing the plant process which will be set up to recover some 65 per cent of the manganese in the thousands of tons of ore accumulated during

the past war. The new owners expect to be in production next year, by early fall, and will employ about 100 men. In four months, the construction will start. No hiring will be done until then.
