"On humanitarian grounds, we deplore and condemn the obstructionist tactics of Nevada's U. S. Senator McCarran which has blocked legislative action designed to permit the admission of a larger number of displaced persons into this country."

When interviewed by a "new reporter, Reverend Patterson said that the members of the Association took up this matter solely on the basis of human rights and that their action had no political meaning.


