



Mesa, Arizona Family History Center a Must Stop

During a recent business trip to Phoenix, I took some time to visit one of the three Family History Centers in the area. Fortunately, the closest center to where my business was turned out to be the best--that was the center in Mesa, located in the southeast area of metro Phoenix.

It turns out there are 7 multi-regional Family History Centers within the larger group of over 600 centers. These are the larger centers which serve several stakes maintaining larger collections of books and films. Our own Las Vegas FHC is one of the 7 along with Los Angeles, Oakland, Sacramento, Ogden, and Mesa.

To give you an idea of the size and scope of the library, consider the following statistics:

films - Los	Angeles	50,000	Las Vegas	5,000	Mesa	28,000
books -	n	5,000	N	5,000	*	16,000

They have 39 microfilm readers and 20 microfiche viewers which are used by between 3700 and 5300 patrons each month. It seems the winter months are the busiest for them. Evidently a lot of snowbirds prefer to read films in Phoenix instead of shoveling snow back home.

The Mesa FHC has been in operation for over 35 years and developed a training program for its volunteers which lasts 2 months. They are very well staffed with about 15 volunteers during each of their 2 shift operations.

They are also very involved with the Personal Ancestry File software, by offering training classes costing \$15 for 2 three hour classes and having 3 computers available for rental at the center. They have given training to over 300 PAF users in the area.

As for myself, I found several items in several books. A MUST stop!

This popular midwest newspaper, circulation 125,000, has in their Sunday edition a column entitled "Michiana Roots". It offers a free query service to anyone looking for information in the Indiana, Michigan and Illinois area. Send your query to the attention of column at the above address. The column also gives advice about researching as well as covering events of genealogical significance. The first four years of the column are available in book form for \$15.95 at the same address. PS. If anyone does use their service, please let us know how effective it was.


Sunday World-Herald, PO Box 4244, Omaha, NB 68104

Another midwestern paper, the World-Herald serves Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, and Missouri. Lesta Westmore writes the column entitled "Family Trails". It is a how-to column which is geared towards helping researchers tracing their ancestors in the 4 state area. Queries may be published several weeks after they are received. However, the query should focus on a specific person including a date and residence within the readership area.

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Oklahoma will celebrate the Land Run of 1889

The Oklahoma Genealogical Society will hold a three day conference on June 8 to 10, 1989 in Oklahoma City as one of the major events planned to recognize the historic Oklahoma Land Rush. They will hold 44 lecture sessions, four concurrently, which will be designed for both the novice and the experienced researcher. Topics will focus on both genealogical and historical research in Oklahoma as well as American Indian genealogy and records.

Very early records found in Sumner County, Tenn.

The following information is from a newspaper article, paper unknown, by J.R. Williamson, Nashville, March 1988.

About 265 boxes of mostly pre-Civil War records dating back to 17.42 were found stored away in two archives by Shirley Wilson. With the help of Linda Carpenter, the records are being cataloged and indexed. The records will be made available for researching in Summer County.

Some of the records are as follows:

- -poll tax books of 1816-1822 listing every family, each year in Sumner
- -Bills of sale of slaves from 1840 to 1860
- -800 original wills
- -census records for 1830, 1840, 1850, 1870, and 1880

-court dockets, deeds, inventories, depositions

Mrs. Wilson believes it will take a year to catalog, index and crossindex all of the documents and the names they contain. Some local historians speculate that the documents were lost or stolen during the Civil War. It is not known how long the boxes were there.
