Address Books as a Source for Research Leads

I just purchased a new address book. Though I have the same information on my computer, I seem to always need an address book in the kitchen drawer. When I've finished transferring the information from the old to the new book, I'll toss the old book in a "dead" papers box. Luckily for me, my mother in law Frieda also saved her old address books.

Frieda's mother came to the United States from what is now the Ukraine. The family had an unusual surname – **MAKAGON**. I was curious about that family line and followed all leads in search of information about the **MAKAGON** family. One of my best leads came from one of Frieda's address books.

I had heard that a **MAKAGON** cousin had married a man named Jack **SANDLER** and traveled from the Ukraine to the United States with him. Frieda's address book had an address for the daughter-in-law of this couple. Frieda wasn't sure but guessed that the address in her book was at least 10 years old. I decided to write a letter anyway.

A few weeks later I received a reply. The daughter-in-law was still living at that address and she generously answered my questions about the **MAKAGON** family. She also shared photographs, newspaper clippings and her stories about family members. A couple of years later she attended a conference in Las Vegas and was able to spend a day with our family. My mother-in-law made arrangements to be in Las Vegas for her visit. It was wonderful to listen to them reminisce about people I knew only as names in my database.

Frieda began to view her "old" stuff in a new light and I began to get leads from Frieda as she reviewed her books. As a bonus, I also had memories Frieda related as she paged through the books filled with links to the past.

When the 1940 U.S. Census is released in April of 2012, you will need an address to access the census pages until the census is indexed. Maybe an old address book could help you get a head start on that new record group.

Address books turned out to be a great source for me. Perhaps you will find leads in them too.

When I received this article from Mary **BARKAN**, I responded to her email with the following information relating one of my experiences with Address Books and want to share it in The Prospector also. Address Books can be a great source of finding long lost relatives and family friends who can provide more information for your Family Tree. My response to Mary is as follows:

Hi Mary,

I love your article. I've used Address Books "a little". I found an address book from my God-Mother Helia (my mother's sister, my aunt). It had an address in Finland for a relative of her husband who wasn't a relative of mine. I wrote to her and her son-in-law translated it for her. I also told her that we were planning a trip to Finland. I got a response (written by him) from her in which she said that she knew "my family" and when we come to Finland, she would get us in contact with them. It was wonderful. We met so many relatives and found new information.

QUAKER OBITUARIES

The American Annual Monitor For 1861; or Obituaries of the Members of the Society of Friends in America For the Year 1860 -No. 4. Abstracted by Linda Norman GARRISON.

Originally published for the Tract Association of Friends, by Samuel S. & William **WOOD**, 889 Broadway, New York, 1861. Reprinted by Southwest Oklahoma Genealogical Society with added index, 2002. This is an 8 1/2" x 11" photocopy of the original book which measured 4" x 6".

The death notices and obituaries in this book cover a large area of the United States. Residences noted were Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Maine, Maryland, Massachussetts, Michigan, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Vermont, some listed as Canada West and Canada East, and at least one from Nova Scotia in Canada. The basic information lists the name, age, date of death and residence. If the deceased was a child, the parents are listed. If the deceased was a woman, her husband or deceased husband was listed. An elder of the church was always noted.

However, many of the obituaries contain additional information. Some only discuss the religious life of the deceased, some tell about the last illness or accident that resulted in the death, and others give information that to a researcher is "Manna from Heaven." \$20.00 210 pp., soft cover

DO YOU KNOW THE ORIGIN OF YOUR SURNAME? By Connie FROST (CCNGS)

I was born Constance Marie **UVEGES**, and can remember all of my school years being the last in the seating chart, and last in the roll-calls. I alrnost hated having to give rny name to anyone because they would always ask, "Can you repeat that?" "How do you spell that?" and "What nationality is that?"

I always knew it was an Hungarian surname, and had learned that Uveg rneant bottle but -- I wasn't impressed. Then --- I started my genealogy. After locating my Grandfather's Naturalization papers, it took me two years and a plea for help on a very new and slow internet to find the location of his hometown. As I searched the name of the Province, I learned that this northern most town in Hungary was a world famous wine region. Having an excellent climate, the number of wine cellars carved into limestone is now over 200. During the 1620's, the so-called "*aszu*" wine (sweet wine of the first press) was produced here for the first time.

In the early 12th to 15th centuries, a lot of family names were designated after the profession or art of the head of the family. Places where wine was produced had their own "*uveges*" who prepared the bottle for their wine.

In that part of Hungary, my name is like **SMITH** or **JONES** would be here, and now I like to share the story of my "awful" name with others. Delving into the histories of towns and cities whether here or across the Ocean, can reveal more than you think.

HOW TO FIGURE A BIRTHDATE

REMEMBER THIS NUMBER: 8870

This is the number to remember when you want to find the birth date of someone when you only have the date of death and age.

Suppose the person d. May 6, 1889, at the age of 71 years, 7 months, 9 days.


- 1. Write the year, month, day as: 18890506
- 2. Subtract the age at death: 710709
- 3. This gives the figure: 18179797
- 4. Now subtract 8870
- 5. The result is: 18170927

Year 1817, 9th month (Sep), 27th day or 27 Sep 1817

New One Step Tutorial/Quiz on 1940 Census Search

In less than 10 months, the 1940 U.S. Population Schedules will become public. It will not be name indexed, so it will be necessary to do an address search in order to find families. Address searching involves knowing the ED (enumeration district) in which the address is located.

The National Archives (NARA) earlier this year, indicated it had plans to make available, in 2011, the 1940 ED maps of cities and counties, and ED descriptions, but their recent move to consider having a 3rd party host all the images may have appreciably set back this timetable.

The only website that currently has location tools for the 1940 census is the Steve Morse One Step site (*http://stevemorse.org*). There are several such tools there, and it could be overwhelming to figure out which tool to use when. There is a tutorial that attempts to clarify it at (*http://stevemorse.org/census/intro.html*) and an extensive FAQ (http://stevemorse.org/census/faq.htm).

Morse and Joel Weintraub have announced the opening of another educational utility to help people learn about the different 1940 location search tools on the One Step site, and information about the 1940 census itself. It is in the form of a quiz, and should help many, many genealogists quickly learn how to search an unindexed census by location. The new utility is at: *http://stevemorse.org/census/quiz.php* and is called "*How to Access the 1940 Census in One Step*."

In order to request one of these items, you will be asked to provide the name of the author, the publication's title, the publication place and date, and the OCLC number. You may find this information on World-cat.org. If the Library owns the item, the request will not be processed. There is no change to the procedure for requesting journal or newspaper articles, obituaries, or microfilm/microfiche through Interlibrary Loan. Memories of an American Swiss Christmas

Peter (1841-1913) and Margarita LUTHY (1847-1929), Waldo Hills, Oregon

These Christmas memories come from Florence **LUTHY KING** and Helen Olivia **LUTHY DuRENE** following a telephone conversation in the 1960's. Helen wrote the following story:

"The tree was not put up until Christmas Eve. The affair was kept very secret; none of the younger children were allowed into the room until the tree was finished and the wax candles were lit. I shall never forget the smell of the evergreen tree mixed with the fragrance of the wax candles burning. We had to watch so carefully so there would not be a fire.

Small gifts were hung on the tree and large ones placed underneath. There were always **Springerlie** cookies hung on the branches and any guest calling during holidays could clip a cookie from the tree.

Mother had some very old birds, almost life-sized, that were treasured from year to year. They were feathered birds with wings spread and hung with tiny elastic cords in such a way they would bob up and down to give the appearance of flying.

Eggs were blown out and glue was placed on the empty shells and they were wound with colored yarn and then decorated with glitter or pieces of old Christmas cards, or bits of lace and such. I remember on some there were colored pictures of angels that were embroidered with loops of fine tinsel.

These ornaments were kept from year to year. Among Mother's decorations were large beads, oval shaped, about an inch and a half long. A loop of small tinsel was threaded through the single beads and hung on the small branches. These beads were of a light material, something like our ball ornaments.

I remember other things used on our tree were stars and different things cut from paper. Some were single, but some were folded. They were hung on long threads so they would twist and turn in the breeze caused by doors opening.

At Christmas there was always some talk of Saint Nicholas, but there was also a Mrs. Saint Nicholas. She wore a flowing garment, not red like the Mister's. Once we got to peek, and Mrs. St. Nicholas was fixing things on our tree. We saw her from the back. In later years we learned it was really Aunt Florence dressed in a sheet and helping Mother so we younger kids didn't have so long to wait.

One custom I have read that they used to do in Switzerland was to put feed out for the birds. Clumps of grass seed straws that had been stored especially for the birds for "weinacht" were hung outside.

After we saw our tree, we sat down while Mother read the scripture of the Lord's birth from her German Bible. Then we all sang songs. There were three songs that I remember: "*Der Christ Baum ist der Schnester Baum,I*" "*Heilige Nacht*," and "*O Du Freeliger*." We had these songs in an old songbook the folks brought from the old country or Ohio. Translated, these are "*The Christmas Tree is the Most Beautiful Tree,*" "*Holy Night*," and "*O You Who are Rejoicing*."

After the songs, the candles were blown out and gifts were given. Then we had candy and nuts, peanuts and almonds mostly. Besides the Springerlie cookies, we used to have "knee patches." They were made from a dough one cut out in large rounds; wearing a white apron, you would stretch each one over the knee until they were sort of a cup shape, then bake them in a hot oil, like doughnuts.

Mother used to line the wash boiler with a piece of sheet and then store the cookies in there until we ate them. They never lasted very

long.

The tree was kept until well after the New Year. Candles were re-lit on New Year's Eve and Mother always had a bag of old-fashioned candy and mixed nuts she would bring out for a treat. There was always New Year's bread, baked in a big circle to be cut at midnight. The circle represented the year to come.

Christmas was a wonderful time in our American Swiss home in the Waldo Hills of Oregon."

Great-Grandma LUTHY's Springherle Cookies from Helen LUTHY DuRETTE

One pound of flour One pound of sugar Nine eggs Butter the size of an egg 1/2 teaspoon of soda Salt to taste

Beat eggs to lemon color, add sugar and beat fifteen minutes or more. Stir in flour. Roll out and cut with various cutters. Place on cookie sheet and let chill, then bake till done but not browned.

You can add any flavoring desired. 1/2 tsp. anise oil was often used but we used vanilla or lemon extract.

Among Mother's cutters were a goose, a bird, a man, a tree, a wreath, and small scalloped-edged rounds. These were strung singly and hung on the tree. They keep their taste for a long time as they don't seem to get stale.

EARLY CENSUSES CLARIFIED

By William WARD (CCNGS President)

When working with the early United States Censuses of 1810 and 1820, be aware that the Census Bureau changed the columns which has caused some confusion about the number of people enumerated.

The <u>1810 Census</u> had the following columns:

Under 10 10-16 16-26 26-45 Over 45

The 10 to 16 column does not include any who have reached 16 years of age as they were enumerated in the 16 to 26 column.

The <u>1820 Census</u> added an extra <u>male</u> column:

Under 10 10-16 <u>between 16 & 18</u> 16 & under 26 26 & under 45 45 & upwards

The extra column headed "between 16 & 18" was added to identify males of military age. Do not count these as "additional" members of the family because they are already included in the next column 16 & under 26. The language of the headings was also clarified to indicate more exact totals.

ASK FOR A COPY OF THE LEDGER PAGE

Larry HEFFNER in Lewisburg, West Virginia

Many of us while researching write to various government institutions, such as court houses, looking for information to prove our ancestry. Some of the most common requests are for copies of birth, marriage, or death certificates. There is nothing wrong with such requests but you must realize that many of these items are not recorded as certificates. Many are just recorded as entries in a large ledger book. When you request a "copy of a certificate" the person in the courthouse goes to the ledger, copies the requested information and enters the data into whatever standard form is currently being used at that particular courthouse, etc.

This method allows for transcription errors and usually supplies only the very basic information such as names, date, and place where the event took place. But, if you ask for a photocopy of the page in the ledger where the information was originally recorded you will receive the information as recorded and you may receive much more information than what is placed on the standard certificate.

Climbing Over Brick Walls – One Brick at a Time!



While updating the genealogical information I have for my father's ancestors, I realized that I have almost no information about his grandmother, Frances **McDONALD LANG**. I was feeling fairly comfortable with the information I had located regarding his paternal German grandparents (**LANG/HEEB**) and had information back to the 1600's. This was due in large part to information from my grandmother, a cousin, and a professional genealogist that I hired to search for information in Wurtemburg, Germany.

After looking at the few pictures I have of Frances and reviewing the huge binders I have that are filled with **LANG/HEEB** information, it dawned on me that I had very little information about Frances and not even a small binder to commemorate her life in New York. How could I have missed this during the past 15 years that I have been researching my family tree? The search was on!

Who was Frances McDONALD LANG?

<u>A daughter</u>: Frances' parents were Samuel and Frances M. McDON-ALD. She was born 22 March 1866, or 28 March 1864 or 1865, in Northeast Center in the Town of Northeast, Clinton, New York, which is about 20 miles from the Village of Rhinebeck. Her headstone shows 1864 as the year she was born. Census records indicate that her father was from Scotland and her mother was from France. Her father's occupation was a farmer.

A sister (?): I have no information about siblings.

<u>A wife</u>: Frances, age 24, married Jacob Henry **LANG** (born 8 March 1866), age 22, on 13 February 1889, in the Town of Milan, Dutchess Co., New York. (Family Bible, Certificate of Marriage, Return of a Marriage to the Bureau of Vital Statistics.) The Town of Milan joins the Town of Rhinebeck and the Town of Clinton. They were married at the parsonage of the Milan Christian Church. Witnesses to the marriage were Maggie D. **HEEB** and Leibbie **STEUART** (possible misspelling).

Jacob owned almost 50 acres in Dutchess County. Six acres were in the Town of Rhinebeck. Some of the acreage was purchased from his father, John George LANG. Jacob was a violet farmer. A cousin recalls that Jacob's daughters would pick violets and sell them. Rhinebeck was and still is known as the undisputed Violet Capital of the World. The American Florist Company Directory of 1912 shows George LANG, Jacob's father, as one of about 120 owners of violet greenhouses in Rhinebeck.

Jacob died at the age of 48 (died 8 October 1914) in Rhinebeck, New York, leaving his wife to care for four daughters, ages 18, 15, 12, and 9 years. Some of the older girls worked at the large estates along the Hudson River to help support the family. It is possible that the oldest daughter (my grandmother) worked for the **ASTOR** family who had an estate in Rhinebeck.

Amother: Frances was the mother of 9 children, 2 sons and 6 daughters. Her last child of unknown gender died at birth when Frances was 44 years old. Pictures of the family home present a large, well-kept house with a beautiful yard.

<u>A community member</u>: The 1880 census shows Frances was working as a servant, living near Cornelius WELCH. I found that Jacob LANG's sister married James M. WELCH. Further research will have to be done to see if there is any connection. On the 1915 census, the year following her husband's death, Frances is listed as a violet grower. It appears that she continued to run his violet farm. However, between 1914 and 1925, a combination of "black rot" disease appearing in many greenhouses and larger growers buying out the smaller growers, many violet greenhouses went out of business. (From "**The Violets of Dutchess County**" by Norma **BEREDJIKLIAN**; Reprinted from *The Violet Gazette*, Autumn 2000, V1-4, P3) More research will have to be done to find out what happened to the **LANAG** violet business.

<u>A church member</u>: Frances attended Milan Christian Church, Hillside Methodist Church, and St. Paul's Lutheran Church of Wurtemburg, Rhinebeck, NY

<u>A widow</u>: Looking at the Inventory of the Estate of Jacob **LANG** following his death through Frances' eyes was very emotional for me. These assets were what she now had to use to take care of her family. Jacob had saved about \$3200.00 in four different savings and bank accounts. Their real property was valued at about \$2600.00, which included 207 small fowl (\$60.00), an 8 year old brown mare (\$125.00), a three seated wagon (\$35.00), apples in a bag (\$5.00) and many more items needed on a farm. Each of her eight children inherited \$200.00.

Death: Frances lived with her daughters in the years before her death. She died 2 January 1942, in Niskayuna, Schenectady Co., New York. Niskayuna is about 6 miles southeast of Schenectady on Highway 7, about 12 miles north of Rensselaer, New York. She had been living with her daughter, Elizabeth **LANG BLAKELY** for 7 months preceding her death. She was 75 years, 9 months old when she died. (Death Certificate)

Funeral services were held at the **CARROLL/CORNELIUS** Funeral Home. The records of the **CARROLL/CORNELIUS** Funeral Home have been lost.

She is buried at the Wurtemburg Cemetery, Rhinebeck, New York, next to her husband, Jacob (plot #189). The headstone shows the date as 1941, but the death certificate clearly shows 1942.


<u>Summary</u>:

HENRY & EVELYN BOZARTH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL



Henry Clay 'Hank' **BOZARTH**, affectionately known as "Papa B," was born 27 May 1922 in Caldwell County Kentucky. He served a distinguished career in the Air Force and in public school administration. Hank earned a BA, Master's degree and Ph. D. in Education from the University of Texas. He taught in the Austin, Texas Independent School District, was an elemen-

tary school principal with the San Angelo Texas School District, and was an assistant professor at both East Texas State College and the University of Texas at Austin before becoming the Director of Elementary Education in the Port Arthur Texas School District in 1962. In 1964, he and his family moved to Las Vegas where he was hired as a Director of Education for the Clark County School District. He was later assigned to the position of Curriculum Coordinator for the school district from which he retired in 1988.

Hank served a distinguished career in the Army Air Corps from 1943 – 1945 and continued as an Air Force reservist until 1968. Upon completion of pilot training, Henry Bozarth flew 63 missions over Europe during World War II. The B-26 Bomber named "Flak-Bait", was the first bomber to survive over 200 combat missions in that conflict. Its nose section is on display in the Smithsonian's Air and Space Museum in Washington, D.C. A picture of Henry and his crew is posted in a display in front of the exhibit. Hank achieved the rank of Major in the Air Force reserves.

Hank's greatest joy was to share the cabin he and his family built within view of Brianhead, Utah. His favorite summer vacations were spent with construction projects for this home away from home.

Mr. Henry Clay "Hank" **BOZARTH** died on 22 January 2005, and was survived by his wife, Mrs. Blanche **BOZARTH**, and several family members.





Mrs. Evelyn **BOZARTH** earned a triple major in mathematics, biological science, and education at Louisianan State University. She earned her Master of Education degree at the University of Texas at Austin. She taught high school for four years in Vinton, Louissiana before she moved to Texas where she taught elmentary school in both Austin and Port Arthur, Texas. She moved

to Las Vegas in 1964 and taught at Ruby Thomas Elementary School from 1964 -1988 when she retired. While working for Clark County School District, she wrote the mathematics curriculum for CCSD for 4th, 5th, and 6th grades in the 60's. The curriculum was used for 30 years. Among other educational awards, she earned the Lemuel Scarborough Award for Excellence in Teaching. Mrs. Evelyn **BOZARTH** passed away after her retirement.

The School named for Henry and Evelyn **BOZARTH** is located at 7431 North Egan Crest Drive, Las Vegas, Nevada 89166 it was dedicated 21 August 2009.

Mr. **BOZARTH** WAS ONE OF many fine men who have served our country. we thank his family for sharing these historic images.


