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

OLD PHOTOGRAPHS GET A FACE LIFT

It seems everyone has old photographs piled in a box up in the attic. Over the years, these pictures have aged, and most often the negatives have been lost. It's sad because here is a record of a family's past that should be shared with younger family members, but until now the time and expense involved has been prohibitive.

No more. Las Vegas Wal-Mart stores have installed a new, state-of-the-art photographic process that reproduces photos at a quality never available before. The new machine is capable of making enlargements or reductions at a remarkable level of clarity.

"You don't need a negative," explained Deborah Liebsack, photo lab manager at the Wal-Mart on East Tropicana. "You can drop off your photo if you're in a hurry, or we can do it while you wait."

Liebsack reported that the new process has already caught on all over town. "This is so popular that I now spend a great deal of my time making copies," she said.

One enthusiastic customer said she wanted to send copies of some photos of her as a child to her children and grandchildren. "I don't think I ever had the negatives. It was so long ago, the pictures have become a bit dogeared. Now I can get all the copies I need, and not at an expensive price, either."

Liebsack also said customers were using the machine to make collage photos by combining small photos and making 11-by-17 inch prints.

Before this new process it took 12 days to have copies made of prints without a negative and cost \$10 for an 8-by-10 black and white, Liebsack said. Now a reproduction can be made in about an hour at considerably less cost.

Another advantage is that people's pictures never leave the store, greatly diminishing the chances of it getting lost.

The processor can duplicate both black and white or full color photographs, the photo lab manager said.

The service is currently available in Las Vegas only at area Wal-Mart stores.

NICKNAMES

A recent article concerning nicknames points out that a nickname can often be the real name. The writer said thathergreatgrandmother, Sally Hancock Hale, was not "Sarah," and her father was not "William" Hancock, but "Billey" and called "Bill." Even his obituary stated that "Mr. Bill Hancock died in his bed in Winchendon." She makes a point that many modern children now receive what once were considered nicknames, but are now more often a given name in its own right. The important point is that sometimes people becomes oused to the nickname that they signed official documents, or were listed in census, with their commonly used name, rather than the formal one. Thus, we need to check for both in researching.

CEMETERIES - "PERPETUAL CARE" A GENEALOGIST'S CONCERN

Have you ever tried to locate a grave and found no trace of it? Or have you found the probable location but found only a broad space, at times even very neatly kept up? I have. Probably someone knows who is buried there but when this someone leaves us will there be another someone who will know who is buried there? There are records of most cemeteries but some records get lost or burned as happened to my hometown church records.

In October 1990, while on a genealogical trip to Texas and other states, I found out that Teana Sechelski, the Founder and member of the Polish Genealogical Society of Texas, was working on proofing grave locations for publication of the St. Mary's Catholic Church in Bremond, Robertson County, Texas, my home town. I volunteered myself and wife, Phyllis, to help her since we would be back in Bremond, Texas for the third Syzdek Family Reunion on 30 June 1991. The cemetery is quite large and dates back to the beginning of the century. The first inventory was published in 1978, but had names including Teana's grandfather missing plus many more and the Polish inscriptions were inaccurately translated.

After the reunion on the 1st and 2nd of July 1991, eight of us in teams of two took a row of graves and proofed the inventory made previously by Teana and her mother Katherine a few years back.

For two days Phyllis and I and the others contended with the high humidity and the almost 100 degree Texas weather. Also, the fire ants and moss-encrusted tombstones added variety to the experience. By the second day Phyllis was able to read the months in Polish and verify them accurately.

The graves will be numbered by row so allowances were made for the numerous spaces not marked as grave sites and numbered as unmarked graves.

Most of the old graves had wooden markers which are no longer there. Many were replaced by permanent stone markers but many were not; eventhough some are very well kept up. Who is buried there? Does anyone know?

After my father's death in 1960, we, his children and our mother, as a family project, placed stone markers on all of our family graves.

I did not have very much time to locate and photograph gravesites, but one in particular I was not able to locate is the burial place of my Great Aunt Anna. Her husband is buried in a fenced in family plot with a marker and there is space for her (Anna) but no marker. Where is she buried? It's possible someone may still be alive who may know where this particular person is buried.

It is possible that there are many cemeteries in this situation; unmarked graves and no records. So, now is the time to find out and have a permanent marker placed for the future generations. This is a great project to do at Family Reunions, small family gatherings, or even by yourself. This is the least we can do for our loved ones and for future generations. Remember the sacrifices our ancestors made for us; this is the least we can do for them.

ARCHIVES KEEP AREA'S PAST SAFE AND OPEN TO ALL

In 1902, a major railroad purchased the Las Vegas Ranch property - near what is now Cashman Field - and the groundwork was laid for what would become the fastest growing area in the nation.

With the legalization of gaming and the enactment of a liberal divorce law, both in 1931, and the 1936 completion of Hoover Dam, the population of Southern Nevada quickly began to mushroom.

Casinos sprang up overnight. By the mid-1930s, celebrities began flocking to Las Vegas. They came for the night life or a quick divorce - or both.

In 1941, the construction of the El Rancho Vegas ushered in the resort hotel era. Also that year, the Basic Magnesium plant was built in Henderson. After the war, Nellis Air Force Base and the Nevada Test Site were established. '

Probably no area of the country has changed as much as Southern Nevada in less than a century.

As the history of Southern Nevada was written and rewritten, many local books, pamphlets and magazines were published and tens of thousands of photographs were compiled by residents and amateur collectors.

In the mid-1960s, Hal Erickson, UNLV director of libraries, and his staff started compiling a special collection of books and photographs on the history of Southern Nevada. In 1967, when the library was expanded, a section was designated as Special Collections.

This year is the 25th anniversary of Special Collections, and the immense amount of material in the archives shows that this library department has grown almost as quickly as Southern Nevada. It is a storehouse of Nevada pioneer memorabilia, rare publications, documents, photographs and oral histories.

Included in the archives are 35,000 photos, and thousands of books, magazines and historical documents on everything from the history of gaming throughout the world to log entries of 19th century explorer John C. Fremont. Among the works in the archives are anti-gambling tracts such as "The Converted Gambler," written in 1887 by Mason Long, and the first history of Las Vegas, written in 1955 by Charles Squires, who edited the newspaper, the Las Vegas Age. Early show magazines such as Fabulous Las Vegas, published 40 years ago by Jack Cortez, are included as well. There also are 19th century publications, including a collection of Poker Chips, a 5-cent monthly magazine "devoted to stories of the great American pastime." Among the articles in Poker Chips

is an 1896 piece, "The Girl Who Broke the Bank at Monte Carlo."

Special Collections also contains unexpected items: 2,000 historic cookbooks and 10,000 restaurant menus, for instance, which UNLV Food and Beverage Management students often use for research.

"Everything is here for a purpose," said David Robrock, head of Special Collections.

But Special Collections does not help only UNLV students. Inquiries come from as far away as Tasmania, South Africa and Scotland.

When the questions concern gaming, they are directed to the Gaming Resource Center, which is part of Special Collections. The center is considered the largest, most comprehensive research facility of its type in the world.

Director Susan Jarvis said the resource center contains samples of almost everything that has been published on the subject of gaming, from accounts of the 19th century game of faro to selections on cheating. The annual budget of the resource center is not very large. Only a portion for Special Collections' \$30,000 annual book budget pays for material in the Gaming Resource Center. But the money is well spent.

Some of the books in the Gaming Resource Center date back to the 16th century. they include the first edition for a study of the psychology of the gambler, written in 1561 by Flemish physician Paschasius Justus. There is also the first and only edition of a treatise on all forms of gambling written in 1559 by Portuguese author Francisco Alcocer. "Look at this," Jarvis said, pointing out a squiggly depression that resembled a dried river bed on the cover of Alcocer's book. "That's from a book worm" she said.

While not nearly as rare as the ancient books on gambling, most of the items in Special Collections are indeed fascinating-especially to local residents. There are photographs of early settlers camping along Las Vegas Creek, where the headquarters of the Las Vegas Valley Water District sits today. Other photos show a row of spittoons resting on the hardwood floor in front of a bar at the old Union Hotel, and a group of swimmers at the Old Ranch, not far from Cashman Field.


Many old photos show natural creeks and springs in the Las Vegas area. "In those days, the Las Vegas Valley was very lush. If you just poked a hole in the ground, water would gush out," said Dennis McBride, a Special Collections staffer and historian. In the early part of the 20th century, McBride said, Las Vegas was an agricultural center with orchards of fruit trees. "Why do you think the name Las Vegas means "the meadows"?" McBride asked.

Gaming wasn't legal until 1931, but it had always flourished in Nevada. "This is probably one reason why gambling was finally legalized in Nevada," Robrock said. "It had never left. This state was always the mining frontier."

There are many photographs in Special Collections of early gambling and prostitution houses in Block 16, the old "red light" district, founded in 1905 on the east side of First Street between Stewart and Ogden avenues. Block 16 was a hotbed of activity until the outbreak of World War II.

Interestingly, prostitution was legal and gambling and drinking were illegal in Las Vegas during the early 20th century. Go figure.

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
