PRESIDENT'S PEN

As most of you know, I was lucky enough to be able to take a threeweek genealogical vacation this summer, visiting Washington D.C., West Virginia, Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania.

While staying in Cumberland, MD with my husband's great aunt, a very

strange occurence took place.

In the 1860 census for Allegany Co. MD, town of Frostburg, I had located a Jacob FOLK, whom I thought might prove to be my husband's great-great grandfather. As he was in his 60's, it seemed likely he might be buried there.

Frostburg being within a few miles of Cumberland, I called the only cemetary listed for that town in the local directory. The lady who answered my call was able to tell me that there was a FOLK plot, and that it was in the eldest part, dating back to the 1860's. Beyond this she could tell me nothing, as the cemetary had changed hands in the 1950's and the earlier records were sketchy. She advised me to visit the cemetary and to have the caretaker show me the plot.

Following her advise, we drove to Frostburg Memorial Cemetary, which was enormous. It wasn't hard to find the caretaker, as the cemetary was practically deserted except for him and his work crew. I gave him the plot number, and he asked me to follow his truck.

After showing me the graves, he left, and I set about recording the information from the headstones, even though they were not the ones I was seeking. Deciding to take pictures also, I returned my briefcase to the car and got my camera.

As I was lining up my third shot, a voice said, "Perhaps you'd like to take mine also." Turning quickly around, I saw a man standing there watching me.

As I was to find out, this was Charles FOLK, age 70 -- and I had been taking pictures of the graves of his parents and two brothers. We talked for quite a while, and he was able to give me the name of a man in Frostburg, also doing research on the FOLK family.

In retrospect, the strangeness of this chance meeting has not worn off. Fifteen minutes earlier, or two minutes later, and we would have passed each other as strangers, with perhaps a casual nod in greeting......



JOSEPH HINKLE

I was surprised to receive a letter from Mrs. Bert Harter who has taken the responsibility of updating the Henckel (Hinkle) Genealogy.

My original letter was to the publisher inquiring on how I could purchase a copy of The Henkel Memorial: A Serial Publication Devoted to Collecting and Preserving the History Of The Rev. Anthony Jacob Henkel, Known in History as Rev. Gerhart Henkel, An Friled Lutheran Clergyman Who Came From Germany to Pennsylvania in 1717, one of the Founders Of His Church in America and Father of A Great and Honorable Posterity; York, 1910.

My mother's name was Elva Katherine Hinkle. My grandfather (her father) was Orvin Thomas Hinkle born March 11, 1894. He married Lelia Margaret Baker on June 16, 1912. She passed away on Christmas Eve, 1957 and was buried in Memorial Park Cemetary in Dayton Ohio on December 27, 1957. He passed away January 10, 1977 in Miami, Florida.

My first day at the LDS Library here in Las Vegas I located an updated version of <u>The Henckel Genealogy: 1500-1960</u>, Published 1964. I was very surprised to find this book in the LDS Library. I never saw a copy of this book as all I had was the front sheet from the 1910 version that had been passed down through our family. My mother had looked several times in Libraries for the book to no avail.

I located my great grandfather's family on page 990, #6236-13-5 George L. Hinkle born June 12, 1858; died August 6, 1907, married December 23, 1880 to Nancy A.Bratton born in September 1858; died December 31, 1907, issue eight (8) children. Occupation-farming.

I know this to be true as our family have the recorded births in their original handwriting in the family records.

Mrs. Bert Harter assured me that my lineage was correct up to #623 Joseph Hinkle. She was also kind enough to send me the following story of his encounter with the indians.

^{*}Henkle, Hinkle, Henckel, Hinckle..various spellings of surname.

I had a researcher check records in Hamilton County, Ohio for anything on Joseph Hinkle. The early records are not complete and since Joseph was killed so early it is very difficult to find factual information. As I have stated before, when a settler on the frontier was killed by Indians, the stories vary wildly.

Each account of the killing of Joseph Hinkle gives a DIFFERENT date, but the most important discovery is that the Covalt party (to include Joseph Hinkle) came to Ohio Territory from BEDFORD, County, Pennsylvania, not from Lancaster County. Bedford County borders Allegany County, Maryland, and surely suggests a Maryland migration.

But to continue with the Ohio research, I have copies of several published historical accounts of the killing of Joseph Hinkle and will copy parts from one written by Mary, daughter of Capt. Abraham Covalt, born 1774, she married in 1792 Joseph Jones by Rev. John Smith, Baptist, the same minister who performed the marriage of Widow Hinkle to Gabriel Hutchings.

REMINISCENCES OF EARLY DAYS*

I will call attention of the reader to the early days of 1788. The 1st day of January of that year, I left Pennsylvania for Ohio, then called Indian Country, in company of Captain Covalt (who was my father) and seven other families: they were Robert McKinney, J. Pittman, J. Webb, J. Hutches, David Smith, Z. Hinkle, T. Covalt, and their families....We landed at Columbia on 19th of January....A fort was soon erected, which consisted of seventeen dwelling houses and four block houses. It was called Covalt's Fort...My father soon built a mill; he brought the mill stones (from Pennsylvania) and a millwright, whose name was Hinkle...

We were not molested again until March of 1789, when they again invaded the Little Miami Valley. Captain Covalt wishing to live a more retired life, had got timber ready for his house,

but the farming (sic,?framing) was not completed. He, with two of his sons and Joseph Hinkle, were making shingles when they were attacked by the Indians. Hinkle was not shot, but his head was half cut off with the tomahawk and then scalped. Captain Covalt was wounded in two places; one ball passed through his breast, the other through his arm. He told his sons to make their way to the fort. . . .

Captain Covalt was born in New Jersey, near Great Egg Harbor . . . he married Lois Pendleton by Rev. Mr. Fuller at Bonbrook, N. J. After his marriage he moved to Bedford County, Pennsylvania . . . served in Revolutionary War.

*Centennial History of Settlement of Cincinnati, Columbia and North Bend by Dr. A. E. Jones (1888), pp. 61-67. Mrs. Jones wrote this story but it was not published until after her death. She was 15 years old and in the fort when the attack took place.

There is a tradition in the family of Asa Hinkle that his father Joseph was killed one month before Asa's 15th birthday (March 1793), and in the family of Joseph that it was 1792. That he was killed by Indians seem certain, the date of his death is not really important. Our problem is to find his parents. It seems certain that he is not the son of Anthony Hinkle. Mrs. Jones says family of Z. Hinkle, she may have meant Ziba, son of Joseph, or did she mean Z. Hinkle was father of Joseph?
