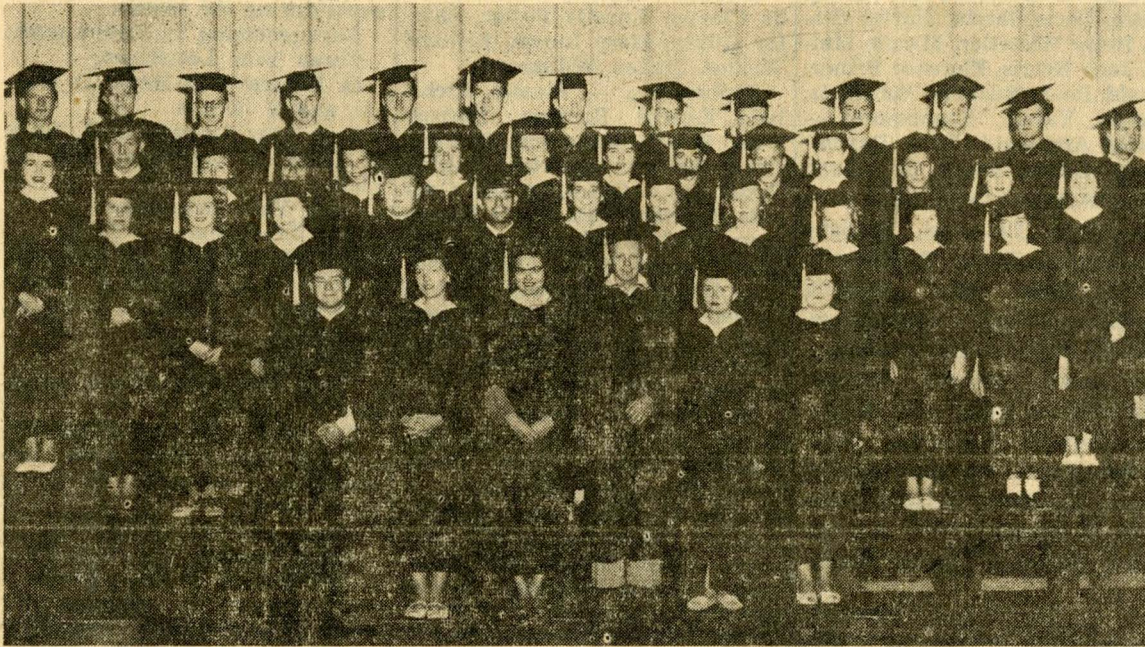

MIGHTY SENIORS IN REVIEW

Another chapter in the history of Basic High has been completed. Some of the experiences of the Class of '53 have been unique. In the first place, they are the first Basic High Senior Class to go to Death Valley for "Ditch Day".
