#### GENEALOGICAL INFORMATION IN THE W.P.A. INTERVIEWS

Among the W.P.A. projects during the years 1936-1938, the W.P.A. employed many local residents to conduct interviews of the pioneers in their counties. These interviews vary widely as each person working on these projects more or less did their own thing. Each state also did their own thing with the binding, indexing, etc. Some states have large collections and some only fill one or two file drawers. They may also be filed as "W.P.A. Projects" or as "[Name of interviewer] Collection." Each state could be different.

Do not overlook this material in your genealogical searching. It is possible a relative may have been interviewed or gave information on one of your ancestors. Remember, these are not documented, proven family trees but are oral histories that are just as important to many researchers.

#### GENEALOGY AND LOCAL HISTORY BOOKS TO BE AVAILABLE THROUGHOUT THE USA

The Mid-Continent Public Library System, together with the American Family Records Association, announce establishment of a new program whereby genealogical and local history books will be placed in the circulating collection of the Mid-Continent Public Library (MCPL) System's North Independence Branch. Such books have historically been kept in the reference collections in most libraries where they do not circulate. Placing such books in the circulating collection of the North Independence Branch Library will permit them to be available to library patrons throughout the United States by means of the long established interlibrary loan program.

Genealogical and local history books will primarily be obtained by the American Family Records Association (AFRA) through donations to the collection and solicitation. After receipt of new books, they will first be reviewed for publication in AFRA's quarterly journal, "Family Records, TODAY". Soft-cover books will be hardbound to enhance storage on shelves and handling by the reader. The books will then be cataloged by MCPL into the Online Computer Library Center (OCLC) which is located at Dublin, Ohio. Besides listing the author and title, OCLC lists the location of books. Some 3000 libraries subscribe to OCLC's computerized catalog service.

After cataloging by OCLC, the books will be placed on the circulating shelves of the North Independence Branch Library for use by local patrons and by distant patrons through interlibrary loan. New additions to the listing of the MCPL collection will be published in AFRA's quarterly publication, "Family Records, TODAY".

Strong support of the program by the public is anticipated. This collection will make it possible for handicapped and shut-in persons to pursue the study of genealogy at home. It is expected that the collection will grow to 50,000 volumes in 20 years.

#### HOUSE OF EMIGRANTS - THE AMERICAN DREAM

Each year the "Dream of America" draws thousands of visitors from the United States to southern Sweden.

Some come to a terra cotta-colored brick building overlooking a small lake in Vaxjo (pronounced veck-sher), a city of about 50,000. The building, identified only by the words "Utvandrarnaus hus" (the House of Emigrants), holds a collection that is unique in all the world. Most visitors to the House of Emigrants probably are seeking their roots, since the building houses an immense amount of information on the great Swedish emigration to America that took place between 1850 and 1930. During that period 1.3 million people -- more than one-fourth of the population -- left Sweden to find a new life in America.

Strictly speaking, the House of Emigrants is not a museum, but it devotes a great deal of space to exhibits. A permanent exhibition, titled "The Dream of America," tells the stories in pictures and in words taken from emigrants' letters, of many who left Sweden bound for America. Text is displayed in Swedish and English. Narrative tapes in several languages can be heard through earphones.

One room displays research material and original manuscripts of author Vilhelm Hoberg, famous in Sweden for his series of novels about the emigrants. Other exhibitions include sculpture, paintings, models, and even a tribute to Swedish-American astronaut Edwin Aldrin, who walked on the moon in 1969.

Researchers from around the world take advantage of the associated Emigrant Institute, which holds Europe's largest archives and library with an emigrant theme. Contained are more than 2,000 American church books and club records on microfilm in addition to a research library of more than 25,000 volumes.

The second Sunday in August each year is devoted to "Minnesota Day," featuring a folk festival.

SWEDISH SURNAMES Almost half of the people in Sweden share 35 surnames. To alleviate this bureaucrat's nightmare the Swedish government set up a special name office to create and distribute new surnames. The names of Swedish towns and places are fed into a computer that mixes up the names to make new ones. About 20,000 new Swedish surnames have been created this way, and about 5000 Swedes ask the office for new surnames each year. (San Joaquin Gen Soc Newsletter May/Aug 1987)

# Bits n Pieces

SELECTIVE SERVICE: The National Archives and Records Service, 1559 St. Joseph Ave., East Point, GA 30344, has more than 24,000,000 World War I Selective Service records. To obtain copy of an individual's registration you must provide his full name and the city, and county of his residence at the time of registration. In large cities such as Chicago, you must also provide the street address.

ANCESTRY OR GENEALOGY? An ancestry begins with a single individual and traces back in time to include the male and female lines of that person's ancestors. A genealogy begins with a single ancestor and traces forward in time to include all descendants to the present time.

**POLL BOOKS** show proof of residency in a county, it lists eligible voters (male adults of voting age) which may help pinpoint dates of immigration into a county even if your ancestors did not own land.

FREE MICROFILMING OF YOUR FAMILY HISTORY: The Genealogical Library of Salt Lake City will microfilm for individuals free, providing your data is well organized. The Library will return your material with a complimentary microfilm. They reserve the right to decide whether they wish to add it to their collection and can not make any promise or guarantee until they see the material. (Cousins et cousines, V 9 #4.)

WARNING:THEY ARE EVERY WHERE! From The Federation of Family History Societies (G.A.S. is a member.) 'Newsflash' in England we hear, "Our attention has been drawn to a 'small-ad' entitled 'ANCESTRY TRACING' purporting to offer interesting work. It might be expected that the work would be connected with family history - be careful - from two follow-up leaflets we have seen from a firm called Ancestral Heritage Publishing Co., Devon it appears that the bulk of the work is concerned with envelope addressing and leaflet distributing.

ENGLISH INTEREST: A comprehensive list of most commonly used books, microfilms, and microfiche in the British Reference Section of the LDS Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City. Available through most Branch Libraries.

IRISH INTEREST: The County Carlow Heritage Society, 4 Kennedy Street, Carlow, Ireland, is currently compiling genealogical data from Carlow and surrounding counties. The project is funded by the Dept. of Labor Youth Employment Levy on a six-month basis; their long-term goal is establishment of a permanent computerized genealogical service in their area. #### OFFICIAL DOCUMENTS

SERVICE RECORDS - Military service records give very little genealogical information. There is an index of all Revolutionary War soldiers. There are also many indexes of soldiers from individual states. You can find microfilm copies of the indexes in the Genealogical Library. Many of the original military service records are available here, but are only indexed by commanding officer. Details on these records are listed in <u>U.S. Military Records: Revolutionary War to 1860</u> located on the reference tables in front of the U.S./Canada reference counter. If you have found your veteran in the indexes, but are unable to locate him in the records here, write to Military Service Branch (NNMS), National Archives and Records Service, 8th and Pennsylvania Ave. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20408. Request Form 80.

PENSION & BOUNTY LAND RECORDS - The names of all soldiers or widows who applied for pensions or bounty land warrants are indexed in the book <u>Index of Revolutionary War</u> <u>Pension Applications in the National Archives</u>. It is located on the tables in front of the U.S./Canada reference counter.

To examine microfilmed pension records, consult U.S. Military Records: Revolutionary War to 1860. These pension files often contain valuable information.

MILITIA LISTS, PAY RECORDS, ETC. - The U.S. Army was not officially organized until after the war began. Many men fought in local militia units. The records of the units may have been lost or destroyed, but some have been preserved in local historical societies, county offices, or state archives. Check published inventories or write to a local government office to see if any additional records on your ancestor are 'ailable. You can find records in the Genealogical Library by checking the library atalogs under STATE - MILITARY RECORDS or STATE - COUNTY - MILITARY RECORDS.

#### SECONDARY SOURCES

DAR PATRIOT INDEX - The Daughters of the American Revolution require that members submit proof of descent from a revolutionary soldier. The names of all of the soldiers whose service has been used to prove eligibility for the DAR have been indexed in the DAR Patriot Index. The two-volume index is located on the reference tables in front of the U.S./Canada reference counter.

DAR LINEAGE BOOKS - If a soldier's name is listed in the DAR Patriot Index, an abstract of the application may be published in the DAR Lineage Books (973 D2d). The Index of the Rolls of Honor in the Lineage Books of the NSDAR is located nearby. If you would like a copy of the original membership application, send \$3.00 to Treasurer General, NSDAR, 1776 D Street N.W., Washington, D.C. 20006. You will probably have more success obtaining copies if you have a society member request them for you.

SAR RECORDS - Over 100,000 application papers for the Sons of the American Revolution are available on microfilm. These papers show documented lineages for SAR members. Consult the U.S. Lineage Societies Register for library numbers. This register will also describe the rosters and lineage books for individual states.

DAR SUPPLEMENTAL PAPERS - Many papers from local chapters, "grandparent forms", and other family records from the DAR are available on microfilm. Consult the U.S. Lineage Societies Register in the U.S./Canada reference area for more details.

PUBLISHED RECORDS - Many rosters of soldiers, lists of veteran burials, and compilations biographical data have been published. Consult the book <u>Published U.S. Military</u> <u>Sources in the Genealogical Library</u> on the tables in front of the U.S./Canada reference counter.



#### UNION TROOPS

In addition to the Northern States, every other state except South Carolina supplied troops to the Union Army.

SERVICE RECORDS - Military service records give very little genealogical information on a soldier or his family. There is no master index to the names of all the soldiers in the Union Army. You must know the state where an individual enlisted in order to use the service records. For additional information and our library's microfilm numbers, consult U.S. Military Records: Civil War on the tables directly in front of the reference counter. The Library has the Union service indexes, but few actual service records. Most of these records are at the National Archives.

PENSION RECORDS - The Federal Government issued pensions to soldiers who met the established criteria. Pension files may include information on a soldier's military service, family members, places of residence, and other genealogical information.

Although the pensions have not been microfilmed, the index is available in the Genealogical Library. The microfilm numbers are listed in U.S. Military Records: Civil War which is located on the tables directly in front of the reference counter. In order to obtain copies of a pension record and/or service records request NATF Form 80 from Reference Services Branch (NNIR), National Archives and Records Service, 8th and Pennsylvania Ave. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20408.

PUBLISHED RECORDS - Many rosters of soldiers, lists of veteran burials, and compilations of biographical data have been published. Consult the book <u>Published U.S.</u> <u>Military Sources in the Genealogical Library</u> on the tables directly in front of the reference counter. The book contains a state-by-state list of military books available in the Genealogical Library.

#### CONFEDERATE TROOPS

SERVICE RECORDS - Service records give very little genealogical information on a soldier or his family. They usually show the soldier's name and the name of the units he served in.

There is a master index to all Confederate soldiers plus indexes of soldiers in each state. For additional information and library microfilm numbers, consult U.S. Military Records: Civil War on the tables directly in front of the reference counter. The Genealogical Library has the Confederate indexes, but few actual service records. To obtain copies of the service records, request NATF Form 80 from Reference Services Branch (NNIR), National Archives and Records Service, 8th and Pennsylvania Ave. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20408.

PENSION RECORDS - The Federal Government refused to issue a pension to any soldier who would not take an oath of allegiance to the Union. In an effort to compensate disabled veterans or widows, most of the southern states began paying pensions to Confederate veterans from state funds. Pension files may include information on a soldier's military service, family members, and places of residence.

You must know the state of residence of a veteran after the War in order to locate his pension record. The microfilm numbers and additional information on the records from each state are listed in <u>U.S. Military Records: Civil War</u>.

PUBLISHED RECORDS - Many rosters of soldiers, lists of veteran burials, and compilations of biographical data have been published. Consult the book <u>Published U.S.</u> <u>Military Sources in the Genealogical Library</u> on the tables directly in front of the reference counter. The book contains a state-by-state list of military books available in the Genealogical Library.
