Letters from Nevada's Daughters is an exciting project for Nevada women to preserve and share their family and life histories. The project was inspired by former Congresswoman Barbara Vucanovich's plan to write her memoirs in the form of letters to her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. The book is entitled Letters from the House: Reflections of a Tough Grandmother.

The Letters from Nevada's Daughters project is sponsored by the Nevada Women's History Project(NWHP). As the 20th century draws to a close it is the time to compile the facts about Nevada women in this century and their thoughts about their lives and times.

This project is designed to cover the sixteen months from September 1999 to January 2001. The format for the chronicles is designed to be easy to use. Each month the women who participate in the project will write a letter to her family regarding a certain area of her life. The NWHP and the Nevada Department of Museums, Library and Arts will post on their web pages the topic of the letter with some general questions to be answered. You are not limited to the one page of the form and may attach as many additional pages as you need. There is no word limit. You decide what information you wish to preserve. All answers and information are optional.

After collecting basic information on each letter writer, the tentative topics of discussion are: family genealogy, residences, life work/career/s, daily life activities, foods, religion, fashions, significant medical history, recreation and travel, important issues or causes, impact of technology, "famous" people known, music and arts, retirement, holiday celebrations and customs, and your treatment by others because you were a woman.

It is hoped that each writer will participate each month, but it is not required. All letters are to be mailed or delivered to NWHP at 201 West Liberty, PO Box 50428, Reno NV 89513. The original letters will be placed in Special Collections at the University of Nevada, Reno, Nevada with copies in the Jean Ford Research Center at the NWHP in Reno and in Las Vegas.

From the letters received each month, a few will be selected to be published on the web sites of the NWHP and the Nevada State Library and Archives. There is no deadline for submitting letters; they will be accepted at any time during the project. However, only those letters received during the topic month will be considered for publishing. For example, the October topic is family genealogy, so only letters on family genealogy received in October will be considered for publication. Additionally, excerpts from Barbara Vucanovich's book of memoirs will also be published each month. If you are interested in obtaining the forms for the letters to participate in the project or in seeing the excerpts from Vucanovich's letters and the letters from other Nevada women, look at www.clan.lib.nv.us and www.unr.edu/wrc/nwhp.


