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

An index to deeds (land records) is found in every County Court House. First, go through the INDEX. Get a chronological list of all transactions for your ancestor; do this year by year. Do not order film until you know what you need, then put in your request.

I want ancestors with names like Rudimentary Montagnard or Melchizedick von Steubenhoffmannschild or Spetznatz Gianfortoni, not William Brown or John Hunter or Mary Abbott.

I want ancestors who could read and write, had their children baptized in recognized houses of worship, went to school, purchased land, left detailed wills (naming a huge extended family as legatees), had their photographs taken once a year — subsequently putting said pictures in elaborate isinglass frames annotated with calligraphic inscriptions, and carved voluble and informative inscriptions on their headstones.

I want relatives who managed to bury their predecessors in established, still-extant (and indexed) cemeteries.

I want family members who wrote memoirs, who enlisted in the military as officers, and who served in strategically important (and well documented) skirmishes.

I want relatives who served as councilmen, schoolteachers, county clerks and town historians.

I want relatives who 'religiously' wrote in the family Bible, journaling every little event, and detailing the familial relationship of every visitor.

In the case of immigrant progenitors, I want them to have arrived only in those years wherein passenger lists were indexed by the National Archives, and I want them to have applied for citizenship and to have done so only in those jurisdictions which have since established indices.

I want relatives who were patriotic and clubby, who joined every patrimonial society they could find, who kept diaries, who listed all their addresses, who had paintings made of their horses, and who dated every piece of paper they ever touched.

I want forebears who were wealthy enough to afford and to keep for generations the tribal homestead and who left all the aforementioned pictures and diaries and journals intact in the library. But most of all, I want relatives I can find!!!

A BIT OF NEVADA HISTORY

A CLARK COUNTY, NEVADA, COMMUNITY

HENDERSON. An industrial center producing chlorine, steel alloys, titanium, rocket fuel, and chemicals, situated eleven miles southeast of Las Vegas on U.S. 95; a station between Las Vegas and Boulder City on a branch line of the UP RR; a post office established January 1, 1944; named to commemorate U.S. Senator Charles **HENDERSON**. The town, laid out in 1942, for several years was called Basic locally, for Basic Magnesium, Inc., the first plant built there. Victory Village, Carver Park, and Pittman are now a part of the Clark County city, which was incorporated June 8, 1953.

DAA!

Some years ago, a New Orleans lawyer sought a direct Veterans Administration loan for a client. He was told that the loan would be approved if he could provide proof of clear title to the property offered as collateral. The title for the property in question was complicated and he spent a considerable amount of time reviewing all pertinent documents back to 1803. Satisfied with the depth and expanse of his examination, he submitted the information to the VA.

He soon received a reply from the VA.

"We received your letter today enclosing application for a loan for your client, supported by abstract of title. The application forms are complete, but you have not cleared the title before the year 1803. Therefore, before full review and possible approval can a be accorded the application, it will be necessary that the title be cleared back before that year."

Annoyed, the lawyer wrote the V.A.

"Your letter regarding titles in case #9378329 received. I note that you wish titles extended further back than I have presented. Your attention is invited to the following information to update your records for the property prior to 1803.

BOOK REVIEW

Nevada Guide to Genealogical Records

Diane has compiled an extraordinarily comprehensive guide to the genealogical resources of the state of Nevada, and it pulls together records from a number of sources, including courthouses, compiled lists and Internet sites. The first chapter concerns general, or statewide genealogical sources, including the Nevada holdings of the LDS Family History Library. Here the compiler provides an overview of Nevada history, followed by an alphabetically arranged list of general sources, such as census records, church records, libraries and archives with addresses and holdings, tribal organizations, directories and bibliographies, land and property records, maps, military records, Indian Affairs records, newspapers, obituaries, public and vital records, and much more. The bulk of the volume, of course, concerns itself with Nevada's thirteen counties and their published sources. Each chapter commences with background on the formation and boundaries of the county, legislated changes in its configuration, and the location of the county seat. She then zeroes in on the county's genealogical resources by citing the addresses, hours of operation, and the holdings of the following: church archives, the county courthouse, special libraries, newspapers and their repositories, LDS Family History Centers, cemeteries, funeral homes, printed county histories, and so on. Since the book is arranged alphabetically by county and then under record category and repository, a complete index is unnecessary; however, the volume concludes with a helpful index to all the places (libraries, churches, etc.) referred to in the text. Without a doubt this is the volume by which all future guides to Nevada genealogy will be compared.

THE ABSOLUTE, VERY BEST GENEALOGY PROGRAM Part II

(Part one of this article appeared in the July 1998 issue of *The Prospector*, page 18. It discussed "what are Event-Oriented and Lineage-Oriented genealogy software programs". The article continues as follows.)

So, which type is better? Wrong question. Which type is better adapted to the use you intend to make of it? There are many different styles of research and many different objectives. First, let's consider what makes a good program of either type, and then we'll consider which type is best adapted to different approaches.

The first necessity in a genealogy program is being able to find the individual you want to work on. These days this is handled by a sorted list of all the individuals you have entered. This may be called the "index" or "picklist" (computerese) or something similar. By default this usually gives the surname, given name, birth and death (primary birth and death in an event-oriented program) and is sorted alphabetically by surname. At a minimum, the list should shift to an initial letter that you type (as in D for Doe) and there should be some way to enter an entire name, or selected part of it, and go to that name. The program should let you change the sort order and filter the list. Useful sort orders are conducted by surname (usual default), by given name (when you can remember the person's given name but can't recall the spelling of the surname to save your life), phonetically by surname and given name (according to how they sound as in "soundex"), by birth date, death date, and by ID number. Filtering is useful when you want to cut the size of the list; for example, filtering by a surname (ex: so that the list shows only "Doe"), or by surname phonetically (only Doe, Dough, Doh, etc), or by any of the other sort options.

Each source should only have to be entered once, with many records citing a single source. Further, the source record should be divided into fields, not a single free-form memo. Ideally, there should be a separate field for each piece of information: author, title, place of publication, publisher, and date. At a minimum, author, title, and publication information should be in separate fields. There should also be a free-form memo field for recording miscellaneous information about the source. It should be possible to designate a source type and have the program produce different footnote and bibliography entries for sources such as a published book and a will. These should follow one of the accepted standards, such as Richard LACKEY's <u>Cite Your Sources</u>. It is also nice to be able to customize the way full and brief footnotes will read for a particular source.

Make sure that the program provides a full range of reports. The program should produce at least a full range of the standard genealogical reports: descendancy narratives in at least one of the standard journal formats (Register or Record or preferably both). There should also be a narrative ahnentafel ancestry report. A custom narrative report is also desirable. In this you should be able to specify whether the report is to be an ancestry or descendancy narrative and what information is to be included. In the case of an event-oriented program, you should be able to choose to include either all events of the specified type or only those designated as primary.

It is also desirable to be able to customize the way sentences in the report will read, both globally and on a case by case basis if you have an event-oriented program. (I'm not sure it would be practical to set up a lineage-oriented program to do this.) Outline-style descendancy and ancestry reports are useful to carry with you when researching, and your program should be able to produce them. You should also be able to generate an index and source notes for your reports. Choose a program that allows you to place source notes as footnotes, endnotes, or in-line as you choose. You should be able to accumulate notes and index entries for several reports and add them on at the end (often called a book feature). By all means, make sure that your program understands "ibid". That is, when a series of notes cite the same source, those after the first should simply say "ibid" (an abbreviation meaning "the same") and you give the page number or other citation detail. It is also desirable that the program use a short form of the source title once it has been cited in full, but that is less important; you can live without it.

A program that offers these reports will also have a variety of list reports available. It should be possible to design a custom list report in which you can choose which information to be included. The top of the line event-oriented programs have a report design feature that allows you to design a new report from scratch, almost any way you choose. Depending upon personal preferences and the amount of time you have available, this feature may lure you into playing with it for hours or drive you to seek psychotherapeutic help.

The program you choose should be able to produce a cascaded pedigree chart (the program may call it a book form chart) which will indicate on which pages the end-of-line individuals are continued. These charts are usually universally implemented. Cascaded descent charts are messier to handle and less common but can be very nice to have. (For big single-sheet ancestry or descent charts, we're talking about special services that take your GEDCOM or data file and print out the chart on a plotter which is not a capability within the program.) The lovely presentation quality charts that many programs can produce are graphics, not text. They can be exported to your word processor as a graphic file, with some limitations. The ones I have tried don't seem to be able to export a cascaded chart as separate pages and the paste-in is an unusable mess.

Graphics import into word processors simply isn't designed to handle multiple pages in a single file. Single page charts, however, import beautifully. The drawback is that they are graphics, not text, therefore you can't edit them except in a drawing program. Some programs can produce text charts. These aren't as pretty but can be edited in your word processor and cascaded charts can be imported. You cannot use proportional fonts with these however or they will break up.

Having set up your report, you have to print it. A good program will let you send a report direct to your printer, to a print file, or to your word processor. A print file takes a bit of explaining. It is not a text file and if you open it in your word processor, what you see will be largely

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL DEDICATION

"GREATER LOVE HATH NO MAN THAN THIS, THAT A MAN LAY DOWN HIS LIFE FOR HIS FRIENDS."

"Marc Alan **KAHRE** dedicated his life as a policeman and citizen to the service of this community He was presented the Award of Honor for Bravery in January 1977, for saving a woman's life during a fire. However no task was too small or unimportant for him. Sheriff John **MORAN** stated, '... he gave his full measure of devotion.'"

These words began the petition to the Clark County Board of School Trustees to name a school for a man who had made life better for all who lived in this community and who had given his life as duty had demanded, doing that which he loved law enforcement. We who gather here to honor Marc would be remiss if we did not note that this is not only a time for reflection and appreciation to Marc, but a moment to celebrate the value of a man.

On May 11, 1989. approval was given to inscribe the name Marc A. **KAHRE** on this educational facility. It would be a tribute for him, his family and the Las Vegas Community. This action would forever place before the youth of this community a role model who would serve to inspire, guide, and lead our citizens of tomorrow.

The proud but short life span of Marc **KAHRE** began in Las Vegas where he was a native. He was educated in the schools or this district and when married, decided to live and rear his family in this city. After his formal schooling was complete, he began a distinguished and meritorious career with law enforcement. Under Sheriff Eric **COOPER** recalled, "he was happiest when working, and he never had an unhappy moment."

Marc did not restrict his community service to working hours. In his free time he participated in the Blue Knights' Organization, a service group for both active-duty and retired police officers. This international nonprofit organization raises funds for the "Walk Again Foundation." This then is the legacy that Marc KAHRE will leave for us: a life dedicated to helping others. Those few short years were packed with memories and accomplishments and this space could not begin to list all of his deeds of compassion, courage, and love. He was a policeman's policeman as stated by a colleague. This writer would record that he was a man for mankind.

This dedication will honor Marc, his wife, children, and the close family unit that remains together today. Those most honored will be the children who walk in this school, for their school name portrays dignity, service, honor and completion of a task done well. We, the

Marc **KAHRE** was a man who was loved and respected by many people. The word "integrity" described him best according to an interview with his wife. "He was a man of his word and if he said he would do something, he would do it."

Marc **KAHRE** was born 22 February 1954, in Washoe County, Nevada, to Jack and Jeaneen **KAHRE** (according to the *Las Vegas Sun*). He had a sister, Paula, who was a couple years younger than he was. He attended a military school in Long Beach, California through the seventh grade. He went to junior high school and was graduated from Clark High School in Las Vegas. After attending UNLV for a short time, he joined the police department at age twenty (nineteen / *Las Vegas Sun*).

When he first entered the department in 1973, he was a cadet. After attending the academy, he then became a police officer. After that, he became a training officer, then a motorcycle officer in 1979, when he joined the traffic division, and then a sergeant in 1984. In 1986, he resigned from Metro to pursue other interests. He returned to Metro 6 February 1988.

Officer **KAHRE** could do anything and fix anything. He loved motorcycles and built his first motorcycle when he was fourteen years old. Motorcycles and helping people were two of the favorite parts of his job.

He liked helping those who needed help and helping to make people happy. He did not like rude people or mean people. He had a great dislike for those who abused children or pets. And he didn't like anyone who broke the law. He took his job as a police office very seriously. In 1977, he received Metro's Award of Honor for Bravery for risking his life to save two people from a burning building

Mrs. KAHRE used to prepare a cheese omelette for him every

morning. He also liked Thai food, ice cream, and peanut butter and jelly sandwiches but only if she mixed one scoop of peanut butter and one scoop of jelly before putting it on the bread.

Marc **KAHRE** and his wife, Christine, were married for thirteen (13) years before his death. They had two sons, Brian who is now 19 years old and in his second year at UNLV, majoring in criminal justice and Kyle who is 17 years old and will be graduating from Bonanza High School this year (1998-99) and then go to Brigham Young University. Marc was proud to be a father, proud of his two sons, and loved his sons very much.

Marc was killed 11 October 1988, in the line of duty. He was 34 years old at the time of his death. Marc was buried 14 October 1988, at Palm Valley View Memorial Park in Las Vegas, Nevada following his funeral service at Palm Mortuary, 1325 N. Main Street in Las Vegas.

FIVE STEPS TO YOUR FAMILY HISTORY

- 1. Identify what you know about your family
 - a. Write down what you know on a Pedigree Chart
 - b. Write surnames in all capital letters
 - c. Always list dates 3 Mar 1895, not Mar 3, 1895
 - d. Write places: City/Township,County,State,Country
 - e. Fill out Family Group Records for each family (if you are a parent, you will appear as a child with your parents and again as a parent with your children)
- 2. Decide what you want to learn
 - a. Pedigree charts: when & where born, married, died
 - Pick an ancestor from pedigree chart and identify which questions you want to answer about him
- 3. Select records to search
 - a. compiled records: records that have already been researched by others (biographies, family histories, etc.)
 - Original records: records that were created at or near the time of an event, such as birth, marriage, death or census records
- 4. Obtain and search the record
 - a. Many local libraries have good genealogical material, especially local material; Family History Centers have or can get records
 - Search the records; look at broad time periods, check spelling variation, write down results - even if you find nothing
- 5. Use the Information

- b. Copy the information to pedigree charts and family group sheets

This is the answer to not asking, "what is a query?"

When I took the beginning genealogy class several years ago, we looked at the queries in Everton's Helper. A query is asking for help on your research. If you have checked an Everton's lately you will see some terribly bad queries: I am researching, **JONES**, **SMITH**, **JOHNSON**, **MILLER**, and **WILLIAMS** in Kentucky, will Exchange information. My Name, Address.

Now I bet half the people reading that query would have an ancestor by one of the names, but would you reply? And what chance is there of a connection to you. Powerball Odds??

A good query would list the county, time frame and also given names and wives names with common names . I realize you may not have all that information but put in as much as possible. Online queries here on Prodigy differ in that a lot of people use note preview which shows the first 59 characters of the query. A query that starts:

I am researching in New York State for my Great Grandparents Richard and Rhoda **HELLENBOLT**. Richard was born 1815.

Now what did the first 59 characters tell you: I am researching in New York State for my Great Grandparent if you were in a hurry would you look further?? I probably would not. Good query:

Richard **HELLENBOLT** b. 1815 New York State, wife Rhoda, can someone help me find the maiden name of Rhoda and the parents of Richard.

If you had a **HELLENBOLT** for an ancestor would you look at this query even if you were in a hurry? I would. (I do have **HELLENBOLT**s for ancestors).

1998 FGS Conference

19-22 August in Cincinnati, Ohio

This year's Federation of Genealogical Society Conference was a superb four-day conference, once again offering something for every level of researcher. The conference hotel was connected to the convention center by a second story sky-walk which made it very convenient. This conference was somewhat smaller than the NGS (National Genealogical Society) Conference which was held in Denver this May.

A friend and I flew to Cincinnati a couple of days before the conference began so that we could check out the local research facilities. We spent part of the first day at the University of Cincinnati where they have an excellent German-Americana Collection. This collection, the largest of its kind in the world, is based on the private library of Dr. Heinrich H. **FICK** who was Supervisor of the German Department of the Cincinnati Public Schools from 1903 to 1918. Dr. **FICK** took special interest in collecting books, documents, journals, and other materials pertaining to the German-American experience. He was forced into retirement by the anti-German hysteria of World War I and then devoted himself to building his library until he died in 1935. At that time his library was acquired by the University of Cincinnati and since then, the collection has steadily grown. The **Catalog of German-Americana Collection**, University of Cincinnati by K. G. **SAUR**, was published in 1990, which provides access to over five thousand items in a subject, locality and surname index. They also have the Ohio Network Collection which is a collection of government records for the following eight counties in southwestern Ohio: Adams, Brown, Butler, Clermont, Clinton, Hamilton, Highland, and Warren. I didn't have time to check out those sources, but according to the handouts at the archives, these records include birth, death, marriage, citizenship and probate records. Location: University of Cincinnati, 8th floor- Carl **BLEGEN** Library, Mail: PO Box 210113, Cincinnati, OH 45221-0113; Phone: 513 556-1959; Fax: 513 556-2113.

We then spent a couple of days at the Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County which was a huge facility. The History and Genealogy Department is located on the third floor of the South Building and the catalog can be accessed through the Internet: http://plch.lib.oh.us. The library houses all federal census microfilm for the years 1790-1920, some printed indexes, some county histories, many city directories, passenger indexes for cities east of the Mississippi, military records, Sanborn Fire Insurance maps and other maps. They also hold a large collection of family histories.

This library also houses a Public Document and Patents Department where we searched the indexes for information on my husband's great-great grandfather, George F. **GREEN**, who was an inventor. Although I have photocopies of all his patents, the library had short summaries of each patent available in book form in the series titled **The Official Gazette of the United States Patent Office**. George F. **GREEN** had many patents from 1875-1893 and the summaries of the patents (including diagrams) will be very helpful in putting together information about his dispute with Thomas A. **EDISON**. The library also has the entire microfilm collection of the Thomas A. **EDISON** papers where I found a couple of references to George F. **GREEN**. The first letter was dated 9 December 1881, from George F. **GREEN**, Manufacturer of Electro Motors, Office, 132 Academy St, Kalamazoo, Michigan to T. A. **EDISON** in Menlo Park, N.J. This letter was in reference to the electric railroad as was another letter dated 6 January 1882. This matter is going to be fascinating to pursue as there is also a note from Thomas **EDISON** to George stating that he (Thomas) "had been working on it for a long time back." Location: Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County, 800 Vine St., Cincinnati, OH 45202-1071; Phone 513 369- 6905.

The conference began Wednesday, August 19th with lectures for society members or, as I opted, for an entire day of APG (Association of Professional Genealogists) Professional Management Seminars. The rest of the week was spent at very informative lectures and workshops. I attended a two-hour "hands-on" workshop on court records by Charles A. **SHERRILL** which was excellent. My favorite lectures covered the following topics: Law, English probate system, tax records in Virginia and Kentucky, New York research, tracing African Americans in cities, and tracing early French in the Midwest, just to name a few.

It was interesting to check out the Directory of Conference Registrants as I was the ONLY one from Nevada. Hopefully next year others from Nevada will have the opportunity to expand their skills by attending the FGS Conference which will be held 11-14 August 1999, in St. Louis, MO.

WRITING GENEALOGICAL CORRESPONDENCE

Like many hobbyists I learned good research habits by making mistakes or achieving success. Letter writing was no different. The responses to my first letters were embarrassing. The clerks who read my letters found them unclear or lacking in important information required to locate the record. After more than a few returned requests, I did my best to follow these simple rules:

- * Determine the correct address for the agency that can provide a certified copy of an official record.
- * Always know the correct cost of the record or search you want. Send the payment in an acceptable form. I always send payment in the form of a money order. Virtually everyone accepts money orders since they are as good as cash.
- * When I anticipate writing lots of letters to a specific area I purchase a phone book for that town or county.
- * Be specific about the record you ask for and always include enough information about the person in the record you expect to find. When you send for a birth record, also mention the mother's maiden name and the father's name as well as any dates or places that might be used to confirm the identity of a person.
- * Provide as much information as you can on one page. The longer the letter the less likely you are to get a good response.
- * Be neat. Make sure your letter is easy to read.
- * Keep in mind that official records are not kept primarily for genealogical purposes. Registrars are busy with the work of the courts and other public agencies.
- * Don't write with a chip on your shoulder. An angry, pushy, or demanding attitude gets you nothing. Look at it this way: in most cases you will be writing for information where you don't pay taxes. The fee you pay for the record probably doesn't cover the entire cost of the search. Your success depends on how well you write the letter and on the quality of the information you supply. An angry letter is going to get very little notice. Angry letters can also ruin the next search for the next family historian who mails a request to that same clerk.
- * Always send a self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE) with each request. I do this even if the cost of the record should include return postage.

Things have improved a lot since I started in the 1980s. The Palladium Interactive Records Requester http://www.uftree.com is an excellent genealogical utility for creating and tracking my correspondence. It contains many of the addresses you will need for vital record searches in the U.S. and abroad. (Records Requester comes with default letters in 13 languages.) You can edit letters that the program creates to reflect your writing style, and even keep copies of the letters for later review. The handy correspondence log in the product not only tracks the letters it creates, it lets me log all my correspondence. For sure, I'll never write the same letter twice. My correspondence is clearer and includes all the important information.

gibberish. A print file is a file of the codes that would be sent to a printer attached to your computer. This may not seem very useful, but let us suppose that your printer is a nine-pin dot matrix machine and that you have access to a fiend's laser printer. Wouldn't it be nice to send your report to your friend's printer? That's what a print file is for.

Being able to send a report to your word processor may be crucial or unimportant, depending on your needs, tastes, and setup. If you have found that WordPad is as much a word processor as you need and have no desire to move to anything else, you probably couldn't do anything in your word processor that your genealogy program can't do. On the other hand, if you are using or plan to learn Word or Word Perfect or a similar business-grade word processor, then it should be a must-have. The ideal situation would be the ability to export a native-format file to your word processor. Rich text format (RFT) will work, however. Make sure that the implementation in your program can export indices, end/foot notes, and tables of contents as imbedded codes, not as text. That way you can add changes and new text you've done in your word processor to the index, and pagination changes caused by the new text or changes in font will be automatically reflected.

Graphics capability gets us into an area involving preferences more than definable requirements. If you want to be able to develop a "scrap book" of scanned-in images that run on your computer, make sure that your program is capable of it. Don't assume anything in this area; the "top of the line", most expensive program you can buy won't do this. It can import graphics files, but purely for research purposes, and displays them only individually, on command. If you plan to print your reports directly on your printer and want to include photos, make sure that your program can do this. The "top of the line" program again doesn't do it because it is designed to send a report to a word processor where graphic files can be inserted wherever you want them. Once you have learned how to do it, and if your word processor has that ability, you can bring graphics into your page.

I suppose it says something about genealogy's love-hate relationship with GEDCOM that in all the discussion and correspondence generated by the first post of this article (on the Internet), NO-ONE pointed out that I completely forgot to mention GEDCOM. There are two major competing theories about GEDCOM. One claims that it is an agreed-upon set of standards for organizing genealogical data for transport between programs using different ways of organizing internal data. The other recognizes it as part of a plot to ensure psychotherapists of full employment. I incline towards the conspiracy theory, but my wife, who is a shrink, assures me that I'm being overly suspicious. She says that three or more psychotherapists could never agree on the details of any such complicated undertaking. As regards the data-transfer theory, GEDCOM transfers are far from simple. The standard has been through several released versions and even more proposed ones as the data to be transferred has grown ever more complex. Make sure that your program can import and generate both GEDCOM 4 and GEDCOM 5.5. (Beware of versions of 5; some of the programmers jumped the gun and implemented versions that hadn't been agreed on and other programs can't read them.) When you exchange GEDCOMS with someone, make sure both programs read the same versions. And watch your options. Most programs let you select which tags to export and which to import; failure to check on how the programs have been set can lead to interesting results.


