DID YOU KNOW ??

NOTE OF IMPORTANCE IN REFERRING TO DATES IN YOUR GENEALOGY - -

From March 25, 1582 to the year 1751 inclusive, the first day of the year began on the 25th of March. So, in other words, all dates from January 1 to March 24 between the years of 1583 and 1751 inclusive should bear or carry the double year, such as, for instance we have:

December 31, 1719

January 1, 1719/20

and right on through to

March 24, 1719/20

March 25, 1720

The calendar then changed so that the first of the year began on January 1, and read as follows:

December 31, 1751

January 1, 1752

at this time, showing only the single year. This applied to all official documents, church records, etc.

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DID YOU KNOW ??

Almost every genealogist is familiar with the Federal Population Schedule, more commonly called the "Census", and some of you may have also used the Slave Schedules and the Mortality Schedules, but did you know there is even more? Starting with the 1850 Federal Population Schedule, they also took a Farm Schedule, a Professional Schedule, etc. If you had an ancestor who was a farmer in 1850 or later, you can get a copy of this schedule and it will give you all kinds of information about this man, such as: how many acres he farmed, the crops he raised, the farm equipment he owned, etc.

In order to get this information, you must first find your ancestor on the population schedule and record all the information that identifies him, such as County, Township, Post Office, page number, house number, family number, and line of which his name is entered. Then, with this information at hand, you write to the National Archives in Washington D. C., for the information that was recorded on the farm schedule for that same census year. You would do the same if he were a professional man, but also say what his profession was. Since the early 1982 cutbacks in services at the Archives, you may have to wait a while, and there will be a charge, but the information you gain will be worth it.

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DID YOU KNOW ??

That every male between the ages of 18 and 45 were required to register for the draft during World War I, whether he served or not. There are over 24,000 draft registrations on file in the Archives Branch located at: Federal Records Center, G.S.A., 1557 St. Joseph Avenue, East Point, Georgia 30044. These files are filed by state and then by draft board, so if you request copies of the registration files, send your ancestor's name, the town, county, and state where he would have filed, and a check in the amount of \$5.00.

DID YOU KNOW ??

In the numbering of your pedigree charts, there is a simple formula that you can use to locate the proper extension or continuation numbers to put on the right hand side of the chart.

If you are working with a 4 generation chart (with 15 names), you simply take the chart number you are working from times 8 and subtract 6. The number you come up with in the answer is then the first extension on the right hand side of the next chart of that same family line.

If you are working on the standard L.D.S. chart (31 names on the chart), you take the chart number times 16 minus 14.

The charts I work on are 6 generation with 63 names, so the formula for those charts are: Chart number X 32 - 29.

So, no matter how many charts you may want to skip for lack of information, you will always have the right number on the charts you are using and will not have to go back and renumber when you fill in more charts.

NATIONAL ARCHIVES AND RECORDS SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

CHANGES IN PROCESSING REQUESTS FOR COPIES OF VETERANS' RECORDS AND PASSENGER ARRIVAL RECORDS:

Effective 1 May, 1984, all requests for copies of military service records or passenger arrival records must be submitted on NATF Forms 80 and 81, respectively. Prior versions of these forms will not be accepted for processing, (Old numbers Form 26 and Form 40). All forms other than the new NATF forms 80 and 81 will be returned.

A change in payment policies will also take effect on 1 May 1984. NARS has in the past required that payment accompany requests for copies of veterans records and passenger arrival records. After 1 May 1984, payment should not be sent with the new forms. NARS will research the request, prepare copies of any records located, and HOLD THE COPIES FOR 30 DAYS or until payment is received, whichever comes sooner. As soon as records are located and copied, researchers will receive a hill and instructions on returning their remittances.

Researchers should also submit a separate NATF form 80 for each file (pension, or bounty-land, or compiled military service) desired. Previously researchers could ask for multiple files on one form. This change is designed to facilitate processing by the National Archives. Any one interested in obtaining copies of the NATF forms 80 or 81 may do so by writing to the following office:

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CYRUS KILBURN

Son of David and Lucy (PINGREE) KILBURN, Cyrus was born 18 Oct 1800, in Lunenburg, Worcester Co. MA.

He married Abigail, daughter of John and Mary (PROUTY) BILLINGS 2 June 1825, in Lunenburg. They were the parents of 12 children, 9 of whom lived to maturity.

Three sons, David Nelson (my ancestor), Charles and Henry Prescott, fought in the Civil War on the Union side. David Nelson suffered no injury, but his brother Charles was wounded at Whitehall, NC, 16 Dec 1862. Henry Prescott was killed at Fort Hudson, LA, 2 June 1863.

During his lifetime, Cyrus was a schoolteacher, farmer, school committee man. Notary Public, Justice of the Peace, and surveyor.

On 1 March 1830, the General Court ordered a survey of the town of Lunenburg; Cyrus was chosen for the job. He was to survey and make a map of the town. Booklets were made containing the map and a list of the names of the owners of the homesteads, and these were sold in local stores for 12½ each. The maps (of which I have one) are dated 1834. The survey was so accurate that no boundary lines have ever been found to be wrong.

Cyrus died 29 Nov 1882, in Lunenburg. His portrait hangs in the Lunenburg Historical Society.

Cyrus is my 3rd great-grandfather. (Anyone wishing to look at the map, which is quite large, is welcome to contact me at 649-6530.)

The Historic Emigration Office, newly established at the Museum of Hamburg History, has access to 5 million names from passenger lists of people who left for America via Hamburg between 1850 and 1914.

These passenger lists have previously been kept at the State Archives, where inquiries were answered by employees as their duties permitted. Now two full-time researchers will help Americans find out about their ancestors.

Hamburg was one of the two German port cities, (the other being Bremen), which had societies interested in caring for the emigrants, many of whom were destitute, and had to wait many weeks for passage to America. These societies, and subsequent legislation to protect emigrants, cared for as many as 5,000 at a time. It also required ship's agents to keep lists of those leaving Hamburg on a particular steamer. (Lists from Bremen were destroyed.)

The lists contain the following information:

The husband's name, plus that of his wife, children and other family members.

Ages, occupations or professions when applicable, and last place of residence before emigration.

Being to fragile to be handled frequently, the original lists have been placed on 274 rolls of microfilm. Any American who knows the name and year of emigration of an ancestor, may make inquiries in person or by mail at the Historic Emigration Office. There is a \$30.00 fee for processing an inquiry, plus an additional \$10.00 for each additional year searched. NEW RESEARCH AIDS FOR LDS BRANCH LIBRARIES

The Genealogical Society is developing new research tools and services to help all patrons using the LDS Branch Genealogical Libraries. These tools and services are listed below with a brief description and are scheduled to be available to researchers at various times this year. There may be some delay due to the tremendous amount of work involved, but watch for them to come out soon.

ACCELERATED INDEXING SYSTEMS (AIS) DATABASE - The Genealogical Department has obtained the rights to duplicate the entire AIS database and distribute it on microfiche to the branch libraries. Library patrons, for example, will now be able to search the indexes for the entire United States, arranged in one alphabet for the selected time periods, such as the 1790 - 1850 Censuses, which heretofore were published by state in state books. Expected Availability: January 1984.

GENEALOGICAL LIBRARY CATALOG (GLC) - The GLC lists and describes the records of the Main Library in Salt Lake City. It is used by the Branch Genealogical Libraries to order microfilm and microfiche. The 1984 edition will be on approximately 1,230 microfiche and will have nearly twice the number of entries as the 1981 edition. Expected Availability: February 1984.

1910 CENSUS OF THE UNITED STATES will become available through the Branch Libraries from Salt Lake upon receipt and completion of the cataloging of the 1984 Edition of the GLC. Reason: The register containing the film numbers of the individual rolls of film is available only on microfiche, and is included as part of the 1984 GLC.

1,000 HEAVILY-USED BOOKS ON MICROFICHE - Approximately 1,000 of the Main Library's most heavily-used reference books, research sources, gazetteers and other valuable resources will be reproduced on microfiche for distribution to the branch libraries. These have previously been available only at the Main Library. This collection of resources will be on approximately 2,000 microfiche. Expected Availability: July '84

INTERNATIONAL GENEALOGICAL INDEX (IGI) - The 1984 edition will include an estimated 82.5 million names, as compared to the 67 million names in the 1981 edition. The 1984 edition will include approximately 6,700 microfiche. Expected Availability: October 1984.

THE FAMILY REGISTRY - The Family Registry is a new service designed to help coordinate genealogical research efforts and thereby avoid unnecessary duplication of time and expense. Active researchers and family organizations can use this file to register information about their genealogical research activities. Later, others searching the file can learn of these activities and support, rather than duplicate, them. Registration forms and brochures will be available from the Branch Genealogical Libraries. The Registry and accompanying index will be distributed on microfiche. Expected Availability: Registration beginning January 1984; Inquiry beginning Mid-1984.

THE FAMILY REGISTRY

C.C.N.G.S. members recently received two copies of a form put out by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints titled "Research Coordination Registration." The form is to be used for a new Genealogical Department program named FAMILY REGISTRY. If you are not already aware of this program, please take the time to find out, as it may be of tremendous assistance to your research.

WHAT IS THE FAMILY REGISTRY? It is a service available to both LDS and non-LDS active genealogical researchers. Its goal is to put researchers with common ancestry in touch with one another so that they may support one another, rather than duplicate research efforts. It will also include FAMILY ORGANIZATIONS.

HOW DOES IT WORK? Individual researchers and family organizations are invited to register their ancestral lines by completing the registry forms and submitting them to the Genealogical Library or through one of its branches.

Microfiche copies of the registration forms and an index will be available for searching at the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City and at the branch libraries. Researchers may then make contact with others searching their lines or with family organizations of interest.

WHO SHOULD REGISTER? All ACTIVE researchers should register the names of deceased ancestors that they are currently researching. Register as many lines as you are now working on and are willing to correspond about.

Family Organizations should also register so that others may coordinate research efforts with them. This includes Ancestral as well as Surname Organizations.

HOW TO REGISTER? Obtain registration forms from the local Branch Genealogical Library or from the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City. You may also write for forms at the following address:

WHAT DOES IT COST? Both registration and inquiry services are free.

HOW TO USE THE FAMILY REGISTRY? The microfiche copies of the registration forms and the index will be available for searching at the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City and at local Branch Genealogical Libraries. Search the alphabetical index for your surnames. Then write or contact the individual or organization found.

WHAT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY? If you register your surnames or your family organization, you are expected to respond to those who contact you. Whenever you write to a registrant, remember to include a self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE). Be prepared to reimburse registrants for photocopy expenses if you request information.

The FAMILY REGISTRY is NOT intended for commercial purposes and users are requested to abide by this.

The FAMILY REGISTRY and its index should be available in the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City and its branch genealogical libraries by mid-1984.
