EARTHQUAKE OF 1906 NEWS

SAN FRANCISCO EARTHQUAKE (18 April 1906) - Mrs. Gladys Hansen, San Francisco Archivist has made a thorough search of all available records regarding the San Francisco earthquake, and her records show 826 known dead, much higher than the 478 given by the 1907 Board of Supervisors. She believes this figure is still much too low. If you have any knowledge of any person killed in the 1906 disaster, please write to her with what information you have. The names of the dead will be entered in the official roster in the Public Library, available to researchers of history and genealogy.

This action was for settlement purposes only and did not constitute any admission by these companies that it had violated the law.

So, just remember that - there are people out there who will do anything to part you from your money. If you have any questions regarding such advertisements in the mail, write and ask those questions, and remember to send a S.A.S.E. when asking for any help or information.



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A Las Vegas Cemetary

This cemetary is located between Main Street and Las Vegas Bivd., North (5th St.), west of Foremaster Lane. It was catalogued on October 13, 1984 by members of the Clark County Nevada Genealogical Society.

In spite of it's fairly recent use (late 1960's), there is much information lacking about this cemetary. It does not seem to have been planned - the graves aren't in any particular order. The funeral home who maintained it - Sunset Funeral Chapel - abandoned it and "left the country". No one cares for it - occasionally it is cleaned up as a service project by some local group.

During the cataloguing process, different persons covered different areas of the cemetary, copying the information from the stones or plaques onto index cards. The catalog number refers simply to one of the grave plots in a small area catalogued by a person. Comments and information from the cataloguer and/or typist are included in parentheses.

CCNGS is currently attempting to obtain more statistical information about the persons who are buried here. If and when it is obtained, we will associate it with the following information and publish it in a later edition of The Prospector.

NOTE: Since there is no particular order to the placement of graves, names have been listed in alphabetical order.

DID YOU KNOW?

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION - If you would like to obtain a copy of the application file for someone who applied for Social Security, you must submit a photocopy of the death certificate of the individual concerned. Address your inquiry to your local Social Security Office; they will forward your request to the main office. Include the name and social security number (SSN) of the person. State that you make the request under the F.O.I./P.A. (Freedom of Information/Privacy Act) which permits release of the data once an individual is deceased. Ask for a photocopy of the original application for the SSN. Original applications are being computerized by the Social Security Administration. You will receive either a photocopy of the original application or a photocopy of the computerized version. Included will be the name, names of parents, date and exact place of birth, residence, place of employment, and the original has your relative's signature. There is no cost for this service. Usually exact places of birth are given even for foreign births.

According to the information brochure which I wrote for, member-ship was to include the following:

- 1. The JOURNAL, published quarterly. [My first issue was not delivered until 9 June 1984 -- the second issue arrived the same day.]
- 2. The NEWSLETTER, published quarterly. [I have only rec'd two for the entire year.]
- 3. Inter-library loan of MoSGA books. [A letter needed to be sent to the library for a list of available titles -- I sent the letter, but have never received the list.] I have, to date, sent four letters complaining of the service, or perhaps I ought to say, the lack of it. My third letter invoked a response from the President, Stuart Purvines, dated 5 July 1984, stating that he wished to straighten out the problem. My letter to him has yet to be acted upon.

GRETCHEN CHRISTINE SCHROEDER BORCHERS

July 4,1984 was the first day of the rest of my life. I was visitmy mother in Stockton, Mo. for the annual family reunion with my sister
and brothers, when my mother showed me a book published in 1915 about
my mother's family tree dating back to the first Hoffman that arrived
in the USA in 1750. I was astonished! I had no idea that ordinary people
like me had a book written about their ancestors. Our family had never
been close. I'd only seen my uncles a few times when I was young. Then
I moved 1500 miles from home and just lost contact with everyone. Now
all of a sudden I was part of a long continuing line of family. I was
intranced! Mother told me my first cousin whom I hadn't seen since I
was 18 and he was 12 was interested in genealogy. She didn't even have
his address or phone number, but did know the town he lived in. I called
him one Sunday and he told me he had some information that he would send
me and that he was happy to hear of my interest in genealogy. He also
had the name of a very distant cousin that lived right here in las Vegas.

Two weeks later I received a large envelope in the mail. Excerpts of a different book published in 1955 about another of my mother's family, the Saye family, plus the name and phone number of the cousin. This new book traced the Saye family back to 1750 also, and MY NAME WAS THERE! MY NAME! Published in a book! A book that had been in existence since 1955 and I didn't even know that it existed! I was amazed! Elated! My heart stopped! Then it pounded! I felt like jumping to the roof of the house and shouting: Look at me! I'm a Real People! a VIP! I'm some one, I'm in a book!

And there was the name of the cousin so close, just a phone away. I called immediately. She was as excited as I was when I told her who I was. She had lived here in Las Vegas since 1963 and I had lived here since 1958 and we never knew the other one existed. She had been studying her family tree since 1975 and had no idea; a member of the family lived so close. We got together the next day. She talked of her goal of creating a family association to try to bring the family closer together. She said that there were only 200-250 related families in the USA. We talked of the book and I told her I felt we should try to get it reprinted to enable more people to be aware of their roots. We agreed to start together to create a family association with that goal in mind; to republish the E.H.Saye book with the hope of gathering enough interested people to perhaps make a new book, bring the material up to date.

We started working on our first inquiry. In 1975, Pat had been contacted by Beatrice Bayley, who had sent her a book with information on how to start tracing her family tree and also names and addresses of Sayes all over the USA. Pat had sent out a letter in 1981 to all the names and had gotted responses from 30-40 people. These were the people we now contacted. We told them of our plan to gather people together in an association to promote the republish ing of the E.H.Saye book.

People started responding. It was wonderful! We had letters from people who were also studying genealogy and had a lot of information. One: Don Paul Saye of Foster City, Ca. had been studying the relation to the Saye family in England. It seems that William the Conqueror had awarded the title of Lord to a William De Saye from Normandy, who had provided him with arms and serfs to fight the battles in England in 1066. The title Lord Saye was passed down from father to son till 1399 at which time there was no male heir so the title went to an aunt who was married to a Fiennes and so the title of Lord Saye passed out of the family Saye to the family Fiennes. However Don Paul Saye feels if we researched enough we would be able to trace the family Saye here in the USA back to a second son, somewhere between 1066-1399.

Another: Fielding Henry Saye of Santa Rosa, Ca. has been studying a Col Richard Saye 1801-1887 who was a very coloful figure. Born in Bolivar, Mo where he helped survey a new county, Greene County, Mo., he then followed the adventurers that went to California for the gold rush

of 1849 and ran cattle from Utah to Calif. till he died there in Calif. His grave site had been lost to memory of the Saye family till Fielding happened to find it earlier this year through careful deduction and painstaking research.

Pat found some information on starting a family association in a genealogy book and we drew up a charter and by-laws to send to the Secretary of State of Nevada to have a non-profit corporation so we can recieve money for the purpose of contacting Sayes all over the USA, to receive andrecord the information they send and compile it all so we can publish a book using the E.H.Saye book for a base and bring it up date and correct some errors that have been found in it. Wealso hope to use more pictures, maps, copies of official documents, anything to make the book more informative and alive.

I feel in this time of separated families and the constant fear of the bomb, it is a good way to give people a feeling of closeness and continuity in their lives, a feeling of hope for the future from finding a link with the past.
