

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PRESERVING LINKS

From the web site of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) (http://www.fema.gov), here are suggestions for saving photographs damaged in a flood.


"Photographs and photo albums are often the only records of momentous occasions like weddings, birthdays and graduations," Sarah WAGNER, senior photograph conservator at the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) said. "If the flood has damaged them, saving them may be possible. Remember that if flood waters did not damage the negatives, you can make new prints anytime."

Damaged photographs for which there are no negatives should receive attention first. Once photographs have stuck together or become moldy, saving them may not be possible. Handle wet photos carefully; the surfaces may be fragile. Wet photos may be rinsed in clean water (if needed) and sealed in a plastic garbage bag with a tie or a Zip-Lock type plastic bag. If possible, put wax paper between each photo. If a freezer is available, freeze the photos immediately. Later, photos may be defrosted, separated and air-dried.

If no freezer or refrigerator is available, rinse wet photos in clean water and dry them, face up, in a single layer on a clean surface (a table, window screen or clean plastic laid out on the ground). Avoid drying the photos in direct sunlight. Don't worry if the photos curl as they dry. A photo expert can be contacted later about flattening them.

"Conservators can help you with severely damaged and valuable materials," WAGNER said. "The American Institute for Conservation has a free referral service to help people find experts in their area." For more information call the American Institute for Conservation at (202) 452-9545.

THREE QUERIES PER PROSPECTOR

At our March meeting members were instructed in how to write queries with the results of the mini class (Queries from each member) turned in and published in the April Prospector. Here is a brief summary of that presentation.

When you sit down to write a queri, there are two things you must have clear in your mind as you begin:

- (1.) about whom do you want to know something, and
- (2.) what do you want to know.

Once you have these two thoughts clear in your mind, you can begin to formulate your queri.

To ask about a "WHO", you need a name or a specific description: "John Smith" or "Father of Peter Smith". Then you need qualifiers so that you aren't asking about all "John Smith's". One of these qualifiers is "WHEN" was he: living, born, died, or married - a date or an approximate time is needed to place him in the world at some time. Another qualifier is "WHERE" was he: living, born, married, or died; you need: the country: hopefully: the state; better yet: the county; and best off all: the city or specific place. Also, you can clarify WHO this individual is by adding the names of others he was associated with such as a wife, children, siblings, parents, business partners, etc. Example: "Father of Peter Smith, worked w/Harry Brown; m. Mary".

You then need to indicate what you want to know. Your question can be general such as: "Need information on/about...", "Seeking descendants of....", "Looking for...", or "Help me find...". Or you can ask a more specific question such as: "WHERE can I find...", "WHEN did...", "WHO married...".

Consider the following guidelines when writing your queries.

- 1. Give enough information to identify the individual or family you are looking for: WHO, WHEN, WHERE.
- 2. Write separate queries for additional individuals; don't combine numerous individuals with numerous questions in the same queri. It becomes too confusing and no one knows who is who or what you want.
- 3. Ask one question.
- 4. Ask your question at the beginning or at the end of the queri. Check the format of the publication to which you are submitting your queri and follow their lead.
- 5. State your facts; be brief and concise! Don't ramble!
- 6. Use all capital letters on your surnames; the person entering the information can not determine which names are surnames.
- 7. Use acceptable, appropriate abreviations.
- 8. Conclude with your NAME AND ADDRESS (INCLUDE CITY, STATE, ZIP). OPTIONAL are your phone number, FAX, and/or E-Mail. Since this is being published (often nationally), you may not want the optional information out there.

The most important thing is: WRITE QUERIES and SUBMIT THEM. Each CCNGS member may have THREE queries published per issue FREE of charge!

THE GRANDFATHER THAT I NEVER MET

My grandfather lived on the farm, Hagen (The Pasture); Krakvattnet (Crow's Water); Skaraborg County, in Sweden. My father, Anders' son, Abel Sanfrid, immigrated to the United States and North Dakota in 1913. All that I knew of my grandfather were the stories that my father told.

I knew that grandfather had a small farm which he cleared by using dynamite to blow up the granite boulders that covered the forested acres so that he would have land to cultivate. He had some sheep on the few acres surrounded by pine forests. He had known tragedy in his early years when his wife died in childbirth along with their newborn twins. At the age of 24 he was a widower with a year old son, his mother to care for, and the farm, Hagen, to run. He was a blacksmith, as attested to by the sheep bell that my father had brought with him to the United States. I knew that he was a stern taskmaster and disciplinarian to his five sons.

Aside from the above facts, this was the gist of my knowledge until I joined the Clark County Nevada Genealogy Society and began working on my family history in earnest. I had the good fortune to have three items which I located in my father's safe. The first was a letter gramdfather had written to my dad on 8 Dec 1917 after his son Erik died in North Dakota. Evidently my father had written to him about some difficulty in settling Erik's estate. Grandfather said, "...but in any case the missing of Erik is greater than the matter of the money, it can't be helped, it is as it is." He then goes on telling of the difficulty they were having (World War I was raging; Sweden was neutral, but they had severe rationing.) The state takes a lot from us, if we have more than we have coming to us. We get an allotment for what both we and the animals eat." In the closing paragraph he said, "You shouldn't wait so long before you write again. We start waiting for a letter as soon as we sent ours." He then closes, "Friendly greetings, A.G. ANDERSSON." (This letter was translated by Rev. Donald WOLD of Black Duck, MN, my fifth cousin.)

The second item was a poem of congratulations which Grandfather sent to my father and mother when they were married 16 July 1927. I had never known just what it said until I had it translated this past summer - 1996. I believe he was the author. The translation was done by Inga-Britt **BARNES** here in Las Vegas.

"Now you shall walk together

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Through the roaring waves of life. From now on, you are two
To share darkness as well as light. It often happens here
That the road feels heavy.
We constantly meet troubles
Both old as well as young.

"Our life I liken to a ship
That will sail away on the sea.
We will meet the threatening eyes
So calm and sunny was the sea
When the journey started.
Maybe the trip will last but one day
And all the joy is gone.

"So clear the sky is today
And life is smiling like sunshine.
So bright and happy, I wish
That the journey will be for you'
But the sun may be darkened by clouds
And the joy changed to sorrow.
Then it is good to have each other
And a refuge together.

"From a distance you hear the threat from the Storm and the deep roaring of the wave, Makes the whole journey bright. We know nothing here about what is to happen, But only if our love does not die Do we have shelter against the storm.

"And when our trip has ended We surely will reach the harbor. Then troubles and sorrows That we had to confront are gone. No deceiving light is shining there Nor are we lured away from God Where we are separated from temptation And can obey His commandments.

"Accept my son, it is simple,
But I am not able to do more.
I wish you happiness dear friends
May prosperity go with you.
A better wedding song you will get
When the ship has reached land
And the angels will meet you
At the wonderful beach of heaven."

The third item was the newspaper obituary, again translated by Rev. **WOLD**: "After difficult suffering, dead on Friday in Karlsborg's hospital is home owner Anders Gustaf **ANDERSSON**, Krakvattmet, Tivid. The deceased, who was born and grew up on Krakvattmet, was in the days of his strength a particularly many-sided man; beside his farm, he was both a blacksmith and basket-maker. He was a good-hearted man whom everyone liked and he leaves a large empty place.

I guess there is one other characteristic that I know about him. When I was visiting the family farm, I was shown another farm where he used to go to visit. Somewhere between the two places, grandfather had his "illegal still" He would collect some of his booze and drink with the man from the other farm. Do you suppose that my Grand-

A BIT OF NEVADA HISTORY

A CLARK COUNTY, NEVADA, COMMUNITY

BOULDER CITY. Boulder City, Boulder Basin, Boulder Beach, Boulder Islands, Boulder Peak, Boulder Dam Recreation Area and Boulder Canyon Wildlife Refuge all derive their names from BOULDER CANYON, north of BLACK CANYON, which is that part of the Colorado River Canyon in which Hoover Dam was built. The Boulder Canyon Project, enacted into law on December 21, 1928, was so called because Boulder Canyon was thought to be the best location for the dam at that time. Later Black Canyon was selected. Water was turned in behind the dam on February 1, 1935. Originally and from 1933-1947, the name was Boulder Dam; during 1932-1933, it was called Hoover Dam and officially renamed so in 1947. The city, designed as a model town by S. R. De BOER, served as the dam's construction camp, later becoming its administrative center under the jurisdiction of the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation. The bureau chose the name Boulder City over the alternate proposals: Hoover City, Adaven, Hidam, and Wilbur. A post office, established April 15, 1931, and a mining district, twenty-three miles southeast of Las Vegas, were named for Boulder City.

BIOGRAPHY OF MY GRANDMOTHER MRS. ROSE WARREN

By: Rosella (MAY) WARREN

For this occasion I have chosen a poem by Edgar A. **GUEST** which I think portrays much of the life which my grandmother lived.

Who does his task from day to day And meets whatever comes his way Believing God has willed it so, Has found real greatness here below.

Who guards his post no matter where, Believing God must need him there, Although but lowly toil it be, Has risen to nobility.

For great and low there's but one test: 'Tis that each man shall do his best. Who worked with all the strength he can Shall never die in debt to man.

My grandmother was born February 7, 1869, at Springdale, Washington Co., Utah and was named Rosette **EARL**. She was the youngest and ninth child of James Calvin **EARL** and Mary Elizabeth **PARSONS**. Her parents were true pioneers of the West. James Calvin **EARL** was a member of the famed Mormon Battalion and came west in 1847. Her mother crossed the plains driving two yoke of oxen in the year 1848. They met in Salt Lake and were the first couple married by Brigham **YOUNG** in the Old Endowment House.

Death took James Calvin **EARL** on February 27, 1871, at Pinevalley, Utah. My grandmother was but two years of age. Death was to be a frequent visitor in the life of my grandmother. She was reared by her widowed mother and spent her youth in Southern Utah. Her mother taught her the value of honest toil and hard physical work. One of her motto's in life was: "If there is anything worth doing, it is worth doing right."

She met her first husband William MAY at Silver Reef which was a mining town near Leeds, Utah. He was a miner from Cornwall, England. He fell in love with this vivacious young woman and after a whirlwind courtship, they were married December 4, 1888. Three of their five children were born at Silver Reef. They were Joseph, Johnny, and Rosette Fay MAY. She has often told me of this mine at Silver Reef which caused the ultimate death of so many miners. Because of this it was given the name of the Black Maria. It wasn't many years after working in that mine with the dust-laden air that William MAY realized too late that he too had become another victim of the dread "miner's consumption".

And so perhaps feeling that a change in mines might help, they moved to Marysvale, Piute County, Utah. Here my father Ernest James **MAY** was born in August 20, 1895. Later they moved to a

neighboring town of Circleville where their last child Wiliam Forest MAY was born in January 1898. But now this dread and fatal disease began taking its toll and every breath and every movement of his body helped the dust in its terrible work of tearing his lungs and just six weeks after the birth of the little son who was named for his dear father, death claimed the life of my grandfather.

Words alone cannot describe the feelings that must have been hers when she realized that her beloved husband was gone and she now faced the task of caring for her five small children alone. But she did care for them and was fortunate indeed to find a wonderful man who took her for his wife the following year. This man, her second husband, was Joseph **KESLER**. They lived on the **KESLER** Ranch where two of their three daughters were born, Velva and Alta **KESTLER**.

In the year 1905, they moved to Las Vegas. Little did she know that death would take three of the four sons of whom she was so proud. This year of 1905, is the year that the community was founded. Their third daughter, Ethel **KESLER**, was born here and was the second white child born in the Las Vegas Valley.

Death came once again and claimed her second husband in 1908, when Joseph **KESLER** died unexpectedly. Life must have been difficult indeed in the early days when winters were quite severe and the summers unbearably hot. Yet with her great courage she went to work hauling wood for a living with the help of her young sons. Death took her 19 year old son Johnny in 1909, from pneumonia.

She married Carl **WESBY** in 1909, and to this union was born Eva Thora **WESBY**. Their marriage ended in divorce shortly afterwards.

Her oldest son Joe **MAY** became the first law enforcement officer in Las Vegas and for many years he patrolled the town on horseback. He became a policeman in 1915, and continued at the work until his death from a heart attack in 1936.

My father Ernie MAY went to work for the Union Pacific Railroad when he was only fourteen years old. He worked his way up to become and engineer. In the early 1930s, he joined the police force and worked as a Ranger in Boulder City, Nevada during the building of Hoover Dam. Later he transferred to the law enforcement agency in Las Vegas. It was here June 8, 1933, that he was shot to death by a drunken man as he stepped from his patrol car at the Boulder Auto Courts which were located on South Fifth Street. Her only living son William Forest MAY is a veteran railroad engineer and still resides in Las Vegas.

My grandmother's last husband was Holmes Lockhart WARREN, uncle of Chief Justice Earl WARREN of California.

Together they opened and maintained the Warren Maternity Home in Las Vegas until ill health forced them to close it. Mr. **WARREN** passed away in August 1944.

She was named Mother of the Year on Mother's Day in 1953, an honor of which she was very proud. She often expressed pride in her growing posterity and shortly before her death, she made plans to hold a family reunion so that she might see her many descendants. She often expressed her deep felt gratitude for a posterity that was free from any crippling deformity.

Always proud of her community and the State of Nevada she would taut the advantages of living here with all who came to visit her. It has been said of her that she was indeed a friend to anyone in need and many times during the early days when epidemics would strike, she would leave her home and family to care for those who needed help. She often said that she had delivered almost as many babies as the doctors had.

She loved western music and during her last remaining years she would listen daily to those programs which featured this music. One of her favorite songs was the Great Specked Bird which she requested often and never tired of hearing. I shall never hear that song but what I will think of her. She was nearly 90 when she passed away November 20, 1958. She met death, as she had so many times before, with courage and a deep abiding faith in a life after death. Her last words which I heard her say were: "I want all of my children to remember to have faith in God."

In closing this biography I would like to leave you with the words of this creed which was a part of her life: I expect to pass through this world but once - any good therefore that I may do, or any kindness that I can show to any fellow creature, let me do it now, and let me no neglect or defer it, for I shall not pass this way again.

18th Century Pennsylvania German Naming Customs

1. At baptism, if two given names were given to the child, the first given name was a spiritual, saint's name, originally developed from Roman Catholic tradition and continued on by the Protestants in their baptismal naming customs. The second given name was the secular name, which is the name the person was known by, within the family and to this rest of the world. The spiritual name, usually to honor a favorite saint, was usually repeatedly given to all the children of that family of the same sex. Thus the boys would be Johan Adam KERCHNER, Johan George KERCHNER, etc., or Philip Peter KERCHNER, Philip Jacob KERCHNER, etc. Girls would be named Anna Barbara KERCHNER, Anna Margaret KERCHNER, etc., or Maria Elizabeth KERCHNER, Maria Catherine KERCHNER, etc. But after baptism, these people would not be known as John, Philip, Anna, or Maria, respectively. They would instead be known by what we now would think of as their middle name, which was their secular name. Thus these people would be known respectively as Adam, George, Peter, Jacob, Barbara, Margaret, Elizabeth, and Catherine in legal and secular records. For males, the saint's name Johan or John was particularly heavily used by many German families. The child's secular name was really John, if and only if, at baptism he was named only John, usually Johannes, with no second given name. Many researchers, new to German names, who find a baptism of an individual with a name such as Johan Adam **KERCHNER**, thus mistakenly spend a lot of time looking for a John **KERCHNER** in legal and census records, when he was known after baptism, to the secular world, as Adam KERCHNER. Also when reading county histories, etc., especially those written by individuals in the 20th century, and the author is referring to someone as John KERCHNER and you are not looking for a John KERCHNER, but the history sounds otherwise familiar, further research may turn up that this person was really not a John KERCHNER, but instead was someone else such as a Johan George KERCHNER. You would thus find all his 18th century records recorded under the name George KERCHNER and not John KERCHNER and therefore after checking the data and correlating the facts you may find this is really a story about your missing George KERCHNER.

- 2. The term "Senior" and "Junior" following a name did not necessarily imply a father and son relationship as it does now. It could have been an uncle and nephew who had the same name and lived near each other. It could be a grandfather and a grandchild living together, where the father has died. It could even be two unrelated individuals with the same name but of different ages who lived near each other. So to help friends and business associates keep track of who was who in their discussions and records, they added on the "Sr." or "Jr." which merely meant the older and the younger, respectively.
- **3.** The term cousin was widely used to mean an extended family, not the specific legal definition we understand it to be today.
- **4.** It was a common practice in some German families to name the first born son after the child's paternal grandfather and the second born son after the maternal grandfather. Here are two more more

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detailed naming patterns practiced by some families.

Pattern A

1st son after the father's father 2nd son after the mother's father 3rd son after the father 4th son after the husband's father's father 5th son after the wife's father's father 6th son after the husband's mother's father 7th son after the wife's mother's father

1st daughter after the wife's mother 2nd daughter after the husband's mother 3rd daughter after the mother 4th daughter after the father's father's mother 5th daughter after the mother's father's mother 6th daughter after the father's mother's mother 7th daughter after the mother's mother's mother

Pattern B

The pattern B for the sons is the same as the above but this pattern for daughters was different

1st daughter after the father's mother 2nd daughter after the mother's mother 3rd daughter after the mother 4th daughter after the mother's father's mother 5th daughter after the father's father's mother

Whenever a duplicate name occurred in the series, the next name in the series was used. If a child died in infancy the name was often reused for the next child of the same gender.

If you are lucky enough to find a family with a lot of children, who strictly followed one of these naming patterns, then it may give you useful clues to determining the possible names of family members in earlier generations.

5. An "in" or "en", added to the end of a name, such as Anna Maria **KERCHNERIN**, is a German language name ending suffix denoting that the person is female. Thus the correct spelling of the last name in the example would be **KERCHNER**, not **KERCHNERIN**.

I hope that the above information will be of assistance to individuals researching 18th Century Pennsylvania German names and records.
