Encyclopedia of Genealogy Updated

The Encyclopedia of Genealogy now has an all-new "look and feel" as well as an updated set of menus. The result should be a bit easier to use. The basic functionality of the Encyclopedia remains unchanged.

The Encyclopedia of Genealogy is a free-content encyclopedia created by its readers, people like you. It is loosely modeled on the Wikipedia example. I created the "shell" of the Encyclopedia and I then "seeded" it by creating a few pages of information myself. However, most of the pages were later created by people like you: someone with a bit of expertise on a particular subject who would like to share that knowledge with others.

The Encyclopedia of Genealogy serves as a compendium of genealogical tools and techniques. It provides reference information about everything in genealogy except people. Look to the Encyclopedia of Genealogy to provide explanations of how to look up your family tree, explanations of terms found in genealogy research, including obsolete medical and legal terms. It describes locations where records may be found. It also will describe how to research Italian, German, Polish, French-Canadian, Jewish, Black, Indian and other ancestors. In short, the Encyclopedia of Genealogy will serve as your standard genealogy reference manual.

If you see anything in this encyclopedia that is incorrect, YOU can change it! If you see anything that is incomplete, YOU can add to it! If you note anything that is missing, YOU can add it! This encyclopedia will succeed because people like you contribute nuggets of information. When enough "nuggets" are added, the Encyclopedia of Genealogy will become a gold mine.


Within the article is a reference to "Footnote.com" which is available for all patrons who visit the Family History Center.

LAS VEGAS FAMILY HISTORY CENTER – TRIP REPORT John FISCHER (CCNGS)

As a steady user of the resources at the Las Vegas Family History Center (9th & Clark), I have had the opportunity to make discoveries that would have been impossible without their facility.

Current fiscal constraints are hurting libraries all over the United States-no money. We need to be able to share resources as much as possible. Duplication is costly. In that spirit the following is an attempt at a short summary of resources available at the local Family History Center that can be used for your research. As this facility has been in operation for many, many years, they have material that may not now be available elsewhere.

Please go to their web site at *www.familyhistorylv.org* to find the address, hours, dates open and other information. Here is what they have:

BOOKS:

- 1. Grouped by State: Select copies of genealogical reference books for every state.
- 2. Family Trees: Over 200+ family tree books on the shelf sorted by surname
- Reference Collection: The FHC has a good collection of books with a focus on the following: British Isles, New England, Scandinavia and US-Canada.

 - -Germans to America, Glazier & Filby, Vol 1-67
 - -Italians to America, Glazier & Filby, Vol 1-20
 - -New England Historical & Genealogical Record, Vol 1-148
 -DAR Indexes, Vol 9-128; DAR Lineage books, DAR magazine, DAR Patriot Index

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Citizen and Immigration Services Genealogy Fee Increases

The following message was written by Jan Meisels **ALLEN**, Chairperson of the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (IAJGS) Public Records Access Monitoring Committee. Two years ago the US Citizenship and Immigration Service (CIS), formerly called the INS, proposed rules to establish a fee-for-service genealogy program. The final rule was published in the Federal

Register on May 15, 2008. You may view/download the final rule at: http://edocket.access.gpo.gov/2008/pdf/E8-10651.pdf. The final rule goes into effect on August 13, 2008. The reason for the rule was to streamline and improve the process for acquiring genealogically relevant historical records of deceased individuals. Due to the demand for documents which created a backlog, requests under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) took months if not years to complete.

As a result of the comments made to the proposed rule, the amount per index or record/file request (from a microfilm) will be \$20 and \$35 for a textual record. The original proposal was a range of \$16-\$45 for an index search and \$16 to \$45 for a record/file microfilm request and \$26 to \$55 for a copy of a textual document.

The reason the USCIS must charge for the documents and any search for the records is due to other regulations by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB rule form 1993). It says all government offices are required to recover the full cost of services provided through "user fees". USCIS is also mandated to charge a fee to recover the full costs of providing research and information resulting from the Immigration and Nationality Act.

The types of historical records available under the new program are (1) Naturalization certificate files(C-files) from September 27, 1906-April 1, 1956 (from all federal, state, municipal courts and more); (2) Microfilmed alien registration forms from August 1, 1940 to March 31, 1944; (3) Visa files from July 1, 1924 to March 31, 1944; (4) Registry files from March 2, 1929 to March 31, 1944; (5) Alien files numbered below 8 million and dated prior to May 1,1951;

More information on each of these is contained in the final rule.

To request records under this new program, a special form must be used: Form G-1041 for index or Form G 1041A for records request. I did not find the new forms posted as yet to the USCIS website. Once the program begins, requests may be submitted electronically on the electronic forms through its site http://www.USCIS.gov. When requests are made online then the form of payment MUST be a credit card.

Information that must be contained on the form is included in the new rule. When submitting a written request, the only form of payment accepted is a cashier's check or money order in the exact amount. As genealogical request information may only be obtained on deceased individuals, the subject is presumed dead if their birth date is over 100 years old. For those less than 100 information (primary or secondary document- such as death record, published obituary, etc) must be provided to the satisfaction of the USCIS that the individual is indeed deceased.

Vatican Orders Records Withheld from Mormons

The *Catholic News Service* has published an article about new Vatican orders to not cooperate with the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the microfilming of records. The Vatican wishes to block posthumous rebaptisms by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, a practice that Catholics, Jews, and some others find objectionable.

Catholic dioceses throughout the world have been directed by the Vatican not to give information in parish registers to the Mormons' Genealogical Society of Utah.

An April 5th letter from the Vatican Congregation for Clergy, obtained by Catholic News Service in late April, asks episcopal conferences to direct all bishops to keep the Latter-day Saints from microfilming and digitizing information contained in those registers.

The order came in light of "**grave reservations**" expressed in a January 29th letter from the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, the clergy congregation's letter said.





ARIZONA FUNERAL CARDS

special secure link to the Family History Center Services Portal. Be sure to use only this portal.

MAP CABINET:

Contains oversize maps of various geographical areas.

CARD CATALOG

All books are cataloged in the card catalog. Family Trees are cataloged by the family surname in the title. There is no computerized list or index of books available.

MICROFILM:

A small collection of microfilm is available and others may be ordered from the Family History Center in Salt Lake City for local use.

CD's/DVD's:

There are two drawers of CD's/DVD's available. The bottom drawer contains the Family Tree Maker View CD's which are now obsolete. The top drawer contains some interesting disks such as "Swedish Research" and others. Make sure you review the contents when you visit

SUPPORT:

There are a number of computers available along with the standard copying machine and microfilm readers. Volunteers are always available for assistance. Candy and pretzels are on the counter.

The Henderson Library system, in partnership with the Society, recently completed the subscription process to World Vital Records (WVR) This site has links to thousands of databases and millions of names.

Unfortunately, the agreement with WVR does not allow for remote access, i.e., from home. So, if you want to access this valuable resource, you will have to go to The Heritage Room at the Paseo Verde Library to use it.

New databases are usually free for a few days from home. Go to the site and take a look: http://www.worldvitalrecords.com/

World Vital Records adds content daily. Some of its most popular databases include Everton's Genealogical Helper and Family Group Sheets and Pedigree Files, and the World War II Army Enlistment Records. The Social Security Death Index (SSDI), the Ellis Island Passenger Arrival Records, Find A Grave death records, and SmallTownPapers® newspaper collection are free to access and frequently viewed.

World Vital Records exists to meet the needs of its subscribers. Its business model includes a customer focus that is responsive to industry needs. World Vital Records sends out surveys to its members on a regular basis to find ways to improve the site. Recently it was named by *Family Tree Magazine*, America's largest-circulation genealogy magazine, as one of the 101 Best Family History Web Sites.

World Vital Records recently built FamilyLink.com, a free social network for genealogists and families, which is currently in beta. At *FamilyLink.com* individuals can upload their family tree and their GEDCOM files, send messages to genealogists in more than 20 countries, upload photos of their favorite ancestors, and connect with more than 15,000 genealogists and family historians in more than 1,600 places.

Historic Fifth Street School

It could have ended up just another Las Vegas story, a memory faded from disuse, forgotten by the hordes of residents coming and going, then finally falling victim to the wrecking ball.

Late last year there seemed an almost preternatural nudge to force the historic Fifth Street School into the waste bin of local history when a homeless person, cooking up some grub, started a fire that caused \$250,000 in damage.

But the school survived the two-alarm fire. And unlike most other fixtures from Las Vegas' too-short past, the school is about to be reborn.

Only within the past few weeks could you drive by and see the renewed vibrancy of the building, which has benefited from more than two years of renovation at a cost of \$9.5 million.

When completed this fall, the school will house something unseen there since the late 1960s, when the school stopped operating to become a courthouse annex.

Students of all ages will be learning.

The Nevada School of the Arts, which provides musical instruction and art classes to very young students, will be housed there. The American Institute of Architects and the city's Cultural Affairs Division also will have offices there.

Why use maps in genealogy?

- · Need to know what records were kept where
- See if places have changed names
- Could look for records in wrong place if have wrong place name
- Show relationship to other places in area records may be found in several places
- Need maps to find census enumeration areas to find census records
- Use maps to find churches, courthouses, cemeteries

Learning about maps

• Genealogy "guidebooks" may have a section on using maps

Types of maps

- Base map—shows boundaries, geographic names, but not features of earth
- · Planimetric—does not show elevation
- Topographic—shows features of earth

Examples of types of maps genealogists may be interested in

- · Surveys-who owned a plot of land
- Pioneer trails, canals, waterways—how did your ancestors get to where they settled
- Political maps—what was jurisdiction of area your ancestors lived in—where would records be

Question of scale

- What is scale? Ratio of distance on map to distance on earth
- · Scale needed is relative
- Usually larger scale better as shows more detail

Homeland Security Program to Assist Genealogical Researchers

After August, when you think genealogy, think Department of Homeland Security.

The Department of Homeland is our genealogical friend. The department has established a Genealogy Program within the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service This will be "a fee-for-service program designed to provide genealogical and historical records and reference services to genealogists, historians, and others seeking documents

maintained within the historical record systems." The new program will "put researchers in touch with the correct staff persons within USCIS, and it will create a dedicated queue for genealogists and other researchers seeking access to historical records."

This service takes effect Aug. 13 and was announced in the Federal Register May 15 (Vol. 73, No. 95, Rules and Regulations Page 2806-28032 from the Federal Register Online). See the full text of the final rule at http://regulations.justia.com/view/110663.

The new rule specifically mentions the "Visa File packet," relating to immigrants from 1924-1944 and often sought by genealogical researchers. This packet is extremely valuable because it "contains the original arrival record of immigrants admitted for permanent residence under provisions of the Immigration Act of 1924," as well as "information and documents of the immigrant's exact date and place of birth, names of parents and children, all places of residence for five full years prior to immigration, and photographs," and often contains vital and military records. The File packet is often the source researchers will find to connect an immigrant (who arrived 1924-1944) with his native country and, sometimes, his native Village.

Currently, in order to obtain records of deceased individuals, we file our requests through the Freedom of Information Act/Privacy Act (FOIA/PA). These requests commonly include those relating to naturalization and immigration, and often take months to process. Creation of the new Genealogy Program will not only expedite genealogical requests, but will also relieve the burden of the FOIA/PA folks and enable them to work more efficiently.

The new Genealogy Program governs the following:

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- * Files of deceased subjects. (Provided files are filed as historical records.)
- * Naturalization Certificate Files (C-Files) from Sept. 27, 1906 to April 1, 1956.
- * Visa Files from July 1, 1924 to March 31, 1944 and Visa

records from March 31, 1944 to May 1, 1951 in A-files.

- * A-Files below 8 million and documents therein dated prior to May 1, 1951.
- * Registry Files from March 2, 1929 to March 31, 1944 and registry records from April 1, 1944 to 30, 1951 in A-files.
- * AR-2 Files from Aug 1, 1940 to March 31, 1944 and Alien Registration Form from March 31, 1944 to April 30, 1951 in A-Files.

The Genealogy Program does not include the following, which will stay FOIA/ PA program:

- * Files of living subjects.
- * Naturalization records on or after April 1, 1956.
- * Visa records on or May 1, 1951 in A-Files.
- * A-files above 8 million and documents therein dated on or after May 1, 1951.
- * Registry records on or after May 1, 1951 in A-Files.
- * Alien Registration Forms on or after May 1, 1951 in A-Files.

Search and document reproduction fees for the Genealogy Program have been set as follows: Index search, \$20; copy of document from microfilm, \$20; and copy of textual file, \$35. Reseachers using a credit card will able to submit queries online. Those who submit their requests via Form G-1041 (Genealogy Index Search Request) or Form G-1 (Genealogy Records Request) will need to pay via cashier's check or money order in the exact amount. Personal checks will not be accepted.

Church Records Re-Opened at National Library of Ireland

The following announcement was written by the Association of Professional Genealogists in Ireland (http://www.apgi.ie):

National Library allows public access to Roman Catholic parish registers for Cashel & Emly, Cloyne and Kerry. The Association of Professional Genealogists in Ireland (APGI) welcomes the announcement from the National Library of Ireland that they are once again to allow public access to their microfilm copies of Roman Catholic parish registers from the dioceses of Cashel & Emly, Cloyne and Kerry.

At APGI's annual general meeting last December the matter of restricted access and, in the case of Cashel & Emly, total closure of these historical records was raised. A resolution was passed calling on the National Library to immediately lift all such restrictions in accordance with a legal opinion given as long ago as 1994, when the matter was the subject of an article in Irish Roots magazine (1994, Number 2, pp.23-24).

The National Library's collection of microfilms covers the surviving pre-1881 baptismal and marriage records of almost all Roman Catholic parishes throughout Ireland. These records are fundamental to genealogical research for most people of Irish descent. The registers were microfilmed in the 1950s and 1960s. As they then included records of living people, they were made available only with the written permission of the relevant parish priest. In the 1980s, through the intervention of the then Chief Herald of Ireland, Mr. Donal **BEGLEY**, this requirement was lifted by the relevant bishops for most dioceses, including Cashel & Emly. Having unrestricted access to these records revolutionised research for the thousands of tourists who visited Ireland each year but who had had

limited time for family history research.

In 1991, the new Archbishop of Cashel & Emly, Dr. Dermot **CLIFFORD**, claimed copyright in the manuscript parish registers and stated that he was giving the Tipperary Heritage Unit (now known as Tipperary Family History Research, and based in Tipperary town) exclusive rights to provide and market information from them. The holders of microfilm copies of the registers, primarily the National Library and the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (Mormon Church), were informed to withdraw the films from public access. In 1992, the National Library did so. For the past sixteen years no one has been allowed to view the microfilms from Cashel & Emly.

In 1994, the National Library was supplied with a legal opinion by Muireann O BRIAIN, S.C., which dismissed the notion of copyright in a manuscript which were created for the purpose of maintaining records and which was not 'the work of one person or of joint authorship'. Ms. O BRIAIN further stated that even if copyright were upheld, anyone using microfilm copies of the registers for research purposes would not be infringing any such copyright. It is believed that the National Library subsequently commissioned further legal opinions which did not differ materially from Ms. O BRIAIN's, but it is only now that the microfilms are being reopened.

The reopening of Cashel & Emly records is of major importance to those trying to trace their ancestry in an area covering almost half of Co. Tipperary as well as a large part of East Limerick. No longer will those seeking their heritage have to be denied access to church registers at Ireland's National Library.

The information presented has been extracted from material derived from each of the schools so honored.

Bertha RONZONE Elementary School

Bertha RONZONE

April 16, 1885 - November 5, 1969

Bertha **BISHOP RONZONE** presided over what was once the largest, privately-owned chain of department stores in Nevada.

Bertha **BISHOP** was born in Iowa on 16 April 1885; she was the daughter of James W. and Sarah **BISHOP**. She moved with her family to Fowler, California where she received her early education. At age sixteen she married Attila Benjamin "Ben" **RONZONE**, a gold prospector, on 12 December 1901.

The **RONZONE**s relocated to Alaska to start a business but were swindled by their partner before they ever arrived. They stayed in Alaska for two years where their first child, daughter Amy, was born.

In 1903, the news of mineral strikes in Nevada reached the couple. They and their young daughter joined the thousands of fortune-seekers who poured into the new mining towns of Nye County. The **RONZONE**s moved around central Nevada, living in Manhattan, Tonopah and Goldfield but eventually settled in Manhattan where Bertha began working as a laundress for the miners.

While washing the miners' clothes, she realized that the miners were in need of new clothing and thought that a department store would be a successful business. She brought clothing back from a trip to Oakland and began selling them to the miners and made a large profit as the miners were desperate for new clothing. It was from this experience that the idea of **RONZONE**'s Department Store was born.

The **RONZONE**'s second child, daughter Esther, was born in 1913 in Manhattan, Nevada. Esther later married Ed **RECANZONE**. They owned and operated the Emporium Clothing Store in Yerington, Nevada. Bertha's son Richard was born in Manhattan (NV) in 1917.

When first considering starting her business, **RONZONE** lacked the funds needed to start the business and she was able to secure a \$500 loan from George **WINGFIELD** to open the first store in Manhattan in 1917. **RONZONE** moved the store to Tonopah in 1923, when the Manhattan mines went bust. In 1929, she and her husband moved the business to Las Vegas prompted by news of the dam to be built near the new city.

After her husband Ben's death in 1938, Bertha's son Richard joined her in the family business. In 1940, Richard joined the Nevada National Guard and did not return until after World War II.

Daughter Amy married Al **ADAMS** and operated the Tonopah store until it was sold in 1939. The family then expanded their chain of stores to northern Nevada in 1943.

One of Bertha RONZONE's final accomplishments was the opening of a RONZONE'S in the new Boulevard Mall in Las Vegas in 1968.

The stores were later sold and the store in the Boulevard Mall became Diamond's and later it became a Dillard's department store.

Bertha **RONZONE** was active in the Las Vegas community from the time she and her husband settled in the valley. She worked hard to help found her church, the Las Vegas Church of Religious Science.

In 1967, the University of Nevada Board of Regents named **RONZONE** a Distinguished Nevadan. That year, the mother of three received the Mother of the Year award from the Women's Guild of the Las Vegas First Church of Religious Science which **RONZONE** helped to found. She also received various awards from community business groups and her church.

RONZONE remained involved in her family's businesses until her death on 5 November 1969.

An elementary school in Las Vegas honors her accomplishments. Bertha **RONZONE** Elementary School was dedicated in 1965, and is located at 5701 Stacey Avenue.

QUERY GUIDELINES

by John FISCHER (CCNGS), Robert KENNARD, Jr (CCNGS) and Helen SMITH (CCNGS)

"Submit queries early and often"

The following guidelines for writing genealogical queries or posting queries to internet message boards may be helpful.

- **1. WHO:** Identify the person or a linking person you are looking for. Use the full name and include alternate spellings and spelling in a different language if known. e.g. John in English, Johann in German and Johannas in Latin. Include diacritical marks in names such as Bohn in English and Böhn in German.
- 2. WHAT: What do you want to know. State exactly what it is that you are looking for. Are you looking for parents, children, siblings, ancestors, descendants, birth, death, marriage, location, etc.
- 3. WHEN: Date and place them in time. Include as much information as possible for the reader to be able to identify the person(s) in the query. You may include their parents names and birth dates, burial dates, emigration/immigration dates, military service dates, graduation dates, baptism or other significant religious dates, names and birth dates of children, etc.
- **4. WHERE:** Identify an area where you know the person was living. Include as much information about locations as possible. You may include town, village, county, district and country of birth, marriage and death locations, addresses of residences over a the life of the individual, place of burial, name and location of schools attended, name and location of work places, name and location of marriage place, etc. Include diacritical marks in locations such as Tomazow in English and Tomazòw in Polish. Use both English and foreign language spellings such as Rheinland-Pfalz in German and Rhine-land-Palatinate in English or Bavaria in English and Bayern in German.
- 5. All surnames in the heading and the body of the query should be in caps and bolded.
- **6.** All surnames contained in the title should be listed alphabetically, bolded and in caps in the heading.
- 7. Names of all countries should be spelled out in their entirety except for the United States where USA is acceptable. USA is not needed if the query is for the United States only.
- **8.** Always include the names of counties if possible. The abbreviation Co. is acceptable but the spelling out of the word "County" is preferred.
- **9.** Using the standard U.S. postal system abbreviation for a state is acceptable. e.g. MA, PA, NV.
- 10. Normal genealogical abbreviations are acceptable. e.g., b. for born; d. for death date; bur. for buried; m. for married, etc.
- 11. Confine your query to one person or a married couple if possible.
- 12. Always include how you are related to the individual(s) in the query and an easy way for you to be contacted (Email, address, phone, etc.).
- 13. Keep copies and create a log of your queries indicating when and to whom they were sent.
- 14. It is important to be as consistent as possible when writing
- **15. Short concise queries** are more likely to be read.

A revision to the Civil Law is to bring a major change in the traditional family concept of Koreans as it abolishes the "hoju-je" or male-dominated family registry system, the Supreme Court said

The current system only allows children to have the last name of their biological fathers. But the revised Civil Law will allow children to be named after either of their parents' or step-parents' last names.

Korea's family register can trace a family's history, through male ancestors for over 500 years.

Under the current system, all family members are registered under "hoju," which refers to the man that "heads the family." When a woman marries, for example, her name is removed from her father's "hojeok" or family registration record and is transferred to that of her husband.

The centuries-old system used to be the source of a fierce debate. Women's rights organizations and civic activists have called for the abolition of the male-dominant registry system, based on Confucian tradition, for more than 50 years.

The current family registry lists detailed personal information, including birth, marriage and adoption, of the family head and all other members of his family, exposing them to the danger of personal information leaks.

Under the new registry system, every member of the family will have his or her own individual register, which will list the names of parents, spouse and children alone, court officials said, adding that it will not carry information on brothers and sisters.

"With individuals separated from the expanded family registry, the concept of family in Korean society will change completely," said a court official.

California Cracks down on DNA Testing

Last November members were warned that the way DNA testing was being marketed was confusing. Now the state government in California has acted to protect the public by threatening to ban genetic testing carried out on behalf of individuals.

It isn't clear at the moment how companies who carry out tests only for genealogical purposes will be affected - the letter from the state regulator has so far only been sent to companies that offer diagnostic testing, but of course many do both. I also suspect that some of the firms that offer genealogical tests contract out the physical testing to other companies.

Notes from the History of the Shawnee Indians

Compiled by Charles RECKER (CCNGS) April 2008

The Shawnee were originally part of the Algonquian Tribe. They lived in the Cumberland Valley until 1672, until they were defeated in battle by the Iroquois and forced to move to the Carolinas. The two groups reconciled in 1682, when the Shawnee participated in a treaty with William **PENN**.

In September 1774, the Shawnee were defeated in a battle with British settlers at the juncture of the Great Kanawha and Ohio Rivers. Their leaders were named Cornstalk and Black Hoof. Cornstalk, his son, Ellinipsico, and another chief named Red Hawk were murdered by soldiers in 1777.

In 1786, troops under General **LOGAN** destroyed the towns of a sub-tribe called Mequachake, who were priests, on the Mad River. That is when Shawnees fled to settle in what is now Allen County, Ohio.

In 1795, a treaty was signed at Greenville, in what is now Ohio, with General Anthony **WAYNE**. The Shawnee were represented by speakers named Blue Jacket, Red Pole, Puck-se-kaw, Black Wolf, Lame Hawk, Black Hoof, Kee-a-hah, Kekia-pil-athy and Captain Johnny. Tecumseh was born at Picqua.

In 1808, Tecumseh left Greenville, Ohio to join his brother ("The Prophet") on the banks of the Tippecanoe, a tributary of the Upper Wabash, in what is now Indiana. In 1811 Indians were defeated at the Battle of Tippecanoe. In 1813, during the War of 1812,

Tecumseh was killed in battle at the Thames River in Ontario.

In a treaty negotiated with General Lewis **CASS** and Duncan **McARTHUR** in 1817, the Shawnee under Black Hoof were given reservations at Wapakoneta and Hog Creek. None of the allies of Tecumseh, who had joined the British in 1812, were included in the treaty. There were 126 males at Wapakoneta and 21 at Hog Creek, all of whose names have been recorded.

In 1831, these Shawnee were advised by a Special Commissioner in Washington named James B. **GARDNER** that their lands would be purchased and they would have to relocate to Kansas. In the following year 700 Shawnee were forced out of Ohio. The Prophet died of cholera in Kansas in 1833.

Between 1864 and 1871, the Shawnees were forced to move again, this time to Indian Territory. By 1869, most of the Shawnees from Kansas moved to the Cherokee Reservation and in 2000, separated from the Cherokee and received federal recognition as a distinct tribe.

The Tambora Effect

William WARD (CCNGS)

Researching your family can uncover some instances that seem strange. For instance, one of my forebears married and after two children moved his little family to the frontier in Kentucky in 1803. He farmed there for 14 years while his family increased in size and in 1817, bundled them all up and moved to the frontier of Missouri in Callaway County on the Boone's Lick Road. Not only have I been unsuccessful in finding some reason for this seeming unrest, but I can't help thinking what it must have been like for him to suddenly tell his wife they were going to leave their home in Kentucky and travel to Missouri and do it all over again; clearing the trees, building another log cabin, plowing new ground, possibly fighting Indians, hunting for food in the early years! His wife, Lucy, mother of six, must have had second thoughts about all this.

My niece & fellow Family Historian, E. Jane **BAUER-SCHALSKI** of Maryland, was intrigued by this apparent erratic behavior and decided to search for some sort of reason. What she unearthed is an amazing story that could have a great impact on any family history and may provide an answer to some of your riddles.

Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia, provides the following: "The Year Without a Summer, also known as the Poverty Year, The Year There Was No Summer or Eighteen hundred and froze to death, was 1816, in which severe summer climate abnormalities destroyed crops in Northern Europe, the American Northeast and eastern Canada. Historian John D. POST has called this 'the last great subsistence crisis in the Western world.' It appears to have been caused by a volcanic winter."

The Taliaferro Times, vol 1, December 18, 1996, has this as a feature story. "During the evening of 5 April, 1815, sounds resembling cannon fire coming across the water startled the Governor of Java who sent two boats to search the Java Sea for a vessel in distress. That same day, about 900 miles to the east, at Macassar, the Captain of the East India Company's armed cruiser heard what sounded like a heavy artillery barrage, with intermittent volleys of rifle shots. No one knew or could find out what the source of all the noise was.

"The noises, as they would learn, came from Sumbawa, an island in the 'island arc system' in the Java Sea. Tambora, the volcanic mountain, had erupted and blown the top 3,000 feet off the volcano. The fantastic demolition continued for one week, killing 10,000 people on the island and in another week 82,000 would die of famine and disease.

"Geologists calculate that Tambora blew an estimated 36 cubic miles - 1,700,000 tons - of dust into the sky. Much of the talc-like dust was blown into the stratosphere and carried around the world by the jet stream. People around the world, not knowing of the eruption, soon found something was wrong with the weather. Spectacular daily sunsets along with a milky white moon and a hazy sun in a fog-covered sky caused wonder in the world's population.

"Untold thousands, perhaps millions of people starved and died of disease over the northern half of the globe. In New England clothes froze on the line in the daytime in June. The effect was felt with decreasing severity down the east coast into Georgia and Florida. There would come a short warm spell and crops would be replanted, only to be killed by frost or ice storms. All food stuffs for man and

beast were in very short supply, then exhausted. Animals were slaughtered as there was nothing to feed them and not much else for mankind to eat...inland to the Appalachians and beyond.

"Glowing reports of crop production and a fair growing year filtered back East to friends and family from those living in the Ohio and Mississippi River valleys in latter 1816. Many people left for the west because of what the weather had caused in the east. 1816 was known as 'Eighteen hundred and froze to death'"

Global atmospheric changes resulting from the explosion of Mt. Tambora in Indonesia caused three successive extended winters in 1816, 1817, and 1818 later called a "Little Ice Age". The year 1816 was known in both Europe and North America as the "year without a summer". In Europe, 1817 was called the "year of the beggars". In Alsace the disastrously poor harvests were worsened when potato blight appeared and late summer rains destroyed the grape harvests.

Because of the food crisis in 1817, the French government began to take interest in the large number of emigrants leaving Alsace for North America. The Minister of the interior asked the department prefects to keep records. By the close of the year at least 5,000 men, women and children had departed for the United States. Emigration from Upper Alsace more than doubled that from Lower Alsace.

The greatest effect on this continent was on the American northeast, New England, the Canadian Maritimes and Newfoundland. In May 1816, frost killed off most of the crops that had been planted, and in June two large snowstorms in eastern Canada and New England resulted in many human deaths. Nearly a foot of snow was observed in Quebec City in early June. In July and August, lake and river ice were observed as far south as Pennsylvania. Rapid, dramatic temperature swings were common, with temperatures sometimes reverting from normal or above normal summer temperatures as high as 95 degrees to near freezing within hours. Grain prices rose dramatically; oats for example rose from 12 cents a bushel the previous year to 92 cents a bushel, a nearly eight- fold increase; and oats are a necessary staple for an economy dependent upon horses for primary transportation.

It's no surprise that Church Registers for those three years, particularly in the northeast, show increases in the number of deaths. The patterns of migration during the early years of this country occurred following the Revolutionary War when the Tennessee and Kentucky lands were opened for settlement. Then came the Federal land bounties to veterans in the 1790s. But there was this additional rush west between 1815 and 1820 as a result of the "**Tambora Effect**". This may be the answer to some of your questions about why your ancestors made their moves westward as mine did.

Remember, there is more to genealogy than merely names and dates.

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
