A special meeting of the Conordirating Council was held at 730 P.M. on this date, with eleven organizations in attendance.

In the absence of the secretary Pris Ray Clark asked Velta Shay to racord the minutes.

The meeting was openad by the President, the roll was called, and other formalities dispensed with.

Ray Clark introduced urs? Campbell, executive secretary of the Community Chest, and invited her to address the meeting.

Mrs. Campbell spoke on Community Chest matters, explaining that our letter was recefved too late to be discussed, as budgets are submitted to the $8 x-$ ecutive committee early in August, applications considered, and alloca'fons made. After allocations have been made no ohanges can be made. A srall operating budget is set aside at this time (around $\$ 5,000.00$ ) to cover office rent, salaries and campaign costs.

This year around $\$ 1700.00$ vas reallocated to the Jeffarson Communaty Centor after the Westside USO way closed. There are some 4000 negroes on the Westaide and the community center is their only sooial outlet. As long as the former Westside USO building la kept open, the building can be kept open and the furniture retained. So it was deoided to transfer the unused funds from the USO to the Jeffergan Community Center.

Mrs. Campbell invited the people of Henderson to attend the ennual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Community Chest to be held on July 17th at 8 P. M., at the War Memorial Building, in the City Chambers. At this meeting replacements to the Board of Directors will be made. There are 30 people on the board and mit it is advisable for as many people as possible to be present so that, we will be well represented on the Board and on the Executive Committee. Henderson should have at least two on the Executive Committee, which has 17 members.

There is a limit to the amountof funds we can raise. Now partioipating is the Boulder City Reoreational Program, Girl Scouts, Boy Soouts, Cathollo Welfare, P.T.A. hot lunch program in Las Vegas and day nurseries in both Las Vegas and Boulder City.
$L_{\text {ast }}$ year's contribution from Henderson was \$1825.76, with 9543 from Victory Village, and around 4 r. 00 from Carver Park. In answer to a question from Ray Clark Mrs. Campbell indicated that this was the most contributed by this ares. At this time she was pre ated with photostats by Ray Clark ahowing around 4700.00 contributed west beftore the close of the program in 1943, and over 2800.00 early in the pear of 1944 . To this she replied that records at the Community Chest, in Las Vegas, because of change in porsonrel, are in a sad state, and that she is presently onfaged in trying to straighten out past records.

Mr. Hickman asked if the per capita figure had been broken down. This has not been done todate.

Further he inquired if the distributing agency made accounting to the Executive Committee. Mrs. Campbell explained that the books are audited every three months. Mr. Allen and Mr. Wengert audit all accounts and demand a satisfactory accounting of each expenditure.

Mr. Clark asked what Boulder City's contribution was last year. $\$ 6,000$. was the answer.

Mrs. Campbell read to the assemblage the letter written by Mr. E. G. Hamilton $\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{M}} \boldsymbol{Z}$ to the Clark County Community Chest in October of 1945. This letter was forwarded to Mr. Bunker by Mr. Byrne under date of January 10,1946. As these inters arc not at present in Coordinating Council files Mrs. Campbell will sent us a copy of each, as a matter of record.

Mr. Clark asked how we should go about applying for a portion of the hudget. Mrs. Campbell explained procedure, advising for the request to set out clearly the amount needed and an explanation of details. This should be in the hands of the Board of Directors by August list.

Patterson and Mr. Burkholder had been working on jlans for the distribution of the "baskets for the Needy". 22 baskets were ristributed at Thanksgiving - 122 individuals were aided - $\$ 28$ worth ol theater tickets were given by tho Victory Theater to children for bringing food for the baskets - the Carver Park and Townsite Markets gave celery and apples and sold the meat used at cost.
