


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

PLANS TO DESTROY SOCIAL SECURITY RECORDS ALARMS GENEALOGISTS

The Social Security Administration plans to destroy the original 37 million applications for Social Security. These early files include many persons born in the 1860s and 1870s. Many were naturalized citizens. these applications have the address of the applicant, date and place of birth, father's name and mother's maiden name. Concerned genealogists and researchers may address the Social Security Administration at 6401 Security Blvd., Baltimore, MD 21235, to ask that these records be turned over to the National Archives for genealogical research. Also, a letter to your congressman may be a more effective way to deal with this problem.

CIVIL WAR ANCESTORS

Do you have a Civil War soldier, either Union or Confederate, in your family? Do you have a picture of that soldier? If you don't, would you like to have one? If the answer to any of those questions is yes, you'll be interested in the project of the U.S. Army Military History Institute in Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania. They are trying to collect a photo of every Civil War soldier, both North and South. In 1973 the Institute received a donation of more than 40,000 Civil War photographs. Three-fourths of the photos were pictures of both officers and enlisted men. Using those photos as a nucleus, the Institute has become a repository for such pictures, and about 40,000 more have already been donated. As a letter from the Institute curator, Michael J. Winey, states: "The photos are for a permanent archive and are made available to the public. Although they prefer photos of the men to be in uniform, any photo of the man who served will be acceptable." Original photos may be sent, in which case the Institute will make a close-up negative, or the photos' owners may have a negative made and then donate it.

The only information required is the soldier's rank, full name, company letter, and regimental affiliation number, if known. Not needed are photos of tombstones or of family members, unless the photo submitted is a postwar picture that happens to include family members. Before submitting photos or negatives, write to the U.S. Army Military History Institute, Carlisle Barracks, Carlisle, PA 17013-5008 for a franked mailing envelope that will enable you to mail the photo(s) free of postage charges.

If you don't have a picture of your Civil War Ancestor, write to the same address and ask them to check their card index to the collection. If the collection includes a photo of your soldier, you will be sent a photocopy of the picture, along with information about ordering a print of the picture. You may ask to have up to 10 names checked. This is a wonderful project, and hopefully some of you will participate.

Frustrated in his search, he was ready to give up when he found a notation in the church office: "H.W.P." stood for "Hot Water Pipe."

DEATH ON THE OREGON TRAIL by KATY EDMONSON

Robert GILMORE was my great-great-great-grandfather. In my search to find out more about him and his history, I found this statement about him in, "A History of Baptists in Missouri,"

"In the spring of 1849, equipped for a long journey, Eld. Gilmore, with his own family and many others from his adopted state, started across the western plains for California. The cholera broke out among the emigrants and many were made its victims. Eld. Gilmore, his faithful wife and one son were among the sufferers. He died at the head of Sweet Water on the 25th of June, 1849. He died as he had lived, a faithful, devout Christian. In his last moments he was very quiet, and with calmness and composure he sweetly 'slept with his fathers'." (1)

With little more to go on than this, I started a search to find out whether there was more to be learned about this event. In my correspondence with other relatives several other versions were reported which differed from this one in significant ways but the theme was similar. What I found in my search was one of those rare things that makes ancestor hunting so joyful.

Robert GILMORE, my great-great-great-grandfather was born 16 Jan 1790 in Virginia. (2) He began his migration westward before 1812 when he moved to Kentucky. According to his son, Isaiah GILMORE, he volunteered for service in the War of 1812. "Robert Gilmore....was a Private in the Company commanded by Capt. Henry James, in the Second Regiment of Ky Volunteers commanded by Col. W. Jennings in the war with Great Britain....Robert Gilmore volunteered at Pulaski Co, Ky on or about the last day of Aug. 1812 for the term of 6 mos. and continued in active service in said war till he was taken prisoner on 22 Jan., 1813, and was liberated sometime in the spring of 1813, and immediately volunteered again for a term of 6 mos. in the Company Commanded by Capt. James Davidson in the Mounted Regiment of the United States Cavalry from Ky. commanded by Col. Richard W. Johnson, and continued in active service in said war till wounded on 5 Oct. 1813 near Moravian Town on Thames River, in a battle with the British and Indians, and was discharged about 20 Nov. 1813 on account of expiration of his term of service." (3) He was still in Kentucky when he married Mary HANSFORD in Lincoln County on 12 Mar 1818. (4)

In 1819 or 1820 he moved further west and remained for a brief period in either Clay County or St. Charles County, Missouri (sources differ). He then moved to Lincoln County, Missouri and settled near the Old Sulphur Lick Church. On 19 Jun 1830, he was still a resident of Lincoln County, Missouri when he filed an application for a pension because of disability from his war wounds. The affidavits of two different surgeons attested that, "he is incapable of performing

the duty of a soldier. He received a wound with a ball in the thigh and is 3/4 disabled from obtaining his subsistence by manual labor." (5) Mr. GILMORE had been licensed as a Baptist minister by 1830 and served as pastor of the United Baptist Church in Troy, MO, from 1836-1840. About 1841 he was ordained and "became a member of the Salt River Association and so remained until his removal from the state. His labors in the ministry were confined chiefly to Lincoln and Montgomery Counties." (6)

In the spring of 1849, the GILMORE family was lured further westward by the California gold rush. Robert GILMORE, 59 years old, more than three-fourths disabled from his war wound, and a clergyman, joined a wagon train and set out for California with his wife Mary and the four youngest of their eight children, Fountain Clare GILMORE, 21, James Montgomery GILMORE, 19, William Hansford GILMORE, 16, and Margaret Beattie GILMORE, 13. I do not know whether he hoped to find a fortune in gold or to preach the Gospel in the gold fields. Only the three youngest children got there. Family legends made no mention of cholera but reported that Elder Robert GILMORE, his wife Mary and son Fountain Clare died 25 Jun 1849 at the "head of the Sweetwater" from drinking alkali water.

After searching atlases and other sources looking for "the Sweetwater," I concluded that it was probably somewhere along the Sweetwater River, perhaps in Sweetwater County, Wyoming. I decided to start with the Genealogical Society of Sweetwater County, Wyoming with just this tid-bit of information. My letter lay on the desk of someone in the society for more than a year before I received a reply. Although the reply was a long time coming, it did refer me to Mrs. Sharon FIELD, 6511 Merritt Road, Route 3, Cheyenne, Wyoming 82009, commenting that Mrs. FIELD had a large collection of data on graves along the Oregon Trail in Wyoming. Mrs. FIELD replied to my letter with an

excerpt of several pages from the diary of J. Goldsborough BRUFF, a wagon train leader. The entry in his diary on 3 Aug 1849 began with a long description of the weather ("Beautiful morning frost -36 R ["), the lay of the land ("Bear River Mountains in view all day."), who he met on the trail ("Babbitt, US Mail express with a wagon & 2 boys from Salt L. He was bearing the Mormon petition for a Constitution, to seat of Gov't.-Show'd me the Constitution.") and then had this entry: "Pass'd the graves of Robert Gilmore and wife (in one grave). Died of cholera July 18, 1849. 46 dead oxen passed today." BRUFF's detailed description of the land included the position of the grave between parting forks of the Oregon Trail on the Sublette Cut Off near the Little Sandy Crossing in Sweetwater County, about 18 miles northeast of Farson, WY, in the NE 1/4 of section 2, Township 26N, Range 105W. (7)

The Baptist History reported the deaths as 25 Jun; BRUFF as 18 Jul. There is probably no way to resolve the conflict but since BRUFF evidently copied the date only two weeks later into a diary which he maintained throughout the trip, more weight can be given to his version than others whose recording is less certain.

I never cease to be amazed at the outcomes of ancestor searches. I am astounded and very grateful that I could confirm these deaths which occurred in the midst of a wilderness under the most difficult condition of pioneer life! First, someone carefully kept a diary on a wagon train on the Oregon Trail with, "Our faces perfectly cover'd with dust of an ashy hue, eyes appearing as small dark hollow space. Animals much fatigued by deep sand and dust in many places to wade through." Second, others preserved the diary and put it in a place where still others could find it. Third, someone was interested enough in events along the Oregon Trail to be able to locate information in the diary in response to an inquiry. Bless them all!

And the sequel...the three orphaned GILMORE children, James, William and Margaret of course had to go on to California with the wagon train. They reached the gold fields and in the 1850 census of Yuba County, California, lived in a mining camp. (8) In 1851 William and Margaret returned to Missouri. I believe James remained in California. Margaret lived with her older sister, Martha Jane GILMORE STEPHANS until she married George A. PALMER on 24 Apr 1856 when she was 19 years of age. My ancestor, Isaiah GILMORE, the oldest son, was already married in 1849. He did not accompany the family to California but remained in Missouri; he died in the Civil War.

SUMMER SEARCHING

The summer vacation that we look forward to all year is over again for another year. Now it is time to recover from the depression of returning to bills that are due, daily work schedules, and getting back to the routine of the hometown meetings and activities.

Hopefully summer genealogy was successful for everyone...such as a visit with an uncle or aunt who knows someone who may have more information on that elusive ancestor who has been evading an intensive search. After several of these visits I was given the death month and year of a gr-gr-grandfather who has been extremely difficult to find; no death certificate at the state level had been located and the sexton of the local cemetery where he had been buried was not able to locate a cemetery record. And, naturally, the only thing anyone knew except for anecdotal information was his name. A visit to the "local funeral home" which had (generally) serviced Catholic families in the area led to the Funeral Record of Gr-Gr-Grandpa Jeramiah. A success at last! This record revealed Jeramiah's birth month and year, the name of Jeramiah's wife who was buried in Ashland, Wisconsin (this location was a previously known fact but not her name), and the names of both of his parents in Ireland. (The Funeral Record did not indicate a cemetery plot.) Finally, some leads that I can pursue!

Do you have ANCESTORS in Minnesota in 1918? If they were farmers, which many Minnesotan's were, a FARM CROP AND LABOR REPORT may be a source of interesting information. It is found at the Minnesota Historical Society on Kellogg Drive. (Other states may also have a similar report during this time period.) It will identify your ancestor, his "Post Office Address", the "Nearest Shipping Point" (for his crop), by "What Railroad" it was shipped, and his "Nationality or descent". The report indicates how many acres of a varietyof "crops" were planted in "1917" and "1918", and how many "stock" (animals) were owned in "1917" and "1918". It indicates "Silos now erected" and those "To be erected in 1918." Also reported is "Do you need more farm Labor?" with five questions to which response may be made for "men, women, and boys". There is also a section for "Remarks". This section contained such "remarks" as "poor farmer with 10 children", "widow can not afford to hire help"; (unfortunately no "remarks" were made for my ancestors but I have some interesting information about farming activites for my ancestors). The report concludes with the SIGNATURE of the Assessor.

Also during this period, 1918 AND WWI, the ALIEN REGISTRATION AND DECLARATION OF HOLDINGS (a two page report) was required of people who had not yet been naturalized citizens of the United States. This report (for the state of Minnesota) is found in the records of the Minnesota Commission of Public Safety at the Minnesota Historical Society. Besides having much of the basic personal data about the individual, it reveals the "port of entry to the United States" and the "date of arrival to the U.S." It also indicates "Do you speak and write English", "trade or profession", and the "names and ages of all living children and which are attending public school". There are questions regarding male relatives taking part in the present war, naturalization, real estate, investments, securities, and personal property.

It will also include the SIGNATURE of your ancestor. I gained new information from this report, especially the port of entry to the United States on my ancestors who traveled through Canada and finally entered the United States through Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.

It was a fun genealogical summer for me. My husband thinks I should have all the information possible on all of our ancestors, but it always amazes me at the (new) data that I find on our various ancestors.

Now with computers imagine all of the genealogical data that will be collected on each and everyone of us. REMINDER



Deaths Reported in the Las Vegas Age

January 1, 1918 through December 31, 1918

This sixth in a series of death indexes from the pioneer Las Vegas newspaper, the Las Vegas Age reported ninety two deaths during 1918. For the first time in this series of reports, deaths from natural causes exceeded violent deaths.

Las Vegas was not spared during the nationwide influenza epidemic which struck in late 1918. Doubtless its position on the railroad between Los Angeles and Salt Lake City made the city vulnerable from both directions. From October through December forty three deaths were reported as being caused by influenza or pneumonia.

Las Vegas's remote desert location did not insulate the community from the horrors of World War I. Another seven of the ninety two 1918 deaths resulted from the battlefields of France.



Computers are being increasingly used as tools for organizing, maintaining, and disseminating genealogical information.

Most people, however, do not use computers.

Many of these people would like to begin organizing their information by computer but don't know where to begin or what to do. This column is for them. Before we can organize our data on a computer, we must obtain one. Also, we must answer 2 important questions: One, can we afford the money for the computer and, two, can we spend the time and put forth the intellectual output necessary to learn how to operate it?

A computer will cost upwards of \$2,000.00 and can take hours, or days, to learn. Once we have made the decision to pay these costs, we must begin to learn about computers. The first thing we need to learn is the language of computers. Therefore, this issue's column will present some definitions (incidentally, for the most part, we will be discussing IBM-compatible computers).

HARDWARE: The actual machine which does the work, including the operating unit, keyboard, the monitor, and other add-ons (these add-ons are called "peripherals").

SOFTWARE: The "programs" which perform the various functions of the computer. These programs are stored on magnetized disks.

DISKS OR DISKETTES: Computer Disks and Diskettes are made of plastic or metal and are coated with magnetized particles.

Both programs and information, or "data", are kept on the disks. There are 2 main kinds of disks: floppy diskettes, made of plastic, which can be put in or taken out of the computer, and hard disks, made of metal, which are built into the computer itself.

OPERATING UNIT: The operating unit is the metal box which contains the "works" of the machine, it includes the drives into which the floppy diskettes are inserted, the hard disk, the "chips" which run the computer and hold the memory, and various other components.

KEYBOARD: The keyboard is similar to a typewriter with some extra keys.

MONITOR: The monitor is the TV-like screen which displays the data.

These 3 components: the operating unit, the keyboard, and the monitor are, along with the disks, all that is needed to organize and maintain genealogical data. Certain add-ons, or peripherals, increase the value of computers for our purposes. The printer, the mouse or trackball, and the modem are the most common peripherals.

MOUSE OR TRACKBALL: The mouse or trackball allows us to use some programs without using the keyboard.

MODEM: The modem is a device which connects the computer to a telephone and can send and receive telephone calls.

PRINTER: The printer enables us to make
"hard copies" or "printouts" of our data.

I think that this is enough for one issue. I will continue with more definitions in the next issue.
