





SCOTTISH HOLIDAY TRADITION

New Year's celebrations start in Scotland on Hogmonay - New Year's Eve. Traditionally, the house was thoroughly cleaned, windows washed, clothes washed, inhabitants bathed and clean clothes put on. All rubbish (trash) is taken out. A meal (in Glasgow, where I grew up, frequently steak-pie and mashed potatoes and peas) was prepared for the family in time to have it finish just before "the Bells" - 12 midnight. The dishes are washed, and plates of shortbread, black-bun (a dark, rich fruit cake baked inside a pastry-shell), cherry-cake and raisin-cake are set out. Drinks are poured (whisky for the men, usually sherry for the ladies and ginger-wine for the kids) and the stroke of midnight awaited. When the Bells are rung at midnight there are the usual exchanges of kisses and hugs and a toast drunk to the New Year.

And THEN, the guests start to arrive! Since everyone tries to bring in the year in their own homes, parties don't start until after midnight. The first person into your house in the New Year - the First Foot - is very important. The First Foot should be male, preferably tall and dark, and must carry with him a bottle of whisky, a piece of black-bun (sometimes short-bread) and a lump of coal. These represent the essentials of life - food, drink and warmth - for the coming year. At any time within the first couple of weeks of Ne'erday (New Year's Day) that a guest enters one's home for the first time in the year, custom dictates that they must be offered a drink - usually whisky, although non-alcoholic drinks are substituted as appropriate!<G> Custom also dictates that the drink be accepted!

In many households in Scotland, and in ours in Glasgow, the party would continue with music and singing into the not-so-wee hours of the morning, perhaps five or six. People would then take a "kip" on a couch, or even the floor, depending on the space available. Getting up near to noon, we would eat a large traditional Scottish breakfast, and then (OK - This is sexist!<G>) the males would go out to the football (soccer) games in the afternoon, while the ladies would stay home preparing a large meal for the evening. By the time this meal came around, friends and relatives from out-of-town would have arrived, and the party would recommence!

And that is why the Second of January is ALSO a holiday in Scotland!

Dear Santa: Don't bring me new dishes; I don't need a new kind of game. Genealogists have peculiar wishes, For Christmas I just want a surname.


A new washing machine would be great, But it's not the desire of my life. I've just found an ancestor's birth date; I need now the name of his wife.

Federal Land Records, Part 2 of 3

U.S. Public Lands Survey.

To avoid perpetuating land ownership problems of the early colonies, the Continental Congress in 1785 established the "U.S. Public Lands Survey." This system is referred to as the rectangular system or government system of land measurement. The rectangular system was applied to all of the remaining land that the federal government possessed. This land, the public domain, is held in trust for the people by the federal government. Some 75% of all U.S. land was once part of the public domain; about 30% of it still is.

The Public Lands Survey was used to subdivide Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, and Alaska, as well as all of the states north of the Ohio River and west of the Mississippi except for Texas. Texas has a system similar to that of the U.S. Public Lands Survey but it was affected by Spanish settlement before the annexation of Texas into the U.S.

Experiments in how to survey the land and how to dispose of it to private parties took place in Ohio. The result was that much of Ohio was not laid out in the rectangular U.S. Public Lands Survey. The rectangular system uses north-south lines called principal meridians and east-west lines called base lines to form the rectangles which characterize the system. In Ohio, the Ohio River -- hardly a straight line -- was the base line for southeastern Ohio; the Scioto River for parts of central Ohio; and the Great Miami River for southwestern Ohio. A number of other exceptions also came into being because the earliest Ohio (and southern Indiana) entrants applied a variety of survey methods from their English or French heritage.

Meridians and Base Lines.

The government system of survey is based on a series of meridians and base lines located astronomically by surveyors.

A meridian is an imaginary line that runs north and south on the surface of the earth. If extended, it reaches from pole to pole. East-west measurements are calculated by angular measurements in degrees, minutes and seconds east or west of the Greenwich meridian which runs through the British Royal Observatory in Greenwich, England (the angle measured from the center of the earth between the meridian through Greenwich and the meridian through any other point is called that point's longitude by both surveyors and navigators).

A base line is an imaginary line that runs east and west on the surface of the earth. If extended, a base line extends around the earth a fixed distance north or south of the equator (the angle measured from the center of the earth between the equator and any base line is called that line's *latitude* or *parallel of latitude* by surveyors and navigators).

Principal Meridians.

Any system of surveying had to start from a known point on the ground. The point must be readily identifiable and permanently marked -- usually with a heavy stone monument. From this point surveyors ran a line called a principal meridian due north and south and gave the line an identifying title -- either a number or a name. Examples are the 1798 First Principal Meridian, the border between Ohio and Indiana that extends from where the Great Miami River enters the Ohio River north to the Michigan border; the 1805 Third Principal Meridian located in central Illinois 89°, 28' and 15" west of Greenwich extending from the mouth of the Ohio River to the northern border of Illinois; and the 1851 Mt. Diablo Meridian east of San Francisco Bay which extends from the Pacific Ocean to the Oregon border and is the principal meridian for northern California and all of Nevada. There are in all 35 principal meridians in the continental U.S. including Alaska.

Base Lines.

After surveyors established the principal meridian in a particular area, they chose a precisely-defined point along the principal meridian -- the *initial point* -- and ran a line through the initial point at a right angle. This due eastwest line is called the *base line* for the area. There are 32 base lines in the various public lands states.⁴ Some examples of these base lines are:


- The base line for the Second Principal Meridian in Indiana and the Third Principal Meridian in Illinois is at 38°, 28' and 20" north and extends to the Mississippi.
- The Sixth Principal Meridian base line defines the Kansas-Nebraska border and extends west to Utah.
- In our area, the Mt. Diablo base line extends from the Golden Gate across California and Nevada to the Utah border.

Correction Lines and Guide Meridians.

The intersection of a principal meridian and a base line defined the *initial point* of a survey. From the initial point, surveyors established lines running east and west called *correction lines* parallel to and 24 miles north and south of the base line. Next, they established lines running north and south called *guide meridians* 24 miles either side of the principal meridian. The 24-mile square rectangles were further divided into six-mile squares called *townships*.

The lines designated correction lines are necessary because meridians meet at the north pole. Convergence of meridians would make the north boundary of the fourth township north of the base line more than 200 feet shorter than the south boundary of the first township north of the base line. To compensate, the south line of each 5th township north of the base line is measured the full distance of six miles along the correction lines.



Townships

Township and Range Lines.

The 24 mile squares resulting from the correction lines and guide meridians were divided into smaller tracts by running east-west lines, called *township lines*, at six mile intervals parallel to the base line. North-south lines, called *range lines*, were run parallel to the principal meridian each six miles. The squares resulting from these lines are approximately six miles on a side and are called *townships* (not, of course, the same as the municipalities found in New England).

To locate a square in this grid, the Government assigned two numbers to each square, a township number and a range number. The numbering system used is illustrated in the "Townships" chart.

The act of 1785 provided only for townships six miles square. It soon became apparent that this was too large to describe and locate a given tract. In 1796, Congress passed an act dividing townships into 36 sections, each one mile square and containing 640

acres. The 36 sections were numbered as shown on the chart. In 1800 sections were further divided into east and west halves of 320 acres each by running a north-south line through the center and in 1805 were further divided into quarter sections of 160 acres by running an east-west line through the center of the section. The 1805 act also provided for monuments at all quarter section corners.

Further legislation in 1820 and 1832 divided quarter sections into quarter-quarter sections of 40 acres -- the smallest statutory division of sections.

Finding Land Records and Entry Files.

The rectangular U.S. Public Lands Survey is one of the most practical methods ever devised for land identification and description. It provides a unique description for each parcel of land, is simple and permanent, and has changed little since its development to the present.

There are many occasions when land records yield significant information about our ancestors. The third and final article in this series will cover steps to follow to locate land records which may assist in your genealogy quest.


LAWS OF GENEALOGY
