

DAR DATABASE NOW AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC

EVERTON NEWSLINE August 27, 2005

Towards the beginning of last century, the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) worked with members to transcribe previously unpublished records of genealogical value to assist "staff genealogists, potential members and the public." Almost a century and 17,000 typescripts of records later, these books, known as the Genealogical Records Committee Reports (GRC), represent a large and unique segment of the collection of the DAR Library in Washington, DC, where the entire national collection is located. State sets of these reports can sometimes be found in various libraries within each respective state.

From 1970-1972, the Genealogical Society of Utah microfilmed portions of these books. More than 50% however, have never been microfilmed, and while many books contain indexes, these are only helpful when someone physically looks at a book... UNTIL NOW.

A grassroots project that began a few years ago has just come online. DAR members from around the country began creating statewide indexes for each state's set of GRC Reports. The work began in Virginia, then in Maryland and West Virginia, with members using SkyIndex software to create these extremely valuable finding aids.

The President General of DAR, Linda Tinker **WATKINS**, felt this project so important that she incorporated the indexing of the GRC Reports into her larger "President General's Project" to create databases, indexes and finding aids for many DAR materials. It resulted in the first version of the DAR Library's "National Index to the Genealogical Records Committee Reports" and it is now available free on-line for any researcher to use at: http://www.dar.org.

READ ALL ABOUT WASHINGTON TERRITORY

Pioneer ancestors are hard to trace into the unsettled frontier where they had limited opportunities to leave records. The Washington State Library makes researching pioneers easier with its online database of three early newspapers:

The Columbian, Washington territory's first newspaper, which was published weekly in Olympia (available in the library's database from Sept. 11, 1852 to Nov. 26, 1853);

The Walla Walla Statesman weekly (available Oct. 20, 1865 through Dec. 27, 1867) and

The Washington Pioneer, another Olympia weekly (available December 1853 to January 1854)

Go to: http://www.secstate.wa.gov/history/newspapers.aspx to search the papers on a keyword, ancestor's surname or place. (Full-text searches aren't available.) Click on Personal Name Search to find a first and last name--but remember that the paper may have used just last names and maybe a first initial. Scroll to the bottom of the search page to select a newspaper or get search tips.

DON'T IGNORE ANY POTENTIAL RESOURCE EVEN FAMOUS ONES!

Quite recently, Holly HANSEN was invited to speak on Irene JOHNSON's "Relatively Speaking", a genealogy radio program. HANSEN had asked her readers at Everton to submit successful stories about finding lost relatives. She received several good ones and allowed me to go through some of them. I was really intrigued by the several of the stories, but one by Michelle E. POLLOCK was intriguing to me. She describes her story as: "Not only a success story, but also illustrates the foolishness of ignoring any potential resource."

"Many years ago when my distant cousin Francs **UNGER** shared her **ADAMS** genealogy files with me, I was surprised to discover in those records an inquiry from another cousin, Phyllis **ADAMS** of Detroit, MI, seeking information on her father. Phyllis' parents separated/divorced when she was an infant in the 1920s and the mother was apparently both embarrassed and bitter about the same." She refused to tell Phyllis the truth about her father and he took that to her grave.

Michelle was surprised to see Phyllis' inquiry because just a few weeks earlier she discovered a letter written in 1951 by Phyllis' father! Checking city directories for Seattle, WA, at the Library of Congress, Michelle found that he was an agent for an insurance company based in Windsor, Canada, right across from Detroit! By this time, Phyllis had given up on finding her father, especially since her mother had died. Michelle agreed to help her cousin in her search.

They began looking at the corporation offices of her father's employer for personnel files, but there were none. "As I was unable to find her father in editions of the Seattle directories after 1951," said Michelle, "that is where the search for him stayed for about 5 years when I was invited to a reunion of the family at Fort Ashby, West Virginia. While there, I was approached by at least half a dozen persons who began our conversations with "You'll never guess who came to our reunion a few years ago...."

"I recognized the name immediately, but was puzzled why [this person] would have attended. I asked about his connection to the family and those able to respond said "his grandfather was Edgar Jacob ADAMS." Phyllis was not only a granddaughter of Edgar, but so far as my research could establish, her father, Charles Leslie ADAMS was Edgar's only child! That said, no one could recall that visitor stating his father's name, much less as Charles Leslie ADAMS."

"As I had recognized the visitor's name, I knew that I would find a biographical sketch of him in "Who's Who" upon returning home. When I checked the same, it identified his father as.... Charles Leslie ADAMS!"

Michelle eventually contacted the gentleman and arranged to meet "to compare notes." She learned that Charles had moved to Sun City, AZ, where HE died in the early 1960s, and he never spoke of having been previously married or having a child by that marriage. Thus, learning that he had an older half-sister was as much of a surprise to this man's son as it was to Phyllis to learn that Brock **ADAMS**, Congressman, U.S. Senator and Secretary of Transportation during the president of Jimmy **CARTER**, was her half-brother!"

"In retrospect," says Michelle, "I realize that just knowing that Phyllis' father was living in Seattle, the city with which **BROCK** is primarily associated, should have suggested I consider the possibility that **BROCK** was related to Phyllis when I found Charles living there. I discounted the same simply because people are too often quick to assert kinship to famous people of the same surname whether there is any real evidence of the same or not! I will never make that mistake again!"

It's interesting that famous people, just like the rest of us, have real lost relatives, not just those who are eager to associate with them. As Michelle says, don't discount them just because of who they are since where they came from may be the most important factor.

Historical Society of Germans from Russia Studies Ancestors

Local chapter shares interest in learning about Germans who left homeland in 1760s and suffered centuries of persecution

Talk about displaced persons, members of the Southern Nevada Chapter of the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia share a heritage of ancestors who fled Germany for Russia, only to be persecuted there and flee to places including the American Upper Midwest, from which some of their descendants found their way to Las Vegas.

"It's a fascinating story," said Larrie **SCHMIDT**, chapter president. "Our people are legendary in Germany. We're known as the **Volga Germans** in Germany."

The Volga is in Russia, and that's where the story starts. **SCHMIDT** said his ancestors were part of a group that left Germany between 1763 and 1767 at the invitation of **CATHERINE the GREAT** of Russia, who was trying to bring some enlightenment to her backward countryside. **SCHMIDT** said his ancestors left in 1763.

"There were 3,000 original families, and we were one of them," he said.

Under the empress' reign, the resettled Germans were pioneers of sorts — **SCHMIDT** likens them to the emigrants who helped settle the American West — but after her death they were outcasts, and many returned to Germany or moved on to other places, sometimes just in the nick of time.

"Thank God my grandparents came (to America) in 1906," **SCHMIDT** said, "because what happened was that World War I stopped the emigration. Right after World War I, the Communists took power and wouldn't allow them to leave. The hatred was especially (strong) after Germany invaded Russia in 1941."

"Many of the Germans in Russia were rounded up," **SCHMIDT** said.

"They put them in cattle cars and shipped them to Siberia," he

said. "Many thousands died en route. Those that survived ended up in gulags."

"Communication was cut off," **SCHMIDT** said, adding that his grandmother didn't know what happened to her sisters in Russia until Nikita **KRUSHCHEV** came to America in 1959.

"As a gesture of goodwill, he allowed the German Russians to send letters out to their relatives," he said. "That's how my grandmother found out that her sister was still alive in Siberia. We found out their fate — and it was a horrible fate."

To learn more about their ancestors and their suffering, the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia was formed in the 1960s.

"Another of the organization's reason for being," **SCHMIDT** said, "is *pride*, the same reason the Indians band together. Your ancestors suffered such great cruelty that you form these historical organizations not to prolong the memory of the cruelty but to honor those who endured it."

"The Germans in Russia," he said, "were unique not so much that they suffered cruelty in a foreign land, but they had left Germany because of all the cruelty there."

"The headquarters in **SCHMIDT**'s hometown of Lincoln, Neb. provides tremendous research facilities," he said. "They helped me track my ancestors back to the year 1700."

SCHMIDT said the Las Vegas chapter, which is about a year old, has about 15 members. "We feel certain there are a lot more of us here," he said. "There are a lot of Nebraskans here."

The group generally meets once a month. Membership is open to all descendants of the Germans in Russia. For more information, call 731-5860.

A One-Step Portal for On-Line Genealogy

StephenMorse.org

In the "old days" genealogical research was done by traveling great distances and then going through dust archives or using microfilm readers. With the advent of the computer, things have changed. Today, much of the data useful to genealogists can be accessed from the comfort of home.

Unfortunately, many of these sites are not easy to use. The user is often required to click here and click again in order to 'drill down' to the data being searched for – and often getting lost in the process. Well, Stephen P. MORSE, a genealogist, database designer and computer programmer has changed all that. Stephen has created alternate ways of accessing many of these sites by creating his own applications to facilitate the research. These applications are collected under what Mr. MORSE refers to as the *One-Step* website. Specifically, *One-Step* provide more powerful interfaces for searching existing databases.

Due to space limitations, we cannot go to much into detail; however, for a good introduction, go to *StephenMorse.org* and search for an

ancestor that entered America through Ellis Island, Castle Island, or one of several other ports.

Census searching on *One-Step* is greatly simplified. Enumeration districts, **NARA** and **LDS** microfilm roll numbers can easily be obtained. If you have a subscription to *Ancestry.com*, the *One-Step* census/rolls page will link you directly to the census images for the selected Enumeration District. Ever wonder what the Occupations Code designations are? *One-Step* quickly answers the question.

Another great feature of *One-Step* is the capability of searching the Social Security Death Records of five popular sites.

One-Step interfaces with several other, specialized, sites, such as records of the Jewish Genealogical Society of New York and the Italian Genealogical Group for parts of New York State. One-Step also converts various calendars used over the years. You can even print out a yearly calendar for any year, with holidays and personal family dates.

Standard maps, aerial photo maps and zip code maps are also available.

Black German Holocaust Victims

So much of our history is lost to us because we often don't write the history books, don't film the documentaries, or don't pass the accounts down from generation to generation. One documentary now touring the film festival circuit, telling us to "Always Remember" is "Black Survivors of the Holocaust" (1997). Outside the U.S., the film is entitled "HILTER's Forgotten Victims" (Afro-Wisdom Productions). It codifies another dimension to the "Never Forget" Holocaust story-our dimension.

Did you know that in the 1920s, there were 24,000 Blacks living in Germany? Neither did I. Here's how it happened, and how many of them were eventually caught unaware by the events of the Holocaust.

Like most West European nations, Germany established colonies in Africa in the late 1800s in what later became Togo, Cameroon, SPAN Namibia, and Tanzania. German genetic experiments began there, most notably involving prisoners taken from the 1904 Heroro Massacre that left 60,000 Africans dead, following a 4-year revolt against German colonization. After the shellacking Germany received in World War I, it was stripped of its African colonies in 1918.

As a spoil of war, the French were allowed to occupy Germany in the Rhineland-a bitter piece of real estate that has gone back and forth between the two nations for centuries. The French wilfully deployed their own colonized African soldiers as the occupying force. Germans viewed this as the final insult of World War I, and, soon thereafter, 92% of them voted in the Nazi party.

Hundreds of the African Rhineland-based soldiers intermarried with German women and raised their children as Black Germans. In Mein Kampf, **HILTER** wrote about his plans for these "Rhineland Bastards". When he came to power, one of his first directives was aimed at these mixed-race children. Underscoring **HILTER**'s obsession with racial purity, by 1937, every identified mixed-race child in the Rhineland had been forcibly sterilized, in order to prevent further "race polluting", as **HILTER** termed it.

Hans **HAUCK**, a Black Holocaust survivor and a victim of **HILTER**'s mandatory sterilization program, explained in the film "**HILTER**'s Forgotten Victims" that, when he was forced to undergo sterilization as a teenager, he was given no anaesthetic. Once he received his sterilization certificate, he was "free to go", so long as he agreed to have no sexual relations whatsoever with Germans.

Although most Black Germans attempted to escape their fatherland, heading for France where people like Josephine **BAKER** were steadily aiding and supporting the French Underground, many still encountered problems elsewhere. Nations shut their doors to Germans, including the Black ones. Some Black Germans were able to eke out a living during **HILTER**'s reign of terror by performing in Vaudeville shows, but many Blacks, steadfast in their belief that they were German first, Black second, opted to remain in Germany. Some fought with the Nazis (a few even became Lutwaffe pilots)!

Unfortunately, many Black Germans were arrested, charged with treason, and shipped in cattle cars to concentration camps. Often these trains were so packed with people and (equipped with no bathroom facilities or food), that, after the four-day journey, box car doors were opened to piles of the dead and dying. Once inside the concentration camps, Blacks were given the worst jobs conceivable.

Some Black American soldiers, who were captured and held as prisoners of war, recounted that, while they were being starved and forced into dangerous labour (violating the Geneva Convention), they were still better off than Black German concentration camp detainees who were forced to do the unthinkable-man the crematoriums and work in labs where genetic experiments were being conducted. As a final sacrifice, these Blacks were killed every three months so that they would never be able to reveal the inner workings of the "Final Solution".

In every story of Black oppression, no matter how we were enslaved, shackled, or beaten, we always found a way to survive and to rescue others. As a case in point, consider Johnny VOSTE, a Belgian resistance fighter who was arrested in 1942, for alleged sabotage and then shipped to Dachau. One of his jobs was stacking vitamin crates. Risking his own life, he distributed hundreds of vitamins to camp detainees, which saved the lives of many who were starving, weak, and ill-conditions exacerbated by extreme vitamin deficiencies. His motto was "No, you can't have my life; I will fight for it"

According to Essex University's Delroy CONSTANTINE-SIMMS, there were Black Germans who resisted Nazi Germany, such as Lari GILGES, who founded the Northwest Rann-an organization of entertainers that fought the Nazis in his home town of Dusseldorf-and who was murdered by the SS in 1933, the year that HILTER came into power.

Little information remains about the numbers of Black Germans held in the camps or killed under the Nazi regime. Some victims of the Nazi sterilization project and Black survivors of the Holocaust are still alive and telling their story in films such as "Black Survivors of the Nazi Holocaust", but they must also speak out for justice, not just history.

Unlike Jews (in Israel and in Germany), Black Germans receive no war reparations because their German citizenship was revoked (even though they were German-born). The only pension they get is from those of us who are willing to tell the world their stories and continue their battle for recognition and compensation.

After the war, scores of Blacks who had somehow managed to survive the Nazi regime, were rounded up and tried as war criminals. Talk about the final insult! There are thousands of Black Holocaust stories, from the triangle trade, to slavery in America, to the gas ovens in Germany. We often shy away from hearing about our historical past because so much of it is painful; however, we are in this struggle together for rights, dignity, and, yes, reparations for wrongs done to us through the centuries. We need to always remember so that we can take steps to ensure that these atrocities never happen again.

THE WEIRD AND THE UNUSUAL (SOURCES) DOG LICENSE RECORD BOOK

Would you look for your relatives and/or ancestors in a Dog License Record book? Yes! No!!

It sounds unusual but it can be a good source of genealogical information depending upon what your ancestral community recorded.

Recently, I was researching back home while on a trip to supervise some repairs on our summer home. Of course, time must be found to do some research when on such a trip, especially when you are on old stomping grounds.

Since I had been to this research facility (The Iron Range Research Center) many times, I had been through many of the sources that were located in the main library section and was hoping to find something new and exciting. I asked about the archives which were located on a lower floor. After a few minutes the archivist came up to the main floor to meet me and discuss what I might want to find which would be of interest. Well, naturally, I'm interested in just about everything, so after chatting for a while, she invited me to tour the archives since it had been a number of years since I had done so.

In the course of our tour we stopped at the worktable where "new" items were waiting to be catalogued. She showed me some of the items which had recently been acquired. There was a book of Immunizations which sounded interesting, then she showed me a Dog License Record book from Virginia, Minnesota .. my home town. I laughed and said I would definitely love to look at this source everyone in our family loved dogs. So up I went with this book along with some other items that I had selected.

What did I find? A wonderful source!

I found Grandpa, Grandma, Uncle, Father, Mother, and Brother all going to purchase dog license tags through a succession of years. I also found neighbors, parents of friends, and high school pals doing the same.

But what was so great was that I was able to find two locations and time periods where my parents had lived after they were first married; I was not aware of these locations! I found the names of dogs and their descriptions, some of whom I knew and others that I did not. "Meat on the bones!"

This book started in 1911, and progressed through the years to the 1980s. Not only did I find genealogical information and meat for the bones, but I enjoyed going through the book, page by page, to see who loved dogs, who faithfully purchased their yearly dog tags, and what variety of names these dogs had during the years and how they

changed. A great source of history.

Other leads or "*meat for the bones*" which were derived from this source were:

- 1. The "good character" of my friend's father who faithfully registered his dog, Sam, year after year; many of the citizens registered their dogs only intermittently.
- 2. Wives (Mrs. Arvo **JYTYLA**) registering the dog; if I didn't know when a my parents married, I could start from this date and work backward to find their marriage.
- 3. Families: husbands, wives, and children often took turns registering the dog; since they all lived at the same address, they comprised a "family" which could be verified from the census, city directory, etc.
- 4. Even changes in street names were found during a certain period; the house numbers remained the same but the street names changed.; I found this to be a fact.
- Since dogs' names were also recorded with the color of the dog, I could identify dogs in my family photos to make the photos more meaningful.

These were some of the additional things derived from this source.

Now we know that not all libraries or research centers would have a source such as this, but this example bring to mind that we all need to be open to asking questions of personnel who know what is held in the facility when we are researching. And we need to be open to looking at those unusual and odd sources which we might ordinarily pass up to see what they might reveal.

"What other sources do you have beside the usual ones" or "What have you received that is a "different" source?" are questions you can ask when you are researching in your ancestral area. We need to ASK QUESTIONS to find those "FUN" and unusual sources. They may hold valuable information when you begin to explore what was recorded...ABOUT YOUR ANCESTOR.

Disposable Mirror

Ancestry Ouick Tip (5/13/2004)

A suggestion for those taking pictures of gravestones. On last year's cemetery trip, we took a flat, metal cookie sheet in our luggage to use for sun-reflection at the cemeteries. However, we found that it held us up at airport security checks. Packing a large mirror wasn't very feasible, either.

We've found a better way: Now we make our own mirror, using a piece of heavy cardboard and a large square of heavy-duty aluminum foil (folded up). With a paper clip or tape, the cardboard can be

covered with the foil, used at the cemetery, and even discarded before boarding the plane to return home. It also weighs less than the cookie sheet or mirror. [On last year's trip, we paid a \$25 fee to the airline for an overweight suitcase because it was packed with all our genealogy stuff!]

One other quick tip: We also pack a couple of large mailing envelopes, addressed to our home address, in which we can mail back some of our paperwork, books, etc., that we accumulate on the trip. This also reduces the weight of our luggage on our return trip.

Using Approximate Year of Birth to Help Find Ellis Island Arrivals.

Magician and escape artist **Harry HOUDINI** is among the many notable passengers to have arrived through the Port of New York at Ellis Island. At times, you may think your ancestors simply vanished prior to their arrival, but using an **approximate year of birth** may be the best way to help find the record of their arrival through Ellis Island.

yields 7 results, 3 of whom are named Harry. If you look closely at the records, you'll notice the 1911 arrival of Harry (age 37, year of birth 1874) is likely to be the same as the 40-year old arrival in 1914 and the 46-year old arrival in 1920. His wife Beatrice is also found with multiple arrivals traveling with her husband.

Exact Year vs. Approximate Year of Birth:

You may have obtained a year of birth for a passenger from an obituary, headstone or a birth, marriage, or death certificate. Often times, even these records can contain errors. If you search using Year of Birth, try first with the exact year as indicated by your other record sources. If your search doesn't yield any meaningful results, expand your search by using a wider **year range**. If your records indicate an 1875 birth, try using 1875 plus/minus 2 years - this will expand your approximate year of birth to include all records for passengers born 1873 through 1877, inclusive.



Benefits of using an Approximate Year of Birth include:

- A Year of Birth is more easily obtained for many vs. year of arrival
- Quickly narrow the number of records from a search yielding many results
- Being able to specify a range (e.g. plus or minus 2 years) helps filter results
- Year of Birth can quickly help identify multiple arrivals for the same passenger

In the simple example above, a search for Last Name "Houdini"

Marion Earl Elementary School School Motto Aim High! Marion Bradley EARL

Marion **EARL** Elementary School opened in the Fall of 1987 and was dedicated on March 1, 1988. The school is named for Marion Bradley **EARL**, a Nevada pioneer, a practitioner of the law for more than sixty years, and a leader in his church and community.

Marion Bradley **EARL** was born September 13, 1897, in Bunkerville, Nevada, to Joseph Ira **EARL** and Agnes Viola **BUNKER EARL**. Marion was the recipient of a strong pioneer heritage on both sides of his family. In 1877, the town of Bunkerville was founded by his maternal grandfather, Edward **BUNKER**, Sr., under the direction of Brigham **YOUNG**.

In 1917, his family moved to Overton, Nevada, and Marion matriculated to the University of Utah where he obtained a degree in education. Returning to Moapa Valley, Nevada, he began his professional career as a teacher, and in 1922, he met Lucille **PIKE**, who was teaching at the high school. In February of 1924, Lucille and Marion were married. The **EARL**'s had two sons, Tony and Johnny.

In 1927, Marion decided that his future did not lie in teaching and moved to Washington, D. C., where he attended George Washington Law School. By 1931, he completed his law degree.

Marion established his law practice in Las Vegas and became active in a number of community organizations, including the American Legion, Chamber of Commerce, and Rotary Club, where he served as president of each organization. His longest and most difficult assignment began when he and Dr. John S. PARK ("Rich Easterner who opened First State Bank in Las Vegas' earliest years") and Mr. J. D. SMITH were called to be members of the county draft board. Marion served on the board for 28 years and had the honor of meeting every president from Franklin D. ROOSEVELT to Richard NIXON. During these years, Marion was the driving force in forming the Boulder Dam Area Council for the Boys Scouts of America.

"In the history of men there are individuals who experience life with boundless energy and love. They have a purpose, a mission, a labor to perform. When these few complete their lives, we mourn. However, he would have us remember his example which proclaims the love of God, family, Nevada, and America."

Marion Bradley EARL died 24 February 1988.

Wild Horses Win Vote for State Quarter


Morning in Nevada — Winning Design

HISTORY OF "TAPS"



Where Did "TAPS" Come From?

Military District of Washington Fact Sheet: Origins of "Taps"

During the Civil War, in July 1862, when the Army of the Potomac was in camp, Brig. Gen. Daniel **BUTTERFIELD** summoned Pvt. Oliver Wilcox **NORTON**, his brigade bugler, to his tent.


BUTTERFIELD, who disliked the colorless "extinguish lights" call then in use, whistled a new tune and asked the bugler to sound it for him. After repeated trials and changing the time of some notes which were scribbled on the back of an envelope, the call was finally arranged to suit Gen. **BUTTERFIELD** and used for the first time that night.

Pvt. **NORTON**, who on several occasions had sounded numerous new calls composed by his commander, recalled his experience of the origin of "Taps" years later:

"One day in July 1862, when the Army of the Potomac was in camp at Harrison's Landing on the James River, Virginia, resting and recruiting from its losses in the seven days of battle before Richmond, Gen. **BUTTERFIELD** summoned the writer to his tent, and whistling some new tune, asked the bugler to sound it for him. This was done, not quite to his satisfaction at first, but after repeated trials, changing the time of some of the notes, which were scribbled on the back of an envelope, the call was finally arranged to suit the general.

"He then ordered that it should be substituted in his brigade for the regulation "Taps" (extinguish lights) which was printed in the <u>Tactics</u> and used by the whole army. This was done for the first time that night. The next day buglers from nearby brigades came over to the camp of **BUTTERFIELD**'s brigade to ask the meaning of this new call. They liked it and, copying the music, returned to their camps, but it was not until some time later, when generals of other commands had heard its melodious notes, that orders were issued, or permission given, to substitute it throughout the Army of the Potomac for the time-honored call which came down from West Point.

"In the western armies the regulation call was in use until the autumn

of 1863. At that time the XI and XII Corps were detached from the Army of the Potomac and sent under command of Gen. **HOOKER** to reinforce the Union Army at Chattanooga, Tenn. Through its use in these corps, it became known in the western armies and was adopted by them. From that time, it became and remains to this day the official call for "Taps." It is printed in the present **Tactics** and is used throughout the U.S. Army, the National Guard, and all organizations of veteran soldiers.

"Gen. **BUTTERFIELD**, in composing this call and directing that it be used for "Taps" in his brigade, could not have foreseen its popularity and the use for another purpose into which it would grow. Today, whenever a man is buried with military honors anywhere in the United States, the ceremony is concluded by firing three volleys of musketry over the grave, and sounding with the trumpet or bugle "Put out the lights. Go to sleep"...There is something singularly beautiful and appropriate in the music of this wonderful call. Its strains are melancholy, yet full of rest and peace. Its echoes linger in the heart long after its tones have ceased to vibrate in the air."



Saving Graves

How to Interpret Gravestone Motifs

These are a few of the many motifs that are found on gravestones along with some of the more commonly held interpretations of their symbolism.

- Hand of God Chopping Sudden Death
- Hand with Finger Pointing Gone Home, Look to God, Direction. The pointing finger represents direction, whether physical, spiritual or psychological.
- Handshakes Carry a variety of meanings including, greeting, goodbye, friendship, solidarity, unity and agreement, and the doubling of power achieved through partnership. The right hand is the life-force or hand of power. An eye associated with a hand symbolizes clairvoyant action.
- Harp-Harmony with the universe and ascent to higher things, a bridge between heaven and earth. In Judaism, the harp is a symbol of David, conqueror of Goliath and king of Israel. David's harp playing relieved King Saul's depression and when he became king, the midnight wind playing on a harp that overhung his bed called him to study the Torah.
- Hearts Soul in Bliss or Love of Christ
- Hooped Snake In 18th and 19th century New England, this symbol meant eternity.
- Horns The Resurrection
- Hourglass Mortality. The swiftness of time. Because it must be turned upside down for the sand to run out, it also represents the cycle of life and death, and heaven and earth. In Christianity, it personifies temperance.
- Hourglass with Wings of Time Time Flying; Short Life
- Imps Mortality
- Iris Light and Hope. With its pointed leaves, it's often called the sword Lilly and is associated with the sorrow of the Virgin Mary. To the Chinese, this flower represents affection, grace and beauty.
- Ivy Immortality, Friendship, Faithfulness. Because it is an
 evergreen that clings while climbing, it signifies the need for
 protection. Since it grows quickly, it also symbolizes regeneration, sensuality and revelry. The Greco-Roman god
 Dionysus, or Bacchus, had an ivy cup and wore a crown of ivy
 leaves.
- **Key** Mystery, Opening and Closing, Solution to a Problem. Its dual symbolism can mean liberation and the ability to unlock secrets, or incarceration. It can represent the threshold of the unconscious or a task to be performed and the means of carrying it out. In Catholicism, the key is a papal emblem, the key to the gates of heaven. In Greek mythology, Hecate holds the key to hell. In Judaism the key of God controls birth and death. In Japan the key represents happiness. A dove and a key symbolize the spirit opening the gates of heaven. The Roman god Janus, keeper of the doorway, looking both forward and backward, is associated with two keys that are sometimes placed over a heart. Especially in ceremonies for the dead, ancient Egyptian gods are sometimes depicted holding the ankh from the top as if it were a key, possibly the key that opens immortality.

Fills In Missing Pieces CCNGS Volunteer Researcher

In March 2005 Maribeth **McKAIG** sent a Research Assistance Request (to CCNGS) asking for help finding the death records of Frank E and Martha Blanche **MATZDORF** whose last known residence was Las Vegas, Nevada.

She wrote:

Frank E. and Martha Blanche **MATZDORF** lived in Las Vegas, Clark Co, Nevada for much of their lives. He was born in Michigan in Oct 1859 and she was born in Indiana in 1877.

They were listed in the 1910, 1920 and 1930 Federal Census. In 1910 they were restaurant proprietors; in 1920 they were cooks and lived on Fremont Street; in 1930, Frank was a hotel manager and they lived at 105 Bridges Street.

When Blanche's sister in Indiana died in 1949, the obituary said she was survived by her sister (Blanche MATZDORF) who lived in Las Vegas.

So her death would have been 1949 or later. His was probably between 1930-1960.

Is there a death record for either Frank or Blanche. I don't need death certificates, just a notation of their death dates.

If there were obituaries in the local newspaper, I would appreciate copies of those.

ACTION:

After calling Carson City to try and locate the death dates and only having Martha's death on file, Jana **WALKER**, CCNGS Research Volunteer assumed responsibilty for this research request. Jana proceeded to the Clark County Library Newspaper Microfilms and first found Martha's Death Notice which lead her to Frank's Death information.

Jana also found the Death notice of their son J. W. **MATZDORF** in the Las Vegas Age, 4 March 1916. She then found their burial plot information and located pictures of their tombstones.

CCNGS sent copies of all of this to Ms. **McKAIG** and received a very thankful response as follows:

Thank you and your volunteer researchers for the wonderful mailing you sent. It certainly was worth the wait, and I do so appreciate all your efforts, which have filled the gap in my family tree. Since Martha Blanche MATZDORF was my grandfather's aunt and had been gone from Indiana since 1900, nobody alive in the latter half of the century even knew her last name, just that they remembered the fresh fruit she used to send when they were children. This spring I found a 1949 obituary for her sister, my great- grandmother, and it gave Blanche's last name as "MATGDORF". That gave me a foot in the door to start with census records, which led me to find her real last name, and your group has filled in all the missing pieces.

F.E. MATZDORF Passes Away in L.V. Today

Frank E. MATZDORF, pioneer resident of Las Vegas and prominently identified with the development of southern Nevada during his active life-time, joined the ever-growing host of old-time residents who have passed into the Great Beyond, when death summoned him this morning at his Las Vegas Home.

MATZDORF has been in ill health for the pass two or three years, and during most of the past year has been confined to his bed.

His wife, companion throughout an entire lifetime, was reported to be critically ill this morning, and was given only a fair chance for recovery.

MATZDORF was born at Miles, Michigan, October 12, 1859, and came to Las Vegas with the first group attracted here by the opening of the new city in 1905. He was one of the original bidders for town lots at the famous auction sale held May 15 of that year and his first business enterprise was the opening of a restaurant on the present site of the Sal Sagev hotel. Later he moved his restaurant to the Overland hotel.

He built the White House rooming establishment on Bridger Street and acquired considerable real estate in the city. He experimented considerably in the development of the valley from an agricultural standpoint, and owned two ranches at different times.

During the height of the 1929 boom he built the business structure, which now houses the Rainbow club at the corner of First and Carson streets.

He was a member of the Las Vegas lodge of Elks, and Masons, and had advanced his Masonic work to the Shrine degrees.

He served one term as police and fire commissioner of the city, and was active in local affairs for a number of years.

He is survived by his widow and one daughter, Mrs. **VAUGHIN** of Los Angeles. Funeral arrangements will be announced by the daughter upon her arrival here.

Mrs. Martha B. **MATZDORF**, pioneer Las Vegas resident and widow of the late prominent Las Vegas homesteader and business man, Frank E. **MATZDORF**, died at 10:30 PM last night at her home, 105 Bridger avenue.

Mrs. MATZDORF, 72, had been an invalid for the past 14 years and was confined to her home most of the time.

Funeral services will be held at 1 PM with the Rev. E. A. **WESSEL** of the First Good Shepherd Luthern church officiating. Internment will take place in the Woodlawn cemetery.

Born in North Webster, Indiana on Dec. 1, 1877, Mrs. **MATZDORF** came west at an early age and was one of the first Las Vegas pioneers. She married Frank E. **MATZDORF** in St. George, Utah, and they later went to Los Angeles.

It was in 1905 that they came to Las Vegas in a covered wagon drawn by a mule team after en- countering near death because of lack of water while crossing the scorching desert.

MATZDORF, remembered as one of the first Las Vegas homesteaders, opened the "restaurant" in Las Vegas that year in a tent where the Overland hotel stands today. In 1921 he built the White House boarding home on Bridger street and later the Rainbow Club on Carson and First steets now occupied by the Playland bar.

Mrs. **MATZDORF** was active in the early day community affairs here and her husband helped organize the Elks lodge here and was an active Mason. He died on May 29, 1935 in Las Vegas.

Mrs. **MATZDORF** remained in Las Vegas and had been under the constant care of her companion, Mrs. Annetta **HURLEY**.

Surviving is her step-daughter, Mrs. Mae **VAUGHAN** of Las Vegas and two nephews, A. A. **WOLF** of Tampa, Florida and Milo **WOLF** of South Bend, Indiana.

J. W. **MATZDORF** (3/2/1916)

LAS VEGAS AGE - 3/4/1916 - DIED MATZDORF

In Los Angeles, Thurs. morning, March 2, 1916, J W MATZDORF, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. MATZDORF of this city.

The young man has been a resident of Las Vegas for several years and was in the employ of the Salt Lake Railroad as a fireman. A few days ago he became afflicted with an infection of the inside of the lip. Upon consulting Dr. **HEWETSON**, the latter pronounced it erysipelas and sent the patient to Los Angeles. Owing to the infectious nature of the disease, the Sisters' hospital refused to receive the case and he was taken to the infectious ward of the county Hospital, where he receiv-ed every possible help. However, the disease followed the mucuses membrane to the throat and death ensued after an illness of only three or four days.

Civil War Vet to Receive Military Burial

Two men traveling through the Valley of Fire the evening of June 30, 1915, noticed what appeared to be a man sleeping beneath a buggy along the trail.

The headlights of their Ford runabout fell upon a horse, seemingly sleeping at its tether. The man beneath the buggy appeared to turn toward them as they approached.

One of the men smelled something and looked closer, as recounted in the Las Vegas Age, July 3, 1915.

"As he came near in the darkness and about to speak the stench again smote him. Lighting a match, he approached the quiet figure beneath the buggy and as the rays lighted up the face, he saw the busy stream of bugs moving in and out of the staring eyes and realized that he was face to face with another of the almost numberless desert tragedies."

The dead man was 72-year-old John G. **CLARK**. He was determined to have died, along with his horse and dog, of thirst and exhaustion as they crossed the valley. Clark's badly decomposed body was buried where found without ceremony.

CLARK was a Civil War veteran, a sergeant in the Union Army, and Clark will finally receive the military funeral honors entitled him this Memorial Day.

"He was never properly buried," said Donald **HOTCHKISS**, who will conduct the ceremony this morning. "We're going to give him a proper Civil War era send off. We're just 90 years late."

HOTCHKISS is a chaplain of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War. "CLARK's funeral", he said, "will include a 21-gun salute, a bugler and honor guard in Civil War uniform".

"We're going to go out there, do it right," **HOTCHKISS** said. "It's appropriate that we put this man to rest."

The Sons of Union Veterans will place a bronze marker at the site.

Decoration Day, the observance that became Memorial Day, was created in 1868 to honor and tend to the graves of fallen soldiers of the Civil War.

CLARK is finally receiving his honors in large part because of Diane **GREENE**, a collections specialist with the Boulder City Hoover Dam Museum.

GREENE said she was going through records and came upon a photo of a marker at **CLARK**'s grave. Intrigued, she tracked **CLARK**

through newspaper accounts, the genealogical library in Salt Lake City and the U.S. National Archives.

"It was fun," **GREENE** said. "It's just like putting together pieces of a puzzle."

GREENE learned that **CLARK** was a Canadian-born farmer. He served during the Civil War in infantry and calvary units from New York. During a battle at Harpers Ferry in 1862, he was shot and lost all the fingers and thumb of his right hand.

CLARK headed west after the war, living for a time in the territories that became Oklahoma and Arizona. In 1915, he settled in Bakersfield, Calif.

CLARK had contracted typhoid fever during the war and suffered from bouts of malaria.

The *Bakersfield Californian* described him as otherwise "hale and hearty considering his years." When **CLARK** felt the approach of a malarial attack, he would embark upon lengthy journeys to live in the open air.

CLARK was on his way from Bakersfield to Salt Lake City when he took the hot, dry trial through the Valley of Fire.

Park Supervisor Jim **HAMMONS** said the state park can still be a treacherous place, with summer temperatures as hot as 114 degrees.

"You don't want to be here in the summer," **HAMMONS** said. "When you're talking about 114 degrees, you're talking about 114 degrees in the shade."

HAMMONS said that **CLARK** had probably trekked through the worst of his trip, braving the summer Mojave Desert. Cooler temperatures were ahead at higher elevations and in Utah.

"The extreme dry heat can sap a man of energy and distort his thinking", **HAMMONS** said.

"Dehydration will take your frame of mind. You'll go into a mania type of situation," he said. "Your blood starts thickening and your brain stops functioning."

CLARK was found with a dry canteen. A coroner's report notes that footprints marked where **CLARK** left his buggy, searched roughly two miles for water, and returned faint.

Only a half mile in another direction was a spring.

The Las Vegas Age reported that at the end dehydration may have cost **CLARK** his sanity.

"The man's clothing and blankets were torn to strips as though he had died in a frenzy of delerium (sic). The ground where the horse was tied was torn up as though the animal had also struggled to escape his fate."

A new bronze marker has been erected to mark **CLARK**'s burial, a few miles east of the visitor's center on State Route 169.




NEVADA 1862 TERRITORIAL CENSUS






