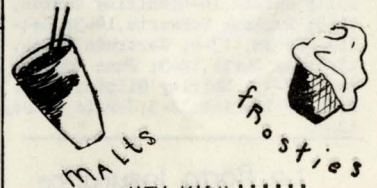
The halls around seem empty. The reason is that a few seniors were lucky enough to get jobs and were excused from school early.

STITT! BASIC'S NEW TRACK STAR

VEGAS WILDCATS WIN
OVER BASIC 8-5

The Las Vegas Wildcats were all-conquering at the Boulder City Invitational Track Meet by collecting 57 1/2 points. Boulder City was their closest contender with 34 3/4 points. Then came St. George, Utah, with 25 3/4 points, Basic and Virgin Valley with 11 points each, and Kingman with 1.

Bill Stitt, Basic's halfmiler stole the show by taking the 880 in 2:04.2, just two-tenths of a second off the state record, and just a little over a second slower for the Boulder Invitational Meet record.

Bill Heese took second place in the discus with a throw of 114 ft. 7 in. Don Warren took a fourth in the shot-put with a heave of 40' 1". The relay team collected some points by placing third in the 880 yd. relay. Arvan Leany, Don Richardson, Van Marshall, and Gerald Clements made up the relay team and all got third place medals.
