## Preservation of Records From Civil War Urged

CARSON CITY (Nevada) — A rare chance to examine the state's Civil War-era enlistment rolls showed that some draftees were deserters, and that there were at least a few blacks from Nevada who served in the Army in the West at places such as Fort Churchill just east of the capital.

The 260 documents held by the state Library and Archives were on display Wednesday to show the need for their preservation. The lists of hundreds of U.S. Army volunteers and draftees from Nevada and surrounding areas are too fragile to allow public access, despite continued interest by military historians and people searching their genealogies.

One was signed by Major Charles **McDERMIT**, for whom the town of McDermitt on the Oregon border is named. **McDERMIT** was killed by Indians near Paradise Valley in Northern Nevada in 1865.

"The paper documents, written by hand in flowery script, are the types of records that need costly preservation," state Archives Manager Jeff **KINTOP** said.

The preservation efforts got a boost from Bill **WATSON**, a Nevada resident who has formed a corporation to help save the state's historical documents. **WATSON** donated \$1,000 from his nonprofit group, called Foundation 36, to help in the agency's work.

"I have a strong interest in historic preservation and conservation," he said. "I was looking for some way to give something back to the

state."

Called muster rolls, the documents date from 1863 to 1865, covering a period when Nevada was a territory and in its early statehood which began on Oct. 31, 1864.

The state Library and Archives Division would like to make digital reproductions of the records, which are on large sheets of paper, so that researchers could continue to have access to the information while at the same time preserving the originals from further damage.

Some have been torn over the years and have taped areas. The tape needs to be removed and the acidity taken out of the paper.

State Archivist Guy ROCHA said the records tell a story.

He showed two enlistees from Nevada who were stationed at Fort Bridger in Wyoming, one named John **BROWN**, who deserted rather than take part in the hostilities with the Indians in the region.

**KINTOP** identified one black man, named John **WRIGHT**, who served as a cook.

**ROCHA** found a second black enlistee who also served as a cook, which serves as an example as why the documents are so important.

"It shows who served, where they came from and other data that helps paint a picture of military service at that time," he said.

## USCIS To Provide Fee-for-Service Genealogy Program

After years of prodding by the genealogical community, it appears the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service (USCIS-formerly called the Immigration and Naturalization Service) will provide a method for expediting inquiries from genealogists for records of their ancestors. There is a notice in the Federal Register to establish a Genealogy Program to process requests for historical records of deceased persons.

USCIS claims it receives 10,000 requests a year for the current service which is provided free under the Freedom of Information Act. Because of lack of manpower and facilities, it can take more than a year for a request to be processed. The genealogical community suggested that USCIS provide an alternate fee-for-service method to expedite requests. Such a service was started a few years ago by the Social Security Administration to process requests of their historical records.

Under the proposed rules, genealogical inquiries will no longer be free of charge. If a request is made under the Freedom of Information Act and USCIS determines it is a genealogical inquiry, the request will be returned to the sender who will be asked to resubmit using the Genealogy Program.

The following record groups will be part of the Genealogy Program:

- \* Naturalization Certificate Files (C-Files), which are records from September 27, 1906 to April 1, 1956, relating to U.S. naturalizations and the issuance of evidence of naturalization or citizenship.
- \* Forms AR-2, which are Alien Registration Forms on microfilm that were completed by all aliens age 14 and older who resided in or entered the United States between August 1, 1940, and March 31, 1944. These forms contain identification information, as well as information regarding the alien's employment and arrival to the United States.
- \* Visa Files, which are records from July 1, 1924, to March 31, 1944, containing the arrival information of immigrants admitted for permanent residence from July 1, 1924 to March 31, 1944, under the Immigration Act of 1924.
- \* Registry Files, which are records from March 2, 1929, to March 31, 1944, containing arrival information of immigrants who entered the United States prior to July 1, 1924, and for whom no arrival records could later be found.

## **Census Search Tip**

My tip involves a little heretofore overlooked (at least by me) gem in connection with census searches.

When you are looking for someone and you know the approximate area (town, city, community) where they lived, and you know a family member or neighbor who lived very near to them, do a search on that family member or neighbor. Click on the "(year) United States Federal Census Record." Look down at the info provided before you click on the census image itself. You will see either "Neighbors: View Results" or "Family and Neighbors: View Results."

I knew one of my grandmother's first cousins lived less than a quarter mile down the road from her, but could not find them in the census records. By locating the cousin in the index and clicking on "Neighbors: View Results," there he and his wife were—with their last name definitely misspelled!

As the phrase I coined says: "The rainbow is where you find it, not necessarily at the end of the rainbow." I found him, but not where I expected.

## **Distributing Heirlooms**

As a lawyer, may I suggest that to ensure that heirlooms get to the correct heir, particularly those that are of significant value or coveted by a number of heirs, you include them in your will. This ensures they go where you want them to go and allows the heir to insist on their right to a particular item.

For the smaller, less fiscally valuable items, a phrase such as "I trust that my executor will be guided in distributing my estate by such memoranda as I leave in a binder/notebook, etc. titled 'For My Executor' (or any other name you choose). Then make sure the book has pictures of the specific items, a copy of the history you wanted to pass along, and the full name and birth date or address of the recipient.

So often people write, "I want John to have my old chest." But that could be any chest from a tea chest to a hope chest to a bureau or the old travel chest in the attic that no one knows exists! And it could be John the youngest grandson, or John your son, or John the handyman!

And remember, the intended recipient of something very important

## Preserve Nevada Draws Attention to Historic Buildings at Risk

Latest list includes the Huntridge Theater, adobe structures, Kiel Ranch and a fight against urban sprawl.

Preserve Nevada is the only statewide historic preservation group.

"All of the other ones do fabulous work but we're the only one that tries to see Nevada as a whole," says Michelle **TURK**, deputy director of the nonprofit organization, which launched in 2002 and is based at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. "This is basically a group where everyone comes together and decides what is wrong in Nevada and what we need to change.

"Each year, Preserve Nevada releases a list of what it deems the 11 most endangered historic places are in Nevada. Its 2006 list, released earlier this month, ranks Las Vegas' Huntridge Theater as No. 7 with a bullet. Built during World War II, the Huntridge is one of few surviving examples of Art Moderne theater architecture in the United States

"They want to tear it down because the building is hard to restore," **TURK** says.

"And despite \$2 million invested by Las Vegas citizens to save the theater, and a 1993 listing on the National Register of Historic Places, its current private owners are legally entitled to do this", **TURK** says. (Operating on \$10,000 in annual grants from the State Historic Preservation Office and \$33,000 from UNLV, Preserve Nevada does not have the capital necessary to save the building or achieve most of its other goals, so it lobbies potential benefactors who do.)

Topping its list is what Preserve Nevada refers to as "sprawl-free landscape." Although this resource is listed as geographically nonspecific, the breakup of the Gilcrease family complex of properties in North Las Vegas is singled out as the primary example.

"There's tract development all around it," **TURK** says, explaining that Preserve Nevada is not opposed to housing development, only to development that doesn't take the historic feel of a community into account.

"We're not just providing advocacy for the preservation of historic buildings," **TURK** says. "It's the cultural history, the archaeological history and the landscapes.

"Other local buildings on the list include all Southern Nevada adobe structures, such as the El Sombrero Restaurant, and the Kiel Ranch in North Las Vegas."

can die before the testator. A book like this allows the person to write notes to the executor explaining what they want to happen if someone predeceases them. It can be easily added to when something new is acquired or something sold or given to the recipient. Other directions/suggestions can also be included as it does not legally bind the executor, but provides great help and moral-suasion.

Different jurisdictions allow you to deal with your estate and will in different ways, so these are only suggestions that I have found work very well in Ontario.

## A Visit to the Pacific Regional Archives at Laguna Niguel, CA

Interested in records from Arizona, Southern California, and Clark County, Nevada?

The Regional Archives Pacific Region at Laguna Niguel, CA is one of 14 regional facilities of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). It contains historical records from Federal agencies and courts from Arizona, Southern California, and Clark County, Nevada.

They have 32,000 cubic feet of historical records dating from 1850 to 1990 including photographs, maps and architectural drawings created or received by nearly 70 Federal agencies, including Federal courts.

I was with a group who had a behind the scenes tour of the facility in May. They had a display of Naturalization Applications for Hollywood personalities including Errol FLYNN, Marlene DIETRICH, and Peter LORRE. We got to look at the original documents from a copyright lawsuit against Walt DISNEY – including original drawings. We peeked into the secure area where they are cataloging the NIXON Pre-Presidential papers and artifacts for inclusion in his Presidential Library. We were able to look at old maps from the Las Vegas area and learn how they are preserving large documents.

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Would you believe they unroll the old maps using distilled water, bricks and wool?

The microfilm holdings of genealogical interests include:

- Federal census for 1790 1930
- Native American censuses of reservations in Arizona and Southern California
- Indexes to compiled military service records
- \* Freedman's Bureau records
- \* Military post returns for forts in California and Arizona
- \* Pension records and bounty land warrant applications
- \* Passenger arrival records for ships entering Baltimore, Boston, Galveston, New York, Philadelphia, San Francisco, and other ports
- Naturalization Records including the Superior Courts of Los Angeles County and San Diego County

They also have four computers with access to *Ancestry*, *Heritage Quest*, and other internet sites and usually have volunteers to assist you.

A notebook containing materials collected at the site will be available in the Heritage Room at Paseo Verde Library. This includes more specific information on their holdings.

#### GENEALOGY GOULASH: "MORE HOMEBOUND RESEARCH TIPS,"

I struck an important cord with many readers in my January 12th column:

http://www.ancestry.com/learn/library/article.aspx?article=10857about homebound researchers. Here are just a few comments I heard from readers:

#### BEFORE AND AFTER COMPUTERS

Here's one story that was shared: "My mother-in-law's address book provided me several family members who I did not know, but who were part of the family I was then researching. I reached a woman in her 80s who was the last person in her family with the information I need-ed. She responded with a short, brusque note saying that everyone was gone, her children did not talk to her anymore and, 'I don't know nothing about the family.' It was a depressing note. However, a couple of months later at Easter, I sent a card and said that I hoped she was doing well. I asked no more questions. She responded saying that it was good to hear from another Christian woman. We wrote for a couple of years until her death. I never asked questions, but she gave me many answers as she told me about her years growing up, her brothers and sisters, and even her children. Sometimes it takes a bit of kindness and a lot of patience to flesh out the family tree.

"Using the computer, I went to the web page of a local library in the town my cousin Bill was raised in. He was killed at age 18 in WWII and I could not find much information or any picture. I asked the research librarian if they had yearbooks for the high schools in the area. I received some clippings and a copy of a yearbook page. She could not find a picture of Bill but did send me the yearbook page with his sister's photo. She also sent a couple of newspaper clippings about Bill and his death in the Hawaiian Islands. One of the clippings had his picture!"

#### MORE ELECTRONIC SUGGESTIONS

Another reader "at home in the beautiful Pacific Northwest" wrote: "Computers are great for making contacts as well as finding databases. Leaving a message on a county genealogy web page in Iowa brought me death information and newspaper clippings that I might never have found on my own. The gentleman who responded actually went out and looked at the cemetery to see if my great-great-great-grandfather was buried there and then found supporting information about him. I had just asked if there were any cemetery indexes! I am not housebound or in a rural area but have a retired husband who has really limited my onsite research."

#### MORE EQUIPMENT

A fellow Minnesotan shared: "Something that I have found to be a 'must' in my at-home research is a microfilm/fiche reader. I can borrow films of Norwegian parish records on microfilm from the Vesterheim Genealogical Center in Madison, Wisconsin but there are lots of other things available by rent or purchase on film -- church records, newspapers, and census records are the ones that quickly come to mind."

You may be able to find a business or school in your area that is getting rid of older film or fiche readers. Let your relatives know you are on the look-out for a reader.

#### MESSAGE BOARDS

Another tip: "I'm not particularly home bound, but don't get out much. I have found that my two most valuable research methods are using ALL the message boards I can find that may apply to my questions, and finding other libraries in the vicinity of my research. I contact

those libraries and ask who is most experienced in doing genealogical research and get an email address if they have one. I've got a few people now that I can email directly with questions or requests, and I've been astounded at how much help they can be and how willing they are to do what you need. Sometimes, they ask for a donation, which is totally agreeable to me! I've also found that if I keep asking questions on message boards, usually someone will answer. I even had one lady in New York that signed herself off as being from 'friendly western New York.' And boy, was she a dear. She even traveled to local museums, genealogical societies, and a cemetery with her camera for me! She did more research than I would have even asked for and sent me a picture of where my grandmother's last brother was buried. No stone, but she found the location anyway and took a picture."

#### KINDNESS IN GENEALOGY

Another reader wrote: "Speaking of random acts of genealogical kindness, a wonderful woman who happened to own the microfilmed archives of a newspaper from the 1890s in Gann Valley, South Dakota (her father had been the editor) transcribed all the MANY references to my grandfather and his family, who lived there during that time, and sent them to me, as well as copies of the ads from the paper mentioning my great-grandfather's store. She contacted me via a message board posting I had made. It still amazes me that she would go to all that trouble. It amounted to 27 pages of articles, covering eight years, and she typed all of it after reading through all of the issues to find it!"

I would be remiss if I didn't remind readers that it is OK to ask for source citations for material that others share with you or find on your behalf.

#### **USE REGULAR MAIL**

Here is another good suggestion: "Write to libraries, city clerks, etc. I am pretty savvy with a computer, but I still write letters to libraries for copies of obits, to city clerks for copies of vital records, to the Archives of the Archdiocese of Boston for witnesses and sponsors at weddings and baptisms. You can write to historical societies and local genealogical societies with queries. People seem to think everything is online. It's not. Your suggestion to use the USGenWeb sites (http://www.usgenweb.org) was great. The amount of info for a given county varies widely, but it is a great starting point to find out when the county was formed, what records exist, and usually a list of volunteers for lookups. Worst case you can email the county or town coordinator and ask for help. Most of the sites have addresses for vital records, historical societies, etc."

#### **CARETAKERS**

Other homebound researchers care for a family member. As one reader wrote: "Most mornings I am able to sit down at our computer with a cup of coffee and read the Ancestry Daily newsletter. I am no longer able to get to the library or courthouses as I am caring for our son who has ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease). I don't miss getting out to do genealogy because I have Ancestry.com and the net. I have been able to do so much research right from our home and the Daily News has given me so much new information and places to look--not to mention the therapeutic aspects of not feeling deprived."

#### **BOTTOM LINE**

We can learn much from each other. We are not alone in our research. We must not forget to recheck indexes, websites, and books. We must

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## REMEMBERING MY BROTHER FAMILY GENEALOGIST

On the fourth of July 2003, my brother, Richard L. **EARL**, was killed in a parade accident in Grass Valley, CA. He died a hero, with his boots on. He was a Paratrooper in WWII and as a retired engineer from the telephone company, he continued the Paratrooper legacy by building a plane out of cardboard, dressing up his garden tractor to look like a jeep, and participating in as many parades as possible.

He would have someone drive the jeep and, at the proper time, he would jump out of the plane and yell "**Geronimo**". He was 78 years old and could still wear his Paratrooper uniform and boots.

At the time of the accident, they had left the parade and were heading off to park the plane. Going down a grade, the brakes failed. At that time he was in the jeep heading toward some parked cars and people. Because he couldn't stop, he decided to roll the jeep. When he did, he hit his head on a curb and died a few hours later.

The *Grass Valley Union* wrote a report on the accident and also on my brother's activities in organizing "Band of Brothers" in Nevada County, CA. He also was quite well known as a ham operator.

He spent a lot of his retired time as a collector of farm equipment which was used during the '30s. He loved milk separators and had quite a collection. But as a genealogist is where he really shined.

He had a RV and used it frequently. I was with him once and it was so much fun. We were on our way to a class reunion in Jasper, MO. and stopped at all the graveyards on the way there. He would go out of his way just to track down an ancestor.

He actually located a town that our great-great grandfather, John **EARL**, founded: Emporium, PA. The people of the town were thrilled that an **EARL** finally showed up and they made him promise to come back on their 100<sup>th</sup> year. He said he would probably be too old by then.

He did enough research on our ancestors for me to join the DAR (my ancestor was Consider **BRICKLAY**). My mother also joined the DAR on her side of the family as her ancestor provided the troops with beef.

I have joined our local genealogical society to take up where my brother left off. There are some questions I need to answer. I was fortunate that when my brother was active, he sent me copies of his findings. Now I have a lot to work with.

\* A-Files, which are case files on individuals containing all immigration records created or consolidated from April 1, 1944, to the present. Only files containing documents dated prior to May 1, 1951, will be available.

Submitters will have to show proof of death of the individual such as a death certificate or obituary notice. If the year of birth was more than 100 years ago, no proof of death will be required. These records often include information about the children of the individual, and these children may still be living; therefore, USCIS states that "the Genealogy Program will not release personal information concerning a subject's children."

USCIS envisions the service to be in two stages. Initially the submitter would request an index search to determine what information is available. Then there would be a request for the actual documents.

## VISIT THE HERITAGE ROOM

USCIS has budgeted about \$1 million per year for the service, and they expect such a level of expense could handle the anticipated 25,000 inquiries per year. This would make break even \$40 per inquiry; however, the agency already has in its budget the cost of processing current inquiries. In the Federal Register the agency is recommending that the cost for an index search and for requests for an actual document be between \$16-45 for each file of microfilm being searched and \$26-55 for retrieval of textual files.

Interested persons can comment on the proposed regulation. #### **Web Site Locates Graves in Utah**

#### Families can easily find where loved ones buried

Today is Memorial Day, and many people would like to decorate the graves of relatives or ancestors — but cannot remember exactly where they are buried.

The Utah Division of State History offers an easy solution: a searchable Web site that can quickly tell where 605,931 people are buried in 365 Utah cemeteries.

And believe it or not, officials say it is fast becoming one of the state's most popular online services. The site — *history.utah.gov/apps/burials/execute/searchburials* — had 2.9 million hits over the past 12 months, more than one for every Utah resident.

"I even tried it," said Philip F. **NOTARIANNI**, director of the Division of State History. "Mount Calvary Cemetery, the Catholic cemetery next to the Salt Lake City Cemetery, is where my parents are buried. We just went online a month ago with information from it, and I found my parents' names there."

The state has been collecting burial information for nine years and putting it online cemetery by cemetery as it becomes available. Other recent additions, for example, include the Orem, Fairview, Milton, Millville-Nibley and Bingham cemeteries.

Linda **THATCHER**, coordinator of the project, said data is now online for about two-thirds of the 550 known cemeteries in the state (active and inactive), and the state is working to add the rest, as well as regularly update data from new burials.

"The project began in 1997 with an appropriation from the Legislature to help celebrate the 150th anniversary of the arrival in Utah of the Mormon pioneers," she said.

"That money ended, but the service has become so popular that we've used some of our discretionary money to keep it going," **NOTARIANNI** said.

On the Web site, visitors can search by name for just one individual or choose to generate a list of everyone buried in Utah with the same surname. They can even obtain lists of all burials at one cemetery.

They do not need to know beforehand in what cemetery or even what city their relatives are buried to find them. Visitors may also obtain driving directions online to cemeteries and plot numbers for individuals they are seeking.

The database often includes family-history information beyond what is on headstones, too, such as listings of parents or other relatives, death causes and cities where they were born or died, along with key dates.

"That's because our information comes from sextons' records rather than from gravestones, so it often contains more that what visitors would see at cemeteries," **THATCHER** said.

A fan of the Web site is Salt Lake City Cemetery sexton Mark **SMITH**. He notes it is often difficult for people visiting there to remember where relatives' plots are among its vast 250 acres and 120,000 graves.

"If they look up information at home, they can just grab a map at our office and easily find the grave site," he said. But for people who don't know about that, he expects long lines all Memorial Day weekend at his office waiting to look up information on its database.

"People can do it on the Web at home, whenever it is convenient," **SMITH** said. "They don't have to do it during our office hours. And we leave maps outside our door that they can pick up after hours."

The Web site helps diminish crowds at his office. He said, "You can imagine that with 120,000 graves, if we had just two people for each of those who need to know where they are, the lines here can get pretty long."

### AGGIE ROBERTS

Jan. 2, 1919-May 16, 2006

Aggie **ROBERTS**, was born in Steinauer, Nebraska. At 16 she graduated as Valedictorian from her small class. She traveled to Denver, Colorado to attend Barnes Business School. Still just a kid, she moved to Las Vegas in 1943, married, and began raising a family. She had been a resident of Las Vegas for more than 60 years. She passed away May 16, 2006, at a local hospital.

Aggie was employed as a horticulturist with the University of Nevada Cooperative Extension since 1977, and she passed away on the date that marked her 29th anniversary with the Extension Service.

Aggie was a prolific writer of gardening articles for local publications as well as a recognized horticulturist on local television and radio. Aggie was a very active member of the community and especially involved with activities benefiting children.

She served as a PTA president for 16 years at four different schools and was also active in PTA at the area council and state level. She received a PTA Lifetime Membership from National PTA for her service. Aggie was the superintendent of the youth division of the Jaycee State Fair for more than 25 years. She was a Girl Scout leader and a Boy Scout den mother. Aggie formed junior garden clubs, including garden clubs for children with disabilities.

She was a First Communion teacher for more than 40 years at Parishes within the Diocese of Las Vegas. She has touched the lives of countless children.

Aggie was a member and officer of many local garden clubs, and she served as president of the Nevada State Federation of Garden Clubs for eight years. The school opened during the 1996-1997 school year and is located at 227 Charter Oak in Henderson. Aggie has been an extremely involved namesake, and three of her grandchildren have attended school there.

If you have ancestry who come from the county of Norfolk, we might be able to help you. The National Archive of Memorial Inscriptions (NAOMI) has recently set up a website which enables you to search for gravestone inscriptions.

Log on to www.memorialinscriptions.org.uk, enter the personal details you have, and check our database.

At present we have data from Norfolk only, but we are rapidly expanding. We started in November 2005 with inscriptions from 175 burial grounds, comprising 44,000 names, and now we have 290 burial grounds, 82,000 names. We have digitized as many as this again, which we are checking an uploading to the live site as fast as we can, bearing in mind the need for the highest standards of accuracy to be maintained. This will take us into the autumn, after which we shall move on.

The problem of using MIs is finding them - our website is designed to make them available throughout the world at the press of a button, and at the reasonable cost of £4. 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#### THE POOR DEBTOR'S LAW

Be it enacted by the General Assembly, That the 33d section of chapter 49 of the Code of Virginia of 1860, be amended and reenacted so as to read as follows:

**Sec. 33.** In the case of a husband, parent or other person who is a housekeeper, and head of a family, there shall be exempted from distress or levy the following articles, or so much or so many thereof as the party may have:

- 1. The family bible.
- Family pictures, school books and library for the use of the family not exceeding \$100 in value.
- 3. A seat or pew in any house or place of worship.
- 4. A lot in any burial-ground.
- 5. All necessary wearing apparel of the debtor and his family. All beds, bedsteads and bedding necessary for the use of such family. All stoves and appendages put up and kept for the necessary use of family, not to exceed three.
- 6. One cow, one horse, six chairs, one table, six knives, six forks, six plates, one dozen spoons, two dishes, two basins, one pot, one oven, six pieces of wood or earthenware, one loom and its appurtenances, one safe or press, one spinning-wheel, one pair of cards, one axe, two hoes, five barrels of corn, five bushels of wheat or one barrel of flour, two hundred pounds of bacon or pork, three hogs, ten dollars in value of forage or hay, one cooking stove and utensils for cooking therewith, and one sewing machine; and in case of a mechanic, the tools and utensils of his trade not exceeding \$100 in money.

Sec. 34. If the debtor be at the time actually engaged in the business of agriculture, then shall be exempt from such distress or levy, while he is so engaged, one yoke of oxen or a pair of horses or mules in lieu thereof, with the necessary gearing, one wagon or cart, two ploughs, one drag, one harvest cradle, one pitch-fork, one rake, two iron wedges. All of which articles intended to be exempted by this shall not be chosen by the head of the family, his agent or representative: Provided, that the provisions of this act shall not extend to distress made for taxes, county and parish levies: And, provided further, That upon all contracts made and entered into before the passage of this act, only so much of the above mentioned property shall be exempt from distress or levy as are hereby exempted under the provisions of the said thirty-third and thirty-fourth sections of chapter forty-nine of the Code of 1860.

2. This act shall be in force from its passage.

## **USING ROOTSWEB:** Delving Deeper into the SSDI

Rootsweb Review, 17 May 2006, Vol 9, No. 20

Q: My ancestor Florence **SCHATTSCHNEIDER** doesn't show up in an exact spelling search of the SSDI either at RootsWeb or at Ancestry--why?

A: The Social Security Administration limits surnames to 12 letters in the SSDI database and given names to nine letters. Names that exceed those length limits are abbreviated to show only the first 12 and/or nine letters respectively. Therefore, when doing an exact spelling search of the SSDI database for lengthy surnames either at RootsWeb (http://ssdi.rootsweb.com/) or at Ancestry, limit your search to the first 12 letters of the surname and nine letters of the given name.

In this example, search for **SCHATTSCHNEI** and the results will be found.

Q: I live in England and found a relative listed on the SSDI and would like to send away for the SS-5 (original Social Security application) information. However, it is difficult for me to pay in American currency. Are there other forms of payment that are acceptable to the Social Security Administration aside from checks and money orders?

A: Yes. The Social Security Administration will accept a variety of credit cards in payment for SS-5 information. Q: I can't find my grandfather on the SSDI and I know he had a Social Security number and was receiving benefits when he died in 1958.

A: The Social Security records were not digitized until 1962 and deaths prior to 1962 are generally not found in the SSDI database. However, this doesn't mean you cannot obtain information about this individual from the Social Security Administration as outlined here: <a href="http://www.ssa.gov/foia/html/foia\_guide.htm">http://www.ssa.gov/foia/html/foia\_guide.htm</a>

Q: I can't find my father on the SSDI who died in 1964. He was a physician.

A: Medical doctors were not covered under Social Security until 1965. Many other occupations were not covered under Social Security until the 1960s and even later. Your father's occupation could have been the reason he is not included in the SSDI.

Q: My grandfather was not a U.S. citizen but he worked legally in the United States in an occupation that was covered under Social Security. Might I find him listed in the SSDI?

A: It is possible, as some non-U.S. citizens are found in the SSDI listings, but by far, most listings are for American citizens.

**THATCHER** said that most of the information has come from cemeteries that received state grants to computerize their data. They do not conduct gravestone surveys, but instead convert written sexton records. It helps cemeteries manage their records better and helps the state have a central database.

That has been supplemented from occasional private groups and Boy Scout projects that have surveyed cemeteries and written down information from gravestones. But **THATCHER** warns that groups interested in doing that information gathering must first contact her office and gather data in the proper format or it cannot be accepted.

**NOTARIANNI** said, "The database has proven also to be a popular genealogy tool, and we have heavy traffic online. We get hits to our site from all over the world by people doing genealogy."

**THATCHER** adds that the site has links to other Web sites that help locate graves elsewhere nationally, and some Web sites even have photos of all graves in some cemeteries around the country — sometimes allowing online visits to graves when personal visits are not possible.

## **Saving Graves**

#### **How to Interpret Gravestone Motifs**

These are a few of the many motifs that are found on gravestones along with some of the more commonly held interpretations of their symbolism.

- **Rising Sun** Resurrection, Immortality.
- Rope Eternity, Binding and Connection. In Egyptian hieroglyphics, a knotted cord signifies a man's name, a symbol of an individual's existence. In Vedic teaching, the silver cord "expresses the sacred, inner path which binds the outer consciousness of man (his intellect) with his spiritual essence"
- Rosebud Morning of Life or Renewal of Life
- Roses Brevity of earthly existence, Completion, Achievement, Perfection. Meanings vary depending on the color, shape and number of petals. For example, the blue rose symbolizes the impossible, the golden rose the pinnacle of achievement, an eight petal rose regeneration.
- Scales Justice, Balance. Originating in Chaldea as the
  mystic symbol of justice, it represents the equivalence of guilt
  and punishment. From the zodiacal archetype of Libra it
  represents immanent justice, the idea that guilt automatically
  unleashes the forces that bring self-destruction and punishment.
- Scarab An ancient Egyptian emblem symbolizing the renewal of life. When shown with falcon's wings it represents transcendence and protection.
- Shattered Urn Someone Old
- Sheaf of Wheat Ripe for Harvest, Divine Harvest, Time
- Shell The Human Journey Through Life, Birth, Life, Resurrection, Love, Good Luck. The shell's hard casing protects life, the pearl inside, and its aquatic nature associates it with the feminine, lunar, and virginity. Both the Hindu goddess Lakshmi and the Greco-Roman goddess Aphrodite were carried ashore on a scallop shell. In medieval Christianity the scallop shell was the emblem of St. James, the patron of pilgrims, so the shell came to symbolize a pilgrimage. The scallop shell is also associated with the guardian angel Raphael, and the Virgin Mary. In later Christianity, it symbolized resurrection and baptism. In Buddhism and Hinduism the conch shell's call awakens the faithful from ignorance. The conch also is a sign of victory over samsara, or suffering existence, in Buddhism. In Chinese Buddhism, the conch shell can signify a prosperous journey, and in Islam it represents the hearing of the divine word.
- Ships Hope or Seafaring profession
- **Shovels** Mortality

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• **Skeleton** - The personification of death.



And.WHO I AM!



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
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
