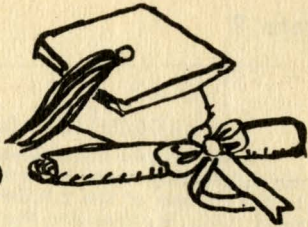

The Liberty Bell has been moved many times. During the Revolution, before the British captured Philadelphia in the summer of 1777, the Bell was taken to Allentown, Pa., and hidden for a year. Now too old and sacred to be exposed to the rigors of travel, it will remain in dignified position in Independence Hall during the Independence Savings Bonds Drive, but 49 exact replicas of it will tour the country from May 15 through July 4.

When the original Liberty Bell was recast, the English model was broken up, and the original metal was added some American copper. This was to make the bell less brittle. But it always suffered from that weakness.

The Southern Zone Track meet was held at Butcher Field in Las Vegas last Friday, May 6. Boulder City won the meet with ease while Basic only collected 12 points and placed third.

Clifford "Red" Hunter lived up to his reputation by taking top honors in the mile. "Red" also placed second in the 880.

Allen Cureton took third in the mile and added some points for Basic in the process.

Clyde Echols, who had a cinched second place collapsed about fifty yards from the finish line.

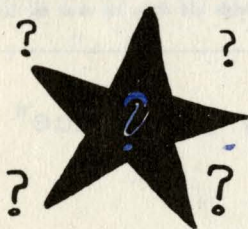
The complete line will return with the exception of Jim Anderson who might be replaced by an up-and-coming future letterman George Rostine along with Aaron

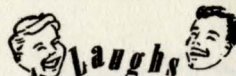

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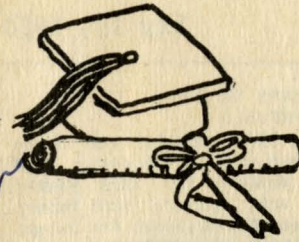
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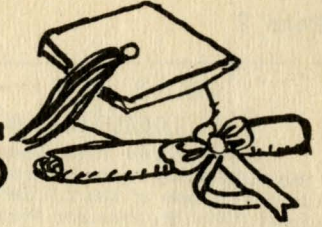
