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
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



About Ohio Obituary Index, 1830s-2009, Rutherford B. **HAYES** Presidential Center

This data collection is an index to over 1.5 million obituaries in Ohio newspapers from the 1810s to 2009. It has been compiled from various record sources such as newspapers, obituaries, and local government offices.

About ninety percent of the content is from newspaper citations and about ten percent from other sources. Some death notices may be lengthy articles, and some may be brief one line announcements.

A small number of marriage notices have also been indexed, along with a variety of other sources, mostly from the **HAYES** Presidential Center. Examples of these other sources are probate case files, funeral home records, society membership records, biographical files, brief references in history books, etc.

Information extracted from these documents generally includes:

- d.. Age at Death

#### History

The original index was compiled by Rutherford B. **HAYES** Presidential Center Library staff and volunteers from original newspapers, in hard copy or microfilm. Starting in 2001, other Ohio libraries started entering their data into this index, so it now extends beyond the holdings of the **HAYES** Presidential Library. In 2009, 40 libraries are

partners in the Ohio Obituary Index and are indexing old and current newspapers. The amount of indexing done for a particular county varies greatly depending on what each library has accomplished. For a complete list of the newspapers indexed and for what time period, check the List of Newspapers on the **HAYES** website.

#### Scope:

In the beginning, the index covered complete indexing of newspapers from Sandusky County, but now includes almost every northwest Ohio county. Other Ohio counties with good coverage include Wayne, Washington, Auglaize, Ross, Gallia, and Clark counties. See the map on the top page of the Hayes website for all the partner libraries.

#### **Explanation of Headings:**

Names

Names were copied exactly as written in the newspapers so researchers should check all possible spellings. Sometimes two completely different spellings were given in two different papers but it is obvious they are the same person. It is up to the researcher to check all variants. We do not correct mistakes made in the newspapers.

Maiden names are indexed if they appeared in the obituary, along with names for women who married more than once.



#### MY FAMILY STORY FROM "NEVADA'S PAST"

From "The Daily Silver Age, Carson City, Nevada, 7 October 1867"

"On Saturday evening, William A. GREAR(sp) and his wife Anna, with three grown daughters, arrived and located permanently in this place. They are from Richardson County, Nebraska, which place they left on the 12th of May. A young man named Stephan HILLBURN came through with Mr. GREAR. Also his two sons-in-law, Israel AROMMAN, wife and two children and Samuel H. PUGH, his wife and five children. One of his sons-in-law, Mr. **PUGH** we believe, proceeded to California, but the old gentleman and lady, with the children and their other son-inlaw will remain and try their fortunes in Nevada this winter. Mr. GREAR will start with a couple of teams to hauling in a few days, with success we hope. While on the plains, at Sage Creek, some half-way point between this place and the Missouri River, Mr. GREAR came upon the grave of an emigrant who was murdered by the Sioux Indians. The gave was being guarded by a beautiful black spaniel dog, who remained on the ground where his master was buried for twelve days, endevering (sp) to dig down to him. In some places he had dug holes nearly two feet deep, and was unwilling that anyone approach the grave. With much difficulty, Mr. GREER secured the faithful little fellow and brought him in."

William and Anna GREAR (correct spelling is GREER) were the parents of one of my paternal Great Grandmothers, Maryanne Marcella GREER who married Samuel Houston PUGH. Most of the PUGH's settled in California, while two boys remained in Nevada.

Effective January 2010, the Jewish Genealogy Society of Southern Nevada (JGSSN) Board of Directors is pleased to announce that it will now make its extensive library collection available to members in good standing of the CCNGS, free of charge.

The library consists of books and CD's /DVD's, videos, etc., the majority of which naturally focus on Jewish research. However, a large part of the collection is general in nature and could be of interest to all researchers.

A list of the JGSSN holding may be viewed by going to the society's web site: <a href="http://jgssn.org/">http://jgssn.org/</a>, click on "JGSSN History" (on the left side) and then near the bottom of the next window, click on "library of research material". The list will come up in an Excel format. Check the list frequently as new material is often added.

To borrow any material, (except reference only books), use the following procedure:

- Contact the JGSSN web master and Library Director Mr. Abe Simon at: <a href="mailto:abe\_simon@cox.net">abe\_simon@cox.net</a> and tell him the material you would like to borrow.
- You must pick up and return the material at one of their monthly meetings. They are held on the third Sunday of every month

(except December) at the Sahara West Library at 1 pm. Normally material is loaned for one month unless special arrangements are agreed upon. The material must be returned to JGSSN at it's following meeting.

- 3. Present your current CCNGS membership card and a driver's license to Abe to verify your valid membership.
- 4. Be prepared to leave a deposit check for the value of the borrowed item, and your CCNGS membership card. He will tell you what that amount will be. Your check will not be cashed and will be returned to you with your membership card, when you return the material, unless of course you don't return the material. In that case, your money will be used to replace the item.
- Reference only books may be requested for look-ups at the regular meetings at no charge but may not be taken from the room. That material is considered irreplaceable (e.g. out-ofprint) or too expensive (some cost over \$400!).

The JGSSN is making this policy change in the interest of all genealogists, recognizing that we are all cousins to some degree and have common interests. They wish you success in your hunt for our sometimes elusive ancestor's.

# U.S. Surgeon General Says Family History Research Can be Great for Your Health!

It's common knowledge that many physical ailments run in families. Diseases such as diabetes, cancer and heart disease are known to be passed down through generations, according to the U.S. Surgeon General's report on a Family Health History Initiative online at

http://www.hhs.gov/familyhistory/.

"Tracing the illnesses suffered by your parents, grandparents, and other blood relatives can help your doctor predict the disorders to which you may be at risk and take action to keep you and your family healthy," according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

A national public health campaign encourages all American families to learn more about their family health history. To make the process easier for family historians, the federal government has provided a Family Health Portrait Tool.

The Surgeon General's report emphasizes the importance of family history to Americans citing a recent survey that found 96 percent of those surveyed believe knowing their family history is important, "Yet, the same survey found that only one-third of Americans have ever tried to gather and write down their family's health history."

The new computerized Family Health Portrait makes creating a health history easy and it's available free online!

The revised version of the "My Family Health Portrait" tool is Webenabled. Don't worry the Feds are collecting and saving your data. Anyone with a computer and Internet access can use the program with a major Internet browser.

The tool allows users to:

- · organize family history information
- print out the information to present to a health care provider
- save information on a personal computer
- share family history information with other family members

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# **2010 U.S. CENSUS**

There may be some fear that identity thieves may try and take advantage of this census period. Here are some things we all need to know about the census:

- Proof of ID -If a Census worker comes to your door they will have a BADGE, a handheld device, a Census Bureau canvas bag, and a confidentiality notice.
   ASK to see their 10 and badge before answering.
- No Invitation -There is NO need to invite these people into your home, they are only verifying address information.
- No Personal Info -Do NOT give your SSN, credit card or banking info, or your salary range, even if they claim they need it.
- Counts Only -The ONLY thing, you need to tell them is how many people live at this address. No matter what they ask.
- No Donations -Census workers will not be soliciting donations for anything.
- No ACORNs -The Census Bureau is NOT working with ACORN, so no ACORN worker should approach you.

# QUERY GUIDELINES by John FISCHER (CCNGS), Robert KENNARD, Jr (CCNGS) and Helen SMITH (CCNGS)

# "Submit queries early and often"

The following guidelines for writing genealogical queries or posting queries to internet message boards may be helpful.

- **1. WHO:** Identify the person or a linking person you are looking for. Use the full name and include alternate spellings and spelling in a different language if known. e.g. John in English, Johann in German and Johannas in Latin. Include diacritical marks in names such as Bohn in English and Böhn in German.
- 2. WHAT: What do you want to know. State exactly what it is that you are looking for. Are you looking for parents, children, siblings, ancestors, descendants, birth, death, marriage, location, etc.
- 3. WHEN: Date and place them in time. Include as much information as possible for the reader to be able to identify the person(s) in the query. You may include their parents names and birth dates, burial dates, emigration/immigration dates, military service dates, graduation dates, baptism or other significant religious dates, names and birth dates of children, etc.
- **4. WHERE:** Identify an area where you know the person was living. Include as much information about locations as possible. You may include town, village, county, district and country of birth, marriage and death locations, addresses of residences over a the life of the individual, place of burial, name and location of schools attended, name and location of work places, name and location of marriage place, etc. Include diacritical marks in locations such as Tomazow in English and Tomazòw in Polish. Use both English and foreign language spellings such as Rheinland-Pfalz in German and Rhine--

- land-Palatinate in English or Bavaria in English and Bayern in German.
- **5.** All surnames in the heading and the body of the query should be in caps and bolded.
- **6.** All surnames contained in the title should be listed alphabetically, bolded and in caps in the heading.
- 7. Names of all countries should be spelled out in their entirety except for the United States where USA is acceptable. USA is not needed the query is for the United States only.
- **8.** Always include the names of counties if possible. The abbreviation Co. is acceptable but the spelling out of the word "County" is preferred.
- 9. Using the standard U.S. postal system abbreviation for a state is acceptable. e.g. MA, PA, NV.
- 10. Normal genealogical abbreviations are acceptable. e.g., b. for born; d. for death date; bur. for buried; m. for married, etc.
- 11. Confine your query to one person or a married couple if possible.
- 12. Always include how you are related to the individual(s) in the query and an easy way for you to be contacted (Email, address, phone, etc.).
- 13. Keep copies and create a log of your queries indicating when and to whom they were sent.
- **14.** It is important to be as consistent as possible when writing queries.
- 15. Short concise queries are more likely to be read.

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affirm the identity of her ancestor Josiah SIMS, correct inconsistencies in two pedigree charts she was studying, and expand her family tree. "I have spent seven years trying to link Josiah SIMS into another pedigree chart," said THOMAS. Prince was found in the 1870 U.S. Federal Census, along with several other **PURYEARs** - including one 55-year old woman named "Mariah." Emmitt called it destiny when the family historian uses Book 22 (his jersey number) to confirm Mariah is Prince's mother. Mariah then led Emmitt on a journey that introduced him to the slave trade in Mecklenburg County, Virginia. Seeking his African origins, Emmitt took a DNA test that guided him to the shores of Africa.

### More about the Emmitt SMITH Episode

Interested in learning more about how the team of genealogists involved in the second episode located Emmitt's enslaved ancestors? Would you like to offer members of your organization or interested newbies a better understanding of African American family history research? Take a look:

Go-to resources: Family websites, U.S. Federal Censuses, vital records, probate records, property records

How they helped: Emmitt **SMITH** didn't know much about his family history - his family didn't talk about the past when he was growing up. A recent discussion with his family, however, turned up a handful of details: first, it's rumored his grandmother had "white blood;" and second, his grandmother was from a small town, Burnt Corn, Alabama. These two tidbits help him learn more about his African heritage.

#### Resource #1: Family website

Emmitt knew his grandmother Erma Lee **WATSON**. But who were her parents? Emmitt found a family website that offered details including names and places. The facts presented look good but more research will be necessary to ensure this is the correct family.

#### Resource #2: 1900 U.S. Federal Census

Taking a trip to Burnt Corn is revealing, but it doesn't quite provide the answers Emmitt was hoping for. The 1900 census, however, did. It showed Erma Lee **WATSON**'s grandparents, William and Victoria **WATSON**, and indicated that they were both born in Alabama in the 1860s - which may mean slavery. Does the family line stop here?

#### Resource #3: Vital records

Not ready to give up, Emmitt ventured to the county courthouse, where he found a marriage record filed with the "colored" records for his 2nd great-grandparents, William and Victoria. Victoria's maiden name was revealed: **PURYEAR**. Since a slave often adopted the name of a former owner, Emmitt wondered if this is the clue he needed to find his ancestors' slave owner and more hints about his own family. He dug further, finding a death certificate for Victoria, which listed her father's name: Prince **PURYEAR**.

#### Resource #4: 1870 U.S. Federal Census

Prior to 1870, slaves were considered property and weren't listed by name in the federal census. At best, a headcount was taken and entered on a slave schedule. But the Civil War changed all of that. Emmitt's research moveed forward to look for the **PURYEAR** name in the first census record when all African Americans would finally be listed by name. He found Prince **PURYEAR**, race mulatto. But he also found other **PURYEAR**s on the page, including Mariah **PURYEAR**, age 55, also mulatto. Was this Prince's mom?

#### Resource #5: Probate records

The search turned to Mariah - Emmitt wanted to know if there really was a connection between her and Prince and the other **PURYEARs** on the page. Now it's time to tackle the slave-owner's family. A man named Alexander **PURYEAR** from Burnt Corn, Alabama, seemed like a likely candidate. Researching his probate records turned up a letter from Alexander indicating he was a slave trader. Alexander's wife, Mary, listed Mariah and her children by name in her will. Prince was one of them.

#### **Resource #6: Property records**

Defying the myth that you can't get past 1870 in African American research, Emmitt traveled to Virginia, where he concluded that the **PURYEAR**s were slave traders. He found a deed in which Mariah, age 11, was passed to Alexander along with a saddle and a horse bridle. While he doesn't know for sure, Emmitt considered the possibility that Alexander's father, Samuel **PURYEAR**, may have been Mariah's father. Nothing was found that would indicate who Mariah's mother was. Emmitt turned to DNA testing to complete his journey

back to Africa.

#### Was EMMITT just lucky?

African American research requires the same steps as any American research, until you reach slavery. Persistence and a keen eye to the details listed on every document are keys to success. Clues in the 1870 census and later documents can lead to revealing finds. Check surnames - look for the slave-owning family by the same name, white families who own large parcels of land living nearby in 1870. Even out-of-state birthplaces of the slave that match the birthplaces of possible slave owners can be clues. It was not a universal rule that a slave would adopt a slave owner's surname or stay nearby once freed. But it

happened often enough that it's worth checking. In Emmitt SMITH's case, these two facts made it easier for him to trace the slave-owning family and find documented clues leading to Emmitt's kin along the way.

The information presented has been extracted from material derived from each of the schools so honored.



# Greenspun Junior High



Greenspun Junior High School is named in honor of Hank and Barbara GREENSPUN, notable Las Vegans who made a tremendous contribution to Clark County.

Ever since H. M. "Hank" GREENSPUN became publisher-editor of the *Las Vegas Sun* on 1 June 1950, his readers have been repeatedly rocked and rattled by his straight forward pull-no-punch type of journalism.

Hank was born in Brooklyn, NY, 27 August 1909. While still quite young, the **GREENSPUN** family

moved to New Haven, CT, where Hank worked as a newsboy and ran errands for the town's merchants in order to assist his family financially. Besides his parents, the family consisted of two sisters, Alice and Mildred and a brother Dave.

After his early schooling in New Haven, Hank worked his way through St. John's College and St. John's University School of Law. He was graduated with a Bachelor of Law Degree and admitted to the bar in the State of NY where he is still eligible to practice.

When he was old enough to register, Hank **GREENSPUN** declared himself a Republican and never wavered from that choice. With other vigorous and outspoken members of the party in New York City, he helped fight Tammany **HALL** to elect the "Little Flower," Fiorello H. **La GUARDIA**, Mayor of New York. He was a devoted worker in all of Tom **DEWEY**'s campaigns for District Attorney and Governor of !he state.

Early in 1941, when it appeared imminent that the United States would become actively embroiled in World War II, Hank entered the army as a private and eventually became a company commander. He served under the late General George F. **PATTON** for three and a half years in the European Theatre of Operations. In 1946, while a resident of southern Nevada, he became Major **GREENSPUN**.

Hank served a total of five and one half years in the army and during that time was awarded the French Croix de Guerre with silver star for conspicuous service in the Battle of Falaise Gap. He saw further action in the battles of St. Lo, Avranches and Nancy, and took part in General PATTON's push across France, winning commendations from Generals PATTON and EISENHOWER. GREENSPUN also

was awarded the Conspicuous Service Cross from the State of New York.

While stationed in Ireland, Hank met and fell in love with an Irish lass, Barbara **RITCHIE**. After a whirlwind courtship, they were married in Belfast in 1944. A few days after the marriage, he was ordered to return to his company, awaiting the invasion of France. Barbara went to England shortly thereafter and worked for SHAEF Headquarters in London.

The **GREENSPUN**s left England together aboard a hospital ship bound for the United States and for a short while settled in Springfield, MA. Having a natural adventurous spirit, Hank decided to move west in 1946, with his Irish war bride and 13 month old daughter and settled in Boulder City, NV. Hank and Barbara now had four children, Susan. Brian. Jane and Danny, three of whom were born in Nevada.

One of Hank **GREENSPUN**'s first ventures in Nevada was to publish a magazine for the area, "*LAS VEGAS LIFE*." However, while doing publicity for a major Las Vegas hotel, he learned that a weekly newspaper, "*THE FREE PRESS*," was for sale. He purchased it.

This was the beginning of one of the most astoundingly successful newspaper stories in the country. The first edition of the *LAS VEGAS SUN* hit the streets in 1950, and became one of Nevada's major newspapers with a reputation for fairness and integrity which is recognized throughout the country.

Hank won a multitude of honors for his journalism and the Sun for its outstanding community service.

In addition to the newspaper, publisher **GREENSPUN** was the owner of KLAS-TV, the first television station in Nevada, had real estate holdings and had a golf course with a family country club. His faith in Nevada was symbolized by his continued investment in the state.

Hank held membership in the National Press Club, the Overseas Press Club, the American Newspaper Publishers Association, the California Publishers Association and was a past president of the Nevada State Press Association. He was also a member of the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

To residents of Las Vegas he was a familiar sight as he prowled endlessly through the casinos, stopped to chat with hotel executives, got an exclusive bit of news from a builder, exchanged banter with a judge or listened to a complaint from a tourist. All the while, he was picking up nuggets of inside information for his famed page one column, "Where I Stand," which was also the title of a book that he had published.

Financial success alone was never Hank's goal. He become a legend because of his complete abandon when an issue was at stake. In 1952, as the Nevada elections approached, he decided to take on the toughest, the most feared man in the state: aging, shrewd Senator Pat McCARRAN. The state's most important industry, Gambling, de-

pended on the Senator, a powerhouse in Washington, for its survival. In March of 1952, GREENSPUN began blasting Senator McCAR-RAN in his column. Shortly thereafter, the advertising directors of each of the gambling casinos notified the Sun that they were cancelling their ads. The newspaper lost thirty percent of its revenue. Instead of backing down and buttering up to the Senator, GREENSPUN hit back with a \$225,000 suit charging McCARRAN and some 40 hotel executives with a conspiracy to drive him out of business. GREENSPUN wrung an \$80,500 settlement from McCARRAN and the executives and also a gentlemen's agreement that the casinos would keep on advertising in the paper. With that victory, Hank was off and running.

After he tangled with Senator McCARRAN. Publisher GREEN-SPUN took on city commissioners, judges, a Clark County sheriff, the late Senator Joe McCARTHY, attorneys, and many businessmen who he felt were taking advantage of the citizenry.

David **BEN-GURION**, the former Prime Minister of Israel, commended Hank **GREENSPUN** for the part he played in obtaining arms for the new nation that was desperately building an army to defend itself from invasion by Arab troops.

Hank's two sisters and brother lived in Nevada, as did his mother and father before their deaths. He was devoted to his entire family as he was to his adopted state.

A prominent Las Vegan echoed the sentiments of many citizens of southern Nevada, "Whenever anyone wants to fight against unscrupulous office-holders, unsavory conditions affecting the public welfare, have been maligned or mistreated, are dissatisfied with utility service or need help in general, they have a habit of looking toward Hank **GREENSPUN** and the *Las Vegas Sun*."

His friends said he's a fearless enemy of corruption. His enemies called him a power-hungry tin god, but all agreed that this former combat officer, undercover agent and gun-runner, Hank was one of the last of America's fighting publishers.

Hank **GREENSPUN** died of cancer 22 July 1989. Former Israeli Prime Minister Shimon **PERES** called **GREENSPUN** "a hero of our country and a fighter for freedom - a man of great spirit who fought with his mind and his soul; a man of great conviction and commitment."

# **Finding Funeral Home Records**



Funeral home records can provide the researcher with information about an ancestor's death that augment or enhance cemetery and death records. Records may show few details or the minutia involved in planning a funeral down to what flowers were sent and any clothes or beautician services purchased

by the deceased's loved ones. Other details like who paid for the funeral might help identify family members and their addresses. Ministers who are listed as performing the funeral service provide a clue as to additional church records that may be available.

Where can you find funeral home records? Start with the funeral home itself if you have that information. You may find the information for the funeral home from your ancestor's death certificate, cemetery records, obituary or funeral notice in the newspaper. When requesting records, remember that the funeral home's main purpose is not to assist genealogists looking for records; they are in business to help those who have recently lost a loved one. The best approach is by letter, email or phone call. Showing up unexpectedly while they are busy assisting families won't be to your benefit.

Unfortunately, funeral home records are the records of a private company and being such they do not have to archive them or share them. Because family owned funeral homes now are increasingly being purchased by larger funeral home corporations, older records often are destroyed. In the case of a funeral home that has been bought out, inquire with other area funeral homes as to who may have the records. Funeral Directors usually know the history of other funeral homes in the area. So you can ask them questions to help you locate the records of funeral homes that may have gone out of business. But don't be surprised if those records do not exist anymore.

Be patient when requesting information. These records are private records and as a private business, the funeral home can choose when and who, if ever, they share them with. Some funeral homes may cite confidentiality. I had this happen in one case for a record I needed from the 1960s. I explained that I had the death certificate and that I was just looking for the name of the person who paid for the burial. The employee ended up providing me with that information but only after she explained that those old records were large and stored in a difficult to reach place.

The Family History Library (http://www.familysearch.org/eng/Library/FHLC/frameset\_fhlc.asp) has some funeral home records that have been microfilmed. From the catalog home page conduct a place search for the state or country you are interested in. Then chose the country by clicking on the button at the top right hand side, "view related places." Conducting a keyword search for the phrase "funeral home" will also provide you with a list of resources.

One resource that might help you is the <u>National Yellow Book of Funeral Directors</u> by Nomis Publications (*http://www.nomispublications.com/*). This book can help you locate a funeral home and may be available at your local library or local funeral home. You can also purchase it from the publisher.

More and more funeral home records are being placed online by genealogical or historical societies, libraries or archives, or by the funeral home itself. Try Googling (http://www.google.com/ig?hl=en) the name of the funeral home or the locality and the phrase "funeral home" or "mortuary." You may also want to try local and state archives, libraries and other repositories to see what death records, including funeral home records, exist in their collections.

# POWER HOUR from Family Tree Magazine.

Find Your Roots in an Hour!! - on your lunch hour.

- 1. Google your ancestors. Search with your computer, do some Genealogy-googling. Take advantage of Google's ability to combine search terms and find exact phrases. Enter an ancestor's name-corralled within quotation marks-plus a location where the family lived. Then begin your search.
- 2. Search every book printed -well not every book, but it may seem like it. You'll be amazed the amount of information you will find.
- 3. Check your DNA. Order a test kit from one of the many genetic genealogy services online (see www.familytreemagazine.com/dna)
- 4. Download Military Records. These can be obtained from the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). Digital records can be downloaded. Pension and bounty applications can be requested.
- 5. Request a death certificate. Some ancestor records are online. Visit www.ced.gov/nchs/hmvto/w2w/w2welcom.htm to get to the vital records office in the state where your ancestor died. Verify that the death was recorded, then follow the instructions for making a request.
- 6. Interview your aunt or great uncle or grandparent. You get the idea. These folks remember lots. They can always give you facts that you need to find someone.
- 7. Order records on microfilm. Family History Center microfilm can be rented from Salt Lake City. Microfilm may be the best bargain to genealogists.
- 8. Join a society. Societies have microfilm for viewing, records to look through, and information you may be looking for. Web sites are also available for different societies.
- 9. Watch, listen and learn. There are genealogy programs to work through, learning more as you do so.
- 10. Make new genealogy friends. Just as My Space (www.mvspace.com) and Facebook (www. facebookcom) are must stop for Web users, social networking sites such as Geni (www.geni. com) and Family History Link (www.familyhistorylink.com) are the hottest trend in genealogy. Try them.
- 11. Use the Library. Public libraries have some genealogy records that are readily available for your use. An email or phone call to the library in your ancestral area can start librarians searching for you also.
- 12. Update your family tree. Keep notes on things you've recently learned. Make sure you get the information down to be usable.
- 13. Back up your family tree files. Once your data is up to date, make a backup file so that in case of an accident or unusual event (tornado, flood, fire, etc.,) you have a copy available of all the facts you have.
- 14. Read a blog. When time permits try: Ancestry insider (*ancestryinsider.blogspot.com*) delivers techno gossip and tips not only on *Ancestry.com* but other sites. EASTMAN's Online Genealogy Newsletter (*www.blog.econ.com*) offers "straight talk" from knowledgeable online genealogy veteran Dick EASTMAN. Genea-Musings (*www.genealogue.com*) introduces you to the lighter side of genealogy. There will be times when you'll need to block off much more time, several hours at a time, rather than just a lunch hour, but just imagine how much you'll be learning about your ancestors.



The San Pedro, Salt Lake and Los Angeles Railroad, owned by Montana Senator William Clark, purchased the Las Vegas Ranch from Helen Stewart in 1902, and auctioned off lots for a townsite three years later. The ranch was originally a Mormon mission in 1855, then operated by a series of owners. It continued to be leased and operated as a ranch, a resort and supplier of meat, dairy and produce for Las Vegas well into the 20th century
